The South Amboy residents were honored in front of their families; friends; other Scouting peers; and Mayor Fred Henry of South Amboy.

Jack is the son of Mr. & Mrs. John Lukie and is a 2019 graduate of South Amboy High School. He will continue his studies in engineering at Stevens Institute of Technology in Hoboken in September

Zachary is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Robert O'Connor and is a 2019 graduate of Middlesex Vocational High School in East Brunswick. He will continue his studies at Middlesex County College in September with his goal to become a Special Needs Teacher.

Scott is the son of Jackie and Keith Oshman. He will be a senior in September at South Amboy High School.

Obtaining the rank of Eagle Scout is the highest honor that a Scout can earn, and historically only approximately 2 percent of all registered Scouts actually are able to achieve the honor. Requirements are extensive and include obtaining numerous skills through the Merit Badge program, demonstration of on-going service and leadership responsibility in the Troop and the community, and the successful completion of a Council approved Service Project that must benefit the community.

South Amboy Boy Scout Troop 91 organize a volunteer activity to restore and rehabilitate the areas in the front and on the side of Christ Church Memorial Hall in South Amboy, including the total reconstruction of their parish community vegetable garden. The work also included the restoration of the Memorial Hall sign and planting of new flower gardens.

Zachary O'Connor planned and organized a volunteer activity to accurately locate and index on new maps, the exact grave locations of deceased South Amboy Fire Department members. The project entailed extensive research, field work, and map making skills. All totaled, the project identified, located and plotted over 155 deceased members.

Scott Oshman planned and organized a volunteer activity to restore and rehabilitate the areas in front of both the church and the rectory at Christ Church in South Amboy. This restoration included the complete rebuilding of the garden surrounding the parish "Peace Cross", removal of overgrowth and weeds in all areas, and the restoration and repainting of all light poles and handrails.

Troop 91 of South Amboy celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2016 and is one of the oldest Boy Scout Troops in the nation. Any boy between the ages of 11 and 18 interested in joining can attend a weekly meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday nights at the First Presbyterian Church of South Amboy on Broadway. The Troop also supports the activity of Cub Pack 91 for boys age 6 to 11, which meets on Mondays at 6:15 p.m. in the same location.



The number one song in 1969 was "Honky Tonk Woman" by The Rolling Stones. The top movies for 1969 were "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid,""Midnight Cowboy" and "Easy Rider." The number one TV show was "Rowan and Martin's Laugh In" followed by "Gunsmoke" and "Bonanza." The Mets won the World Series, the Jets won the Super Bowl, and the Knicks won the NBA title.

Class memories include the Pretzel Boycott, The Jug Band, underground newspaper, and our Senior Prom - "Once in a Lifetime."

Our Valedictorian was Joe Adamca, and Salutatorian was Sue Jacobson. Senior Class Officers were Pat Hubbs (President), Rich Strugala (Vice President), Janet Hunkele (Secretary) and Kathy Olszewski (Treasurer). The Senior Drama was THE CRADLE SONG, and Senior Musical KISS ME KATE. We had 13 class marriages, 4 sets of twins, and dozens of nicknames.





South Amboy's Historical Markers By Jerry Pizzillo

With the help from Mayor Fred Henry and its governing board and members, the historical society evolved into a very active and vibrant addition to the City of South Amboy.

A part of the Society's mission is to "provide educational opportunities for both its members and the general public." The Society has undertaken an opportunity to educate and make known, some of the city's important events and places. This endeavor is part of the historical marker program.

The historical marker program is a free of charge opportunity from the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders, in conjunction with the Middlesex County Arts and History Commission. An application is completed, a permission letter from the property owner, the wordage to appear on the marker is then submitted to the county for approval. Once approved the marker is manufactured and turned over to the historical society. Once the marker is delivered it is up to the applying entity to provide the placement and dedication of the marker.

Here in South Amboy we have 5 markers all set in place.

Our first marker depicts the "1950 Pennsylvania Railroad Explosion." This marker is located on the pedestrian walkway down by the South Amboy boat ramp.

Second is the "Camden & Amboy Railroad marker." This marker is located at the NJ Transit Plaza located across from city hall.

Third is the "First Air Mail Delivery in New Jersey." This marker is in front of Broadway Bagels. In 1914, the bagel store was the SA post office.

Fourth is the "Terra Cotta Works." This marker is located by the YMCA where the Terra Cotta works was once located.

Fifth is the history of the "City of South Amboy", located in front of city hall.

A sixth marker is in the planning stage, its designation and location will be kept a

With the vast history of South Amboy, we will continue to keep the county busy with the historical marker program. If you haven't already located the markers, take a stroll and locate the markers. Read the words and be educated by the historical value each of the markers shows.

> In addition to the markers throughout the city, the South Amboy Historical Society finally has a home. Our gallery is located across from City Hall that shares space with the South Amboy Arts Commission. The gallery was dedicated and opened to the public on the same day in May, when the "City of South Amboy" marker was dedicated. Currently the Historical Society is on summer break, and will return in September. Once a game plan is set in place, the gallery will be open to the public for more of the Society's mission to educate the community. The gallery contains historical items from the City of South Amboy as well as from historical events. The items are the property of the SAHS that were donated or on loan from members. Continue to check the South Amboy-Sayreville Times for the dates the gallery will be open.

things when describing people and places in the past. I've noticed this once again when I recently looked up Keansburg...a place most of us "oldies" had visited in the 1950's and 1960's. It was also a lot cheaper. When the daylight lengthened and hot weather replaced the cold, the entire park would be filled with laughing parents with their happy children and young couples on dates, while older people mostly sat and watched....sort of like seniors do in Atlantic City now. All the while, the "barkers" tried to separate everyone from their money, a nickel at a time, but a nickel went far in those years.

After parking the car and putting a nickel, of course, into the machine, the walk was a quick one to all the rides which were mostly for young kids, the Whip being an exception. Heading for the stands, a pizza place had to be passed, where an Italian guy standing in his shop was always spinning pizza dough around on his index finger as people watched. It was not only really awesome to see the dough spin and spin until it got to be the right size to make the huge large sized pizzas, but also to see a "real" Italian, a not so common sight for a lot of us coming from

History often seems to omit certain in and around the South Amboy/Sayreville area. I remember one summer day my father paying his nickel so he could play that strong man challenge, the one where the goal was to hit a place at the bottom of what had looked like a totem pole hard enough to make the bell ring far at the top. With his unfiltered Pall Mall cigarette dangling from his lips, he swung that big hammer so hard the bell had rung in a nanosecond. I forget what the prize had been. For me, it was just seeing my father being a bell ringer winner.

> At the connecting row of stands, the big spinning wheel would spin making a loud kind of clicking noise, as everyone watched while protecting their nickel which they had placed down on the number of their choice. At other stands, rubber rings would be tossed in the hopes of making a ringer around the mouth of a glass bottle; and softballs would be thrown at the standing rows of Indian dolls, often with a young male's hope of winning a prize for his date...and all of it only costing a nickel a try. There was also a booth where your fortune could be told but it had cost more than just a nickel. The plump, dark haired gypsy woman, with a heavily made up, unsmiling face and wearing huge gold-looped earrings and a kerchief wrapped around the top of her head, would be seated at a table in front of a crystal ball which, according to her, could foretell a person's future. To many people, the cost of 25 cents was a real bargain, especially if they had already stopped and "imbibed" a few drinks at the aforementioned bars along the way. As the barkers yelled, "Step right up...," the regulars would head off to play some Bingo or throw a few balls on the crooked wooden flooring of the old-time, non-automatic bowling alley.



The Hole In The Wall By Tom Burkard

"The tunnel" or "That thing where cars go through" are just a couple of ways new people in the area describe The Hole-InThe-Wall in South Amboy. Located about two blocks from the South Amboy Skating Arena, where one side is close to Pupek Road, and the other side is at the bottom of Wilmont Street in the Mechanicsville section of South Amboy, the structure has been around for a long time, probably before 1900.

The Hole-In-The-Wall is actually an underpass/tunnel type creation that allows vehicles and people to pass below the railroad tracks that were used many years ago by the Penn Central Railroad, and is currently owned by Conrail. It has a sidewalk that is partitioned off from the roadway by safety railings, and lights (It's had many, many different types of lights through the years).

As a Mechanicsville native, I have lots of memories of the vintage Hole-In-TheWall. I remember walking through it twice a day on my daily trek of nearly a mile each way to St. Mary's Grammar and High Schools. After a long day, I always looked forward to seeing it, as this meant I was almost home. When we were kids, it was a challenge or dare, and a major feat to ride your bike through The Hole-In-The-Wall on the roadway, when there were no cars coming. Occasionally, we would run through there on foot, and the very bold youngsters would stand in between the pillars in the center of the two lanes as cars would pass.

When we reached the legal age to get our driving licenses, most local teens were faced with the dilemma of driving through The Hole-In-The-Wall, and many nervous high school teens scraped the sides, and are still looking for pieces to their parents' cars that they left behind when they hit the wall. (LOL) To this day, fearful drivers take alternate routes so they do not have to drive through the underpass.

Come to think of it, I was always amazed how easily the old Marathon bus, as large as it was and driven by the legendary Red Wilson made it through without touching the sides. Also the Mechanicsville Fire Company's large fire truck would speed through it in route to a fire, and never scrape the sides, with only inches of space to spare. The bus drivers and the firefighters were really terrific drivers! Countless local teenagers can say that they had their first kiss in The Hole-In-TheWall. Some locals considered it a romantic spot back in the day. Of course, we had the local hot rodders with their fast cars and loud pipes who loved to speed through and gun their engines for the loud echo-effect. Sure there was the graffiti always written on the wall of The Hole-In-The-Wall, and some youngsters got their kicks by knocking out the lights inside many, many times through

*This article first appeared in The SA the years. The top of The Hole-In-The-Wall was a favorite spot for pranksters on Mischief Night before Halloween, and many South Amboy Police officers were summoned to chase the kids who were egging cars as they passed by below.

> I sadly recall losing a Mechanicsville friend, Jimmy Cleary, and also a baseball teammate Ken Blaha, in a tragic two-car accident at The Hole-In-The-Wall in the Spring of 1970. I often think of those two great guys, and how their promising lives ended, when they were so young. In the 1980's a bar on Raritan Street and Ridgeway Avenue (Where the New DeLuxe Diner was located) was named the Hole-In-The-Wall Inn. Some firefighters with the Mechanicsville Fire Company used to call themselves "The Hole-In-The-Wall Gang."

Recollections of The Hole-In-The-Wall

Dr. Kathleen Therkelsen (SouthAmboy) "I remember walking through singing real loud and listening to echoes. Before the lighting, it was dark and scary. As kids, we'd run through as fast as we could." Estelle Pluskota (South Amboy) "It was scary." Kevin O'Connor (formerly of South Amboy) "I remember the accident. I was watching Johnny Carson. I heard the accident, and left the house. I thought it was my sister, because she had gone out earlier in the same kind of car that was in the accident." Brian Strattton(SouthAmboy)"Iremember that my high school classmates had summer jobs with the City of South Amboy, and they painted the inside. It also seemed like whenever you went through, someone would have to blow the horn." Joe Jaskowiak (Formerly of South Amboy)"I remember when I scraped the side of my mother's '61 White Chevy Impala, the first time that I drove through, and I was being followed by a Marathon bus."



Guns Blazing: War of 1812 Exhibit Drops Anchor at Twin Lights Museum Historic Single-Ship Victories Captured by

Renowned Maritime Artist Maarten Platje

maritime paintings is open to the public at the Twin Lights Museum. "Guns Blazing! The War of 1812 and the New Jersey Shore" Platje, whose bold brushwork and attention to detail brings to life a game-changing chapter in American naval history. The exhibit, in Galleries II and III of the museum, also features historic artifacts and a short video on the 32-month conflict between the United States and Great Britain.

"Guns Blazing!" is the product of a partnership between two highly active local groups-Twin Lights Historical Society and Navesink Maritime Heritage Association—as well as Cavalier Galleries in New York City and the Twin Lights National Landmark. The exhibit has drawn wide acclaim at two previous U.S. stops this year, and will be at Twin Lights until November 22nd.

"The opening year of the War of 1812 featured a series of epic single-ship sea battles between the United State and Great Britain," says Rik van Hemmen of the Navesink Maritime Heritage Association. "The quality of American shipbuilding, strategy and seamanship resulted in a string of victories that opened the world's eyes to the power and promise of our young nation."

Platje, a native of the Netherlands, has won numerous awards for his maritime paintings during a career that has spanned more than three decades. He devoted years of research to the creation of historically accurate depictions of these iconic naval confrontations from the War of 1812.

"Even ardent history buffs need a refresher course on the War of 1812," admits Jeff Tyler, President of the Twin Lights Historical Society. "Maarten's monumental pumping and make you curious about the war beyond the wild, one-on-one sea battles. We've added a short video presentation to the exhibit to help visitors put what they are seeing into context."

That context includes the fact that the single-ship battles depicted by Platje involved so much carnage that both sides eventually altogether. The museum video covers action 732-872-1814.

A new, multi-gallery exhibit of historic on sea and land during the war, including the bombardment of Ft. McHenry made famous by Francis Scott Key in "The Star-Spangled Banner" and the unlikely victory of Andrew features 15 dramatic works in oil by Maarten Jackson's rag-tag army over 8,000 British Marines at the Battle of New Orleans.

"An interesting backdrop to the War of 1812 is that it didn't even have to happen," points out Twin Lights trustee Mark Stewart.

Indeed, the primary issue leading up to the war, England's policy of impressment of American sailors, had been officially scrapped by Parliament. Unfortunately, it took three weeks for news to travel across the Atlantic. By the time British diplomats anchored in Sandy Hook Bay to deliver the good news, they received the bad news that the shooting had already begun. Likewise, the victory at New Orleans that ultimately propelled Andrew Jackson to the White House came two weeks after America and England had ended the war, with the Treaty of Ghent.

Perhaps the most important take-away from the War of 1812 was that the United States was more than capable of defending itself against European powers. Though dwarfed by the Royal Navy, the U.S. fleet proved it could deal deathblows to British ships in intense, one-on-one action. The Constitution earned its nickname "Old Ironsides" during these single-ship victories.

"Military historians have commented that the sea battles depicted in the 'Guns Blazing!' exhibit have the quality of personal duels between naval commanders," points out van Hemmen, a marine engineer and senior partner at Martin, Ottaway, van Hemmen & Dolan in Tinton Falls. "And indeed they were."

"I think that will be instantly apparent oil paintings definitely get the adrenaline to anyone who comes here and experiences Maarten's work."

The Twin Lights National Historic Landmark is open Tuesday through Sunday from 10AM to 4 PM. Admission to the North Tower and museum is free. 

The correct answer was Star Jet roller coaster, which operated on Casino Pier in Seaside Heights from 2002. It was a steel sit down roller coaster created by E&F Miler Industries. It's name was inspired by the Jet Star roller coaster which operated on Casino Pier from 1970 until 2000. The similarity in names between the Star Jet and its predecessor has resulted in Star Jet being frequently misidentified in the media as Jet Star. On October 29, 2012, Hurricane Sandy caused the collapse of a large section of Casino Pier, dumping Star Jet into the Atlantic Ocean and damaging several other rides. Even though it was thrown into the ocean the structue of the coaster remained largely intact. Images of the coaster in the water were everywhere on new media coverage of Superstorm Sandy. The coaster was torn down and removed from the ocean in 2013, after several people attempted to climb it.

Star Jet's replacement, Hydrus, opened in May 2017. However, the replacement coaster opened on the beach instead of the pier to protect it from future storms.



Aging and Exercising

At some point, human beings lose the ability to respond effectively to the aging process. This myth has lived with us for generations, but it's just that – a myth.

There are numerous factors that enter into a person's attitude about growing older. Sarcopenia, the age-related loss of muscle is a key factor of the central problem. But it's never too late to start exercising. There are strategies anyone can design no matter what the age or physical condition. Study after study has demonstrated that the single most important activity a person can do to slow down and even reverse the aging process is

Being more active on a daily basis could be the most critical thing anyone can do. For some people this might be as simple as taking a 30 minute walk once a day. If this seems too challenging, then three 10 minute walks might be less demanding. For others, it might be getting up from the couch to change the channel on the TV instead of using the remote control. Parking your car far away from the entrance to a store instead of finding the closest parking space, can add a few more steps to your day and maybe a few more years to your life. Each physical activity a person disciplines himself to do, will further his overall development.

Now that you have started to include more physical activities into your daily routine you are ready to begin an exercise program. Many older people limit their activities because of a reduction in strength, not because of lack of cardiovascular endurance. As people age they frequently find that they walk more slowly. There are many elements that can cause this slower pace. But the single most important factor

Progressive resistance training is the resistance to the force of gravity by using weight, machines, or elastic bands. A person just starting can even use common objects such as soup cans as weights. Resisting the force of gravity by lifting a weight for a number of repetitions will begin to increase muscle mass and strength. Progressively increasing resistance will produce a further increase in muscular strength, lean muscle tissue, and muscular endurance, all necessary for functioning effectively in everyday life.

are inevitable. A recent addition to the initial fire training that all recruits must attend is the Traffic Incident Management System (TIMS). This program consists of a planned and coordinated multidisciplinary process to detect, respond to, and clear traffic incidents so that traffic flow may be restored as safely and quickly as possible. The TIMS training has become mandatory due to the many injuries and deaths to first responders in recent years. Responders to motor vehicle crashes are not limited to firefighters. Response can also be from police, EMT's, tow-truck operators, DOT personnel, prosecutor's office, Hazmat technicians and anyone else that may be needed. Roadway accidents can take as little as 15 minutes to clear or take days to mitigate the scene. Every minute that a first responder is at the scene is another minute for a potential disaster. According to information, three injury crashes occur every minute on average across the US, with a minimum of 9 responders arriving at every crash. This means that there are 1620 responders working at traffic-related crashes every hour and 38,880 responders in a 24 hour period.

Unfortunately, today there are many drivers who are inattentive while driving our roadways especially at high rates of speed. Is there anyone who can say that they have never seen someone driving and texting or talking on their phone while doing 65+ MPH on the Parkway?

When first responders arrive on the scene of a highway incident, they are usually planning their actions. Is someone trapped inside a vehicle, is the vehicle on fire, is it leaking gasoline, did it strike a pole and live wires are down? These are just a few of the scenarios that first responders find when they arrive on scene. But who protects these responders as they go about their duties?

This is where the TIMS training program comes into play. The program outlines the

As always, changes to the fire service as safe as possible, work the scene, then clear the hazardous scene as soon as possible. The longer we are working on the highway, the more susceptible we become for a serious injury or death. Before working the scene, we must warn drivers of an impending incident ahead. We do this by setting up warning signs and using traffic cones to divert traffic away, as much as possible, from our work area. There are also lighted message boards in use on the GSP and the NJ Turnpike giving drivers advanced warning of what to expect ahead of them. At the actual scene there will be "blockers", police cars or fire apparatus that will be used to block the working scene from oncoming vehicles. An inattentive driver can strike a blocker and send it into the working area. We must take as many precautions as possible to protect our responders. While working the scene, our minds are on the incident. We need someone or somethings to protect our backs as we provide care for others.

Hopefully all licensed drivers are aware of the "SLOW DOWN-MOVE OVER" law recently adopted in the state. If you observe flashing lights ahead, be they red, blue or yellow, slow down and move over one complete full lane from the lighted-up vehicle or the accident scene. The MOVE OVER law also pertains to disabled vehicles alongside the roadway. Be considerate of that person changing a flat tire.

With the TIMS program now mandatory for recruit firefighters, it may only be a matter of time before it becomes mandatory for all first responders to take the course.

This article is in response to an accident in July on Route 280 in West Orange where first responders were working an emergency scene on the highway when a loaded dump truck rammed the back of the ambulance and fire truck. There were serious injuries to the first responders and some are still in the hospital as this article goes to print. As first responders, WE must secure the scene in a procedures to take in order to make the scene way that protects all of us working that scene.

Governor and Legislature Reauthorize Free Tuition Opportunity Grant

Students from families with a gross annual income of \$65,000 a year or less may be able to attend Middlesex County College tuition-free this September. A revised Community College Opportunity Grant (CCOG) was included in the budget bill that the New Jersey Legislature passed and Governor Phil Murphy signed at the end of June. It covers all 19 community colleges in the state.


"We applaud the Governor and Legislature for making this investment in the state's future," said Mark McCormick, Middlesex County College president. "We are very pleased that eligible residents of the County may take advantage of this program. It will mean students will work less so they can study more. We know that earning an associate degree increases lifetime earning opportunity."

CCOG now covers both the fall and spring semesters for those taking six or more credits. It does not include summer session.

The 2020 state budget includes up to \$25 million for CCOG awards to be applied directly to eligible student accounts. This is a last-dollar scholarship, which means it will cover tuition after other federal or state assistance programs – such as Federal Pell Grants or New Jersey Tuition Assistance Grants - are applied.

Zakiya Smith Ellis, New Jersey Secretary of Higher Education, along with David J. Socolow, executive director of the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority, visited numerous county colleges in the spring to gauge the success of the program.

"I heard from students who had to take on three jobs to pay their expenses," capacity significantly. CCOG expands Dr. Smith Ellis said. "I heard from single parents who supported their children while CCOG began with a pilot program last studying for exams. The Community College Opportunity Grant enabled these students to stay in college. Those students are more likely to graduate and thereby repay the state's investment."

Police agencies from around New Jersey are gearing up for the state's largest annual of Highway Traffic Safety provides grants drunk driving crackdown. The Sayreville Police Department will be participating in the 2019 "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" Statewide Labor Day Crackdown. The made 1,196 DWI arrests. campaign begins August 16 and concludes on September 2. Speaker Coughlin Bill Requiring "New Jersey Safe Haven Infant Protection Act" Education in Public Schools Now Law

Measure Will Teach Curriculum to Grades 9-12, Aims to Prevent Harm, Death of Unwanted Babies

Aiming to educate students about a safe, legal and anonymous means to surrender their newborn child that they do not wish to keep, a measure requiring public school students in grades 9 through 12 to receive information on the "New Jersey Safe Haven Infant Protection Act" was signed into law Friday by Governor Murphy.

The law (A-1380) requires the instruction to be part of the school's Core Curriculum Content Standards in Comprehensive Health and Physical Education. It is sponsored by Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin (D-Middlesex) who issued the following statement:

"By allowing students to become educated on the Safe Haven Protection Act, we will decrease the likelihood that students, often in a state of intense fear and anxiety, will harm or discard their newborn child as covered in recent reports.

"Through this law, students will know that they, or someone acting on their behalf, can surrender their baby, less than 30 days old, at any hospital emergency room, police station, fire house or rescue squad that is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

"Not only does this law save the life of a newborn baby who can be placed in the care of a loving family, it will also prevent the emotional trauma, guilt and legal repercussions that can result when a student discards a newborn."




