





Being in the fire service is no different fingerprint found on a piece of notebook than any other career or profession when it comes to ethics and values. Most organizations, including the fire service, have multiple duties and responsibilities for their personnel. I will compare the employees to apples in a crate. In every crate you can be sure to find a bad apple. Unfortunately, in the fire service we occasionally find a bad apple. The fire service in California found out the hard way how one of their own became the bad apple. This article is about the infamous California fire arson investigator John Orr. John Orr applied for a position in two police departments and two fire departments in Los Angeles County and was turned down by both. He was turned down by the police departments because he could not pass the mental health test. He was turned down by the fire departments because he struggled with both the written and physical tests and was rejected. Then in 1974 he applied for a position with the Glendale Fire Department which was the lowest paid department in Los Angeles County at that time. He studied fire science and soon became an arson investigator. In 1984, a major fire occurred at a hardware store which quickly destroyed the structure. Unfortunately, four people were killed in this fire: a two-year-old child; a 50-year-old grandmother; a 26-year-old mother of two; and a 17-year-old employee. Following the fire, arson investigators from southern California investigated the devastating fire and determined the cause to be electrical. However, Orr, as one of the investigators, insisted that the cause was arson. Investigators later showed that the fire started in highly flammable polyurethane products which quickly ignited and caused the fire to flashover, thus retracting their cause as being electrical. In January 1987, an arson investigator's conference was being held in Fresno, CA. While the convention was occurring, there were multiple suspicious fires occurring in nearby Bakersfield. Found at the scene of one of those fires was a very interesting.

paper. It was part of a time delay incendiary device which led investigators to start looking at arson investigators as suspects. There were just too many fires of a suspicious nature occurring near and around where arson investigators gathered. During March 1989, another series of arson fires occurred along the California coast in the Pacific Grove area which was in proximity of a conference of arson investigators. A list of attendees from both the Fresno and Pacific Grove conferences was created and the outcome showed a possible ten suspects. Again, in late 1990 and early 1991, another rash of arson fires occurred around the LA metropolitan area. An organization called Fire Investigator Regional Strike Team (FIRST) was created to help the smaller surrounding communities that did not have arson investigators. They created a flier that was distributed around the communities. The flier described the modus operandi of the suspected serial arsonist. Now four years after finding that fingerprint at the scene of an arson fire they were able to place a name to it. When John Orr applied for a position with the LAPD, he had to have his fingerprints taken. His prints were on file and were matched to the print left at the arson fire. He was their arsonist! It was only through forensic science that this determination was possible. On July 31, 1992, John Orr was convicted on three counts of arson and sentenced to 30 years. On November 21, 1994, he was indicted on four counts of first- degree murder and twenty-one counts of arson. He will die in prison. He later explained that he was angry and held a grudge because of being turned down by both the LAPD and the LAFD and the arson fires were his way of getting back at them. There is a book about John Orr called "Fire Lover" where he considered the fires his mistress therefore giving the book its name Lover. A TV show called "Forensic Files" also did a story on John Orr which is



Whether for business or pleasure, traveling is hard on your back. You spend time in uncomfortable seats and unfamiliar beds and carry heavy suitcases through airports and hotel lobbies. It's time to give your back a vacation by learning how to travel with back pain.

1. Lighten your luggage load. Resist the temptation to pack everything in one carry-on suitcase or garment bag. If you want to avoid checking luggage, pack only what you can carry comfortably. If you carry a garment bag or suitcase with straps, remember to balance the load by alternating shoulders. Carrying two suitcases of approximately equal weight is an even better solution.

Be aware of proper body mechanics while carrying your luggage. Imagine an invisible line that starts at your ear and continues past your shoulder to your hip. When the line is straight, you back is in proper balance

Use luggage carts. Push the cart with both arms and keep your elbows tucked in close to your body to avoid overreaching.

The next time you buy luggage, look for lightweight suitcases with built-in rollers. Make sure the handle allows you to stand up straight while pulling or pushing the suitcases. Rubber wheels are recommended fro protection against slips and skids.

2. Beat back pain. Airline seats are not designed for comfort. From first class to economy, all passengers have the same complaints. Fortunately, you can make a few simple adjustments to protect your back. For lumbar support, place an airline pillow or a folded blanket in the small of your back. Be conscious of your posture, especially if you want to nap. Use a pillow or folded blanket to support your neck.



From The TIMES Archives Retro Rockin' Thru The Years

Hey rockers! Just connected with good friend and drummer Mr. Greg Origo, who when I the writer was a mere 15 years old, (A veteran guitar player of 2 years) asked me to join him, guitarist Darryl James, and bassist Glenn Giles as a member of "The Crescents," an off-shoot of "The Hubcaps." This was my introduction to the club circuit (Hey, no more school dances, block dances). Wow, this was "the big time." With no ABC card, I had to spend our breaks in the liquor room of the illustrious Pink Elephant Lounge in Perth Amboy, which is where and when I began my relationship with Four Roses. That's another story...

It's amazing how all of us local musicians "hooked up" thru our early years of playing Rock 'N' Roll. Other local talent that was a part of this era was guitarists Rick Donnelly and Ken Wojcik, bassist Bob Wickley and keyboardist Bruce Karr.

The first Hubcaps off-shoot consisted of Greg Origo, drums; Darryl James, guitar; Ray "Red" LaBranch, bass and vocals, and featuring Miss Toni Lynn on vocals. This band did the circuit from 1963-67. Now, thru that period (63-67), the previously mentioned "Crescents" were born, and filled in the gaps when "Toni Lynn and The Hubcaps" couldn't. The Crescents were around using the aforementioned local musicians as needed from '64 to '66. I've gotta tell you, being 15 at the time, that was like "playing with the Stones" now...

1966 brought about The Hubcaps without Toni Lynn, with Greg Origo, Darryl James, Ray LaBranch, myself (the writer), and either Glenn Giles or Bob Wickley on bass. This combo lasted thru '67. As the years went by, we all went our separate ways with numerous groups, as did Greg. In 1974, he hooked up with "Iron Mike" Pitowski, Skip and Phil Heinze, Tony Thomas, and Karen Cinkay to form "Play House," doin' the disco thing and Top 40 chart. Check out the leisure suits. SWEET! This band rocked until 1982. Then Greg added Joe Cleveland to the lineup and "The Rogues" were born.

Greg's been one of the "local rockers" to get in a studio and cut a record, two 45's in fact. That story will follow.

My thanks to Greg Origo and company for giving me the "shot to rock with the big boys years ago, and for the photos and their history.

Remembering Greg Havlusch By Tom Burkard

Former South Amboy resident Greg Havlusch 72, died on July 24. I never really knew Greg well, but always appreciated his tremendous athletic ability, especially on the basketball court and the couple of years he played in the South Amboy Men's Senior Slow Pitch Softball League.

Greg was a talented starting center for the Hoffman Governors outstanding basketball team, for 3 seasons from 1965-68 his senior year, and if rebounding records were kept at the John St. school, he probably would have had over 1,000 in his career. Havlusch played a huge role in the success of the Ray "Butch" Tomaszewski coached ballclubs, not only under the boards, but at 6-foot 5-inches, he could also provide scoring when needed if opposing teams cracked down on the Guvs Far Out Trucking. Havlusch was a standout

top scorers, Curt Wood, Billy Clayton and on this team as well, and was selected to the Bob Keegan.

In '67, the day before Hoffman trekked to Atlantic City's Convention Hall in state tourney play, Greg's mother died unexpectedly. Grege was overcome with grief, and area newspapers wondered if he would be able to play in Hoffman's big game. The brave high school junior managed to fight back his sadness and tears, and went out to play an outstanding game, despite his team losing a heartbreaker.

Greg later went on to play college ball at Biscayne University in Florida along with St. Mary's greats Jim McCloud and Mark Bratus. He also started his own team that competed in local senior leagues and called it

premier South Amboy All-City League 1st Team, which picked the top players, and was chosen by coaches and referees.

Coach Ray "Butch" Tomaszewski remembered Greg Havlusch, saying "He was an all-around ballplayer. He was tough and one of the best. Greg was a great rebounder, and a good guy."





Jack McKeon was the catcher for Hutchinson, and batted .218 with 4 home runs and 40 rbi's. . . Switch-hitting Walt Rogers, also of South Amboy, was starring for Birmingham in the Southern Association. He had careerhighs with 11 home runs, and 162 hits. Walt knocked in 57 runs. . .Sayreville's Eddie Wayne (Wlodarczyk) had a superb year while playing for Austin in the Big State League. He hammered the ball for a .338 clip, and scored 85 runs, a career high, and also ripped 181 hits, 32 doubles, and had 88 rbi's...'52 was a year to remember for South Amboy rookie sensation, John Kovaleski, who tore up the Georgia-Florida League by batting .296 with 136 hits and 19 stolen bases for the Brunswick, Georgia club. Actually, Scarillo, captured her third and unprecedented, successive batting championship. Seres turned in a typical "monster" year, by ripping the cover off the ball for a .608 batting average, while ripping 42 hits #2 in the county, 12 doubles, 4 homers, 26 RBI, and 42 runs #2 in the county. ICYMI: Booker, Coughlin Host NJ Listening Session Ahead of White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health

Craig Coughlin hosted a listening session with New Jersey anti-hunger advocates, state officials, and agricultural stakeholders and across the great state of New Jersey in advance of the White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health scheduled for next month.

The roundtable discussion highlighted food insecurity and hunger in New Jersey, the need to reform our nation's food system, and the rising incidence of diet-related diseases. A recent report found that one in 12 New Jersey households experienced food insecurity from 2018 to 2020 and that chronic health conditions resulting from food insecurity cost New Jersey about \$1.3 billion each year. Nationally, the number of people under the age of 20 living with Type-II diabetes grew by 95% from 2001 to 2017, with the greatest increases seen in Black and Hispanic youth.

Earlier this year, Booker successfully fought to secure funding for a second White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health. The first such conference was held more than 50 years ago in 1969, culminating in the creation and expansion of programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), and the National School Breakfast and Lunch Program. The purpose of the second conference is to take a whole-of-government approach to ending hunger and combatting nutrition insecurity, featuring diverse stakeholders such as independent family farmers and ranchers, health care professionals, and anti-hunger advocates.

"The second White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health provides us with the opportunity to create a roadmap to reform America's failed food policies that have left Americans without access to affordable, nutritious foods and have caused an explosion of diet-related diseases," said Sen. Booker. "To achieve success, it's incredibly important that we bring together stakeholders of different backgrounds who are on the frontlines of the dual hunger and nutrition crises that are impacting millions of Americans. I am grateful for the government leaders, anti-hunger activists, and medical professionals who shared their perspectives at today's listening session. Their experiences are vital ahead of next month's White House Conference, and I look forward to incorporating them as I work with President Biden and the White House
