

Melendez Resigns: McGill Selected

Sayreville Democratic Councilman Ricci Melendez announced his resignation immediately from the Borough Council. Melendez, who regained his seat two years ago after losing re-election, submitted a four paragraph letter dated Nov. 18 to the municipal clerk, and officially resigned

On his councilman Facebook page he thanked "the members of the governing body, Borough employees and our Sayreville residents for allowing me to serve. I leave behind multitudes of projects and policies that I am proud of and will remain part of my legacy."

On Nov. 26, former Sayreville Councilman Dave McGill was selected and sworn in to replace Melendez. The Democratic Party had to nominate three candidates to replace Melendez, and finish his unexpired term. The three chosen were McGill, former Councilman William Henry, and Kenneth Scott. Council President Victoria Kilpatrick said "They were all excellent candidates."

McGill served on the council from 2013-2015 and campaigned with Melendez in 2012 and 2015. His term will expire Jan. 31, 2019, and he will be on the ballot in the November 2019 election for a full 3-year term


South Amboy Ferry Gets Closer

Commuters who have to travel on New Jersey Transit trains from the South Amboy rail station could see a better alternative to to get to New York City. At a recent press conference, South Amboy Fred Henry announced the engineering firm of French and Parello Associates of Wall has been selected to complete the engineering and design work needed to restore South Amboy to New York ferry service. Henry introduced Steve Tardy, Executive Vice President of French and Parrello who talked about the next steps that will be taken to restore service off lower Main Street. Work includes parking area design, docks, bulkhead, and terminal

building. French and Parrello will obtain necessary permits from the state Department of Environmental Protection, Army Corps of Engineers, and the federal Environmental Protection Agency. South Amboy officials noted French and Parrello has completed South Amboy projects like the recently completed Venetian Care and Rehabilitation Center. City officials said bidding for construction of the ferry terminal should be in late 2019 and ferry service could begin again sometime in 2020. Once completed, the ferry would reach Wall Street and midtown Manhattan in well under one hour.

Sayreville Bombers Win 2 Championships

The Sayreville Bombers powerhouse football team marched to two championships recently. They captured a hard-fought Central Jersey (CJ) Group V championship. In a stingy defensive tussel, the Sayreville NJ trailed 7-0 after one quarter, but in the contingent scored what proved to be all that was needed in the second quarter, on a fourth a 57-yard touchdown run, but the extra point Mark Whitford.

The Bombers outstanding defense held and halted their main threat, Myles Bailey keeping him down to 91 yards on 19 carries. Sayreville racked up only 195 total yards, 137 on the ground, as Zuriel Wright led the rushing with 75 yards on 22 carries. Whitford completed 7-of-14 for 65 yards, Jacari Carter hauled in 5 of those passes for 39 yards. The standout defense was led by Connor Holmes with 11 tackles, Conner Anthony-10 tackles, Anthony Griffin 6 tackles, 2 sacks, James Berecsky 6 tackles, and Jorge Leiva 6 tackles.

For the Bombers, it was their fifth sectional crown in 10 years, but they fell last season to North Hunterdon in the semis of North 2 Group IV. North Hunterdon marched on to the title after beating Sayreville.

Sayreville then traveled to Met Life Stadium in East Rutherford for the Group V Central/South Bowl championship against contest over North Brunswick, 6-0 to win the the #7 team in NJ, undefeated Williamstown (12-0). The Blue & Gray, ranked #11 in second stanza, Zuriel Wright broke loose for and goal, with a 1-yard TD run by quarterback attempt failed, and Sayreville was down 7-6 at halftime.

In the final minute of play, Connor the Raiders to 155 yards from scrimmage, Holmes fumble recovery in the end zone was the game-winner for our locals, and they nailed down the first-ever South Group 5 NJSIAA/Rothman Orthopaedic Bowl championship, 14-7. The Bombers offense was paced by Whitford, who completed 11-of-18 passes for 96 yards, Holmes, with 6 receptions for 32 yards, and Wright, who rushed for 66 vards on 7 attempts. Defensive standouts were Jayvis Rayside with 14 tackles, and Savon Kirksey 11 tackles.

Do you remember when the postman would walk up the steps and put the mail in a mailbox on the front porch? And, sometimes start a conversation about, well, a lot of things: basketball (Hoffman/St Mary's/Knicks) football (Giants), the weather and of course After Thanksgiving loads of boxes would the latest town gossip. 

It's easy to know when "the Holiday Season" is around the corner by the same really come in handy. Fifty cents a week old commercials on TV. Those big-ticketed items like brand new vehicles with red bows on them the size of large umbrellas and the diamonds galore in the jewelry commercials make it seem buying gifts this expensive is proof of true love. In my opinion, the Holiday Season has become a time of year attempt to buy happiness... before the credit been served in a restaurant. Instead, the card bills start arriving anyway. It wasn't a Christmas dinner was cooked for the gluttony overload when the Holiday Season was known as the Christmas Season. It

Whenever I remember the Christmas Season of my youth, I really don't think about presents. Back in the '50s and '60's, just as it was in earlier decades. Christmas was the celebration of the birth of Christ, and He was the "star," not us. Yes, there were always gifts waiting under the tree for small children but for bigger kids, it would be mostly "needed" items like pajamas, socks, handkerchiefs, the domain of the woman of the house... and gloves, all wrapped in festive wrapping paper to make those ordinary presents seem, well, less ordinary.. If we were lucky, there would also be a special gift...something we had wanted more than anything else in the world, as long as it didn't cost much money. I think it was more the "entire package," everything combined which had made up the Christmas Season in the past: Christmas school vacations, Christmas trees shining with Christmas balls and Christmas tinsel, Christmas Santas in their somewhat worn out Santa suits ringing their bells in Perth Amboy, Christmas cards, Christmas shopping, Christmas songs, Christmas cookies, Christmas dinner, Christmas Mass, Christmas lights, Christmas wreaths, Christmas TV specials (like the yearly showing of the 1951 movie, "Scrooge"), Christmas Mangers, Christmas traditions, and if our prayers were answered, even waking up to a Christmas snowfall.

Getting a Christmas Club check had turned into \$25 at the end of the year... while \$1.00 a week turned into \$50, but not everyone could afford such a big weekly amount. Larger Christmas Clubs were also available but most people who had them used the money to pay their real estate taxes.

Whatever food had been served on for many to spend like drunken sailors in an Christmas in those long ago years, it hadn't family and eaten by the family at home. It's really strange the odd things we end up remembering, like how I can recall our old Christmas tablecloth appearing heavily starched and lovingly ironed year after year...the one made of white linen with red poinsettias and green leaves imprinted on it. Time and use had made the red and green colors fade, but it was still an important part of our Christmas.

> Christmas shopping had always been and shopping usually had meant riding the Marathon bus to the stores on Smith Street in Perth Amboy, often with Red the Bus Driver at the wheel. Even in the coldest weather, going Christmas shopping by bus in the dark of night was an exciting part of the Christmas Season. It still is... "in the misty waters of my mind."

Christmas Ornaments Made In South Ambov

Back in the 1940's South Amboy entrepreneurs were busy around the Christmas holidays. Julius Lobycz, owned a bar on lower Augusta St. below the railroad station, called Lobycz's Bar, which later became VJ's.

In the garage behind the bar, Lobycz produced beautiful hand-blown mercury type Christmas ornaments, and was assisted by Isadore Lotkowictz, father of The SA Times Contributing Photographer Joe Lotkowictz.

My late sister Madeline Burkard Bowerman recalled hearing by "word of mouth" that the ornaments were on sale at lower Augusta St., and "A lot of people were buying box after box, 12 ornaments for \$1, and even though money was tight back then, I bought 5 boxes, and to this day (This story originated in 2009), have one ornament left. They were beautiful, all colors, silver and gold and reasonably priced."

Joe Lotkowictz of South Amboy said he was about 5 years old at the time, but remembered watching his father, Isadore Lotkowictz assisting the owner, Julius Lobycz, who was Joe's godfather, in the actual creation process of the ornaments. He also said he thought that the ornaments were initially made "Prior to the war, but when the war started, they couldn't get materials such as paint." He continued, "I think it was around 1940-41, when they sold the Christmas balls, big silver, grapes, round silver balls, blue balls, red, and others that had Christmas trees and Santa Claus faces on them. I believe he started making them again after the war in the late 1940's, and continued into the early 50's." Joe's late wife Anne Lotkowictz said that every year at Christmas time, Joe would tell her to "Make sure you put the ornaments on the tree. My dad made them." His favorite ornament was the one with the grape design.

At the time of this interview in 2009, Joe and Anne still had 9 beautiful ornaments left from Julius' creation, including a silver, a gold with gold roses, grape design, Santa Claus in what else, red and white. Joe said that there were about 7-10 varieties, that came in 2 1/2," 3," 4," and "huge, plain, round 8" ones . Joe added that, "We're glad we still have 9 of these beautiful, hand-blown ornaments."

Former South Amboy resident, Walter Przygocki sold the ornaments in the 1950's with his family at the Woodbridge Auction and door-to-door around South Amboy and Savreville. His father Walter "Mickey" Przygocki was a friend of Julius Lobycz, and that's how he began selling Christmas

Walter said, "At the auction, we would call out 'Christmas ornaments \$1.25 a dozen.' Friday and Saturday were the days we hit the streets and called on individual houses. We were trying to take advantage of payday money that would lead to a purchase. Of course, in the 1950's, there was no fear of walking the streets and calling on houses to sell ornaments. Everyone was friendly and glad to see us. Mr. Lobycz was a wonderful man and an exceptional craftsman. The price was \$1.25 for a dozen, and our commission was the 25 cents of the total price. We spent many a night selling these beautiful ornaments during the weeks leading up to Christmas. I still have several and handle them with great care and fond memories of a festive time growing up in South Amboy. Thanks for bringing back so many great memories

of a time when we lived a "Wonderful Life"

in "The Pleasant Little City." Walter's mother, Rose Przygocki of South Amboy recalled her husband loading up the family car around 1955-56 with her and their 3 children Walter, Vicky and Karen, and going around South Amboy and Sayreville and selling them door-to-door. She also remembered selling them at the Woodbridge Auction. Her husband, Walter "Mickey" Przygocki was a friend of Julius Lobycz, and that's how he began selling Christmas ornaments. Jerry and Ann Marie Connors, formerly of South Amboy still have about a dozen left, and Ann Marie said, "They're different colors and shapes, and we have one in the shape of a heart." It's really amazing that a local man, Julius Lobycz had a talent and a dream, to create and market Christmas ornaments, and did so with much success." Over 70 years have passed since he produced his first ornament, and one has to wonder how many are still out there, admired by families each year at Christmas, as they decorate their trees.



South Amboy's Famous Christmas Bells By Tom Burkard

*Revised From December 20, 2008 Issue

Back in the late 1940's, South Amboy resident Edwin J. Nicorvo came up with a brilliant invention, "The Bells of St. Nicholas," which was advertised on the box cover as "Electric Automatic Christmas Tree Bells. They swing, they sway, plug them in and hear them play." The box was red and green with white lettering, and the attractive artwork featured bells on a Christmas tree, with musical notes near the bells, plus a church window and holly. The bottom panel of the box read "They Swing, They Ring," and also had the name The Bells of St. Nicholas, and under that, E.J. Nicorvo Mfg. Corp. South Amboy, N.J., U.S.A. On one side panel of the box, the words "For Doorway," and "For Fireplace" were written along with bells and a bow artwork. On the opposite side panel, there was a wreath with a bell artwork, and the words "For Wreaths," and "For Windows." The back panel of the their chime sound, but never owned a set. box had the directions, and a slogan, "Hear them ring- See them sway-Plug them in-to hear them play." Directions were found on the back panel, and said, "Suggested use was for decorations for doorways, windows, fireplaces, parties, showers, weddings, etc." "The Bells of St. Nicholas" was approved by Underwriter Laboratories Inc., and had a Registration with the U.S. Patent Office for Action Window Displays, and also had a Canadian Patent. Nicorvo marketed his item, doing the manufacturing at his own factory, E. J. Nicorvo Mfg. Corp., which was located on North Broadway in the vicinity where Krauszer's store is now located. He hired mostly locals to work at the factory and assemble the bells.

In December 2010, when this story was initially written, Florence Cooney of Parlin, told me that her late husband John, purchased several individual boxes of the bells at the Englishtown Market over 25 years ago. She gave a set to each of her five children, and kept two sets. Florence never used them to decorate at Christmas, and said that they "Seemed to be more for display." She added that, "My daughter Debbie Marion plugged them in once to see if they worked, and they did, but moved very slowly."

Former Hoffman High School teacher George Virgilio, who taught at Hoffman from 1966-1988, owned a near-mint condition set, and took it out of the box to show me. He said he bought his at Englishtown about 30 years ago, and paid \$1-\$2 for them. Amazingly, the 60-year old bells, after being plugged in and warming up for a minute, played. They didn't play any Christmas songs, just dinged and moved, as if someone was ringing them by hand. George said that, "I bought it as a token. It's a cool thing to find something that was manufactured in South Amboy. I've only taken it out once or twice to see how

This was truly a unique creation by Nicorvo back in the '40's, and I would bet that it was an extremely popular item for shoppers at Christmas time. The Bells of St. Nicholas probably sold all over the U.S. and possibly in other countries as well. his sets. He thinks he may have paid \$1-\$2 for them.

My late sister Madeline Burkard Bowerman, worked at E.J. Nicorvo's for about 6 months in '48. She said, "Eddie Nicorvo had just started the new company. He was only about 28-30 years old at the time. I started to fill out an application and he asked me where I had gone to school, and I said St. Mary's, and was hired on the spot. He said he had attended St. Mary's. Eddie was a very nice and sweet employer. He had 10-12 women doing the assembly, at a long



table, and we all sat in tall chairs. Several of my co-workers were Edna Cottrell, Betty Hansell, Sis Lounsbury, Vivian Ervin, Phyllis Buckalew, and Eva Schmidt. His nephew Joe Corvino was the box boy and brought in boxes for us." She said they were paid about 75 cents an hour, and worked a 40-hour week. Four young women did soldering, and Madeline's job was to solder a tiny piece of the main wire or metal as a connector from the bell to the electrical unit. The work was tedious, and she said that while soldering, she often burned her thumbs. Madeline also stated that "The summer of '48 was a very hot one, and there was no air conditioning or fans. It was an old-fashioned factory, and was huge." She proudly mentioned that "The Bells of St. Nicholas" were sent overseas, as well as being marketed in the United States. Madeline said that she loved the bells with Times were tough in '48 for many people. I borrowed a set of the bells to show her, and she was the happiest person in the world when she saw them for the first time in 60 years. "I can't believe it! I'm shocked! It's the exact box and bells we used to make. They're 60 years old, and they're beautiful, like new! 60 Years is a long time, and they lasted." I couldn't help but detect a bit of pride in her happiness, for "The Bells of St. Nicholas" which she helped to make. The bells were marketed for homes in sets of three, with colors of red, silver, and green, and store counter display sets featured four bells, red, blue, green, and gold.

Phil Kurtz of South Amboy helped solve the mystery of who was selling the bells at Englishtown, when he asked me, "How many sets of those bells do you want?" He went on to tell me about how he came across the bells...His good friend, Jack Morrison's mother, Elizabeth Morrison, who taught at St. Mary's for many years, was a friend of Nicorvo's wife, Louise. About 30 years ago, the Nicorvos were moving to Asbury Park, and Mrs. Morrison got Jack and Phil the job of cleaning out the inventor's basement, where they had cases of "The Bells of St. Nicholas," and took them to the Englishtown Market, along with other items to sell. Phil recalled that "There were about 20-30 boxes with about a dozen sets per box. People weren't aware what they had in front of them. This was a good find, a gem." Even though the men were selling them for about \$2 each, the bells were a hard sell. Kurtz said "We went down to sell them a couple of times, and sold about 75% of all the bells, and some of our fortunate friends inherited some of the extras. One of those friends recently sold a set on e-bay for \$25." Phil's wife Jane has used the bells for decorating the house through the years. Mrs. Morrison said that "Ed Corvino was unique. He was an All State insurance salesman, and had different inventions. He also wrote a book about the presidents."

By today's standards, "The Bells of St. Nicholas" would not be earth-shattering, with its very simple concept of being plugged into an electrical outlet, heating up, and each bell slowly "dinging," and slightly moving. Kurtz said that, "For its time in the 1940's, what an eye-opener! Everything today is so far advanced that they'd never appreciate the bells." "The Bells of St. Nicholas" was a challenging and fun project for me to research. It was quite rewarding to actually find that people still had these 60-year old artifacts, and amazingly, the fact that they still worked! *A special thank you to all who came forth and contributed any information on "The Bells That Made South Amboy Famous.



Remembering George Spiecker Bill "Biff" McKeon

"One of the finest gentlemen/athletes/ husband/father/friend, George Spiecker, was called into Our Lord's Heavens Sports one of the best/finest athletes to wear the St. Mary's High School, Blue/Gold uniform starring in both basketball and baseball, and the Columbus Day football game . George's talent wasn't restricted to these sports whereas he also was a Golden Glove Boxer, and championship Pop Warner football coach, who coached my oldest son Michael. He also coached St. Mary's Grammar School basketball team, and in 1951 was selected on the New Jersey All State Baseball Team. He played baseball for the legendary South Amboy All Stars, a standout on the US. Army, Fort Dix baseball team, and softball pitcher for the South Amboy city champs Protection Fire Co. George was also a talented writer having 3 books published.

George Spiecker was also the project person who designed/supervised the entire electrical system for the Meadowlands New Jersey Sports Giants Stadium. George Spiecker, I proudly acknowledge was one of my best friends, as we shared many good stories of our past athletic careers, especially when George was forced into being the Eagles catcher (double header against St. Peter's HS), which was his first experience behind the plate. Another great memory was when the SMHS Eagles beat Sayreville's basketball team to end their 18 game winning streak, when I fired the ball across court to George, with seconds on the clock, and he made a beautiful two hand set shot that won the game. George and his beautiful wife Dorothy "Dixie," my wife Betty and I also shared many exciting times together watching our daughters/sons play sports down at the Morgan AA Sports Complex, traveling to New York City to watch Broadway Shows/ Paper Mill Playhouse Theater, watching Major League Baseball games in Boston/ Chicago/Cincinnati/New York, and football games at Notre Dame/Boston College as well as enjoying many steak/lobsters dinners with friends Mary/John Kenny; Flo/ Bill Lyons; Edie/Ron Oldenburg.

George Spiecker was an honest/truthful/ self-made man who educated himself (Night School Rutgers Univ.), became an electrician, and worked his way up to become of President of Beach Electric Co., in East Orange, one of the nation's leading electrical companies. He also learned to fly and obtained his private pilot's license, which was another outstanding accomplishment.

He pitched for the Guvs in 1985, turning in a (2-0) record, with a big victory over South River, 6-4. Tom also played varsity basketball for Hoffman. Joe "Buddy" Krygier, 84, of South Amboy died on Dec. 6. Joe was a fine baseball player, and was the leadoff batter/left fielder for the Governors 1950 team. Bobby, Tom and Joe were all great guys, and will always be remembered.

Tom Burkard recalled "My first League on Nov. 25. George Spiecker was memory of George was when I was about 5 years old and he lived across the street from me in the Mechanicsville section of South Amboy. When he would come home from playing a baseball game for the Fort Dix team, where he was stationed in the U.S. Army, I would always greet him, and ask about the game. I guess he sensed how much I liked to hear about baseball, and gave me my first baseball hat, a black one with the white letters 'Dix,' which I treasured! A couple of years ago, there was one photo of me back in 1956 wearing the Dix hat, so I had one printed and gave it to George, and thanked him for it and for helping to inspire my love for baseball. In the '50's he moved away, and I never saw him again for many years, as he raised a wonderful family, and built a highly-successful career, in which he became President of a major electric company. Along the way, he was an outstanding coach in Pop Warner League football, and did so much more!

> Through my newspaper, The SATimes, I became reacquainted with George again, and did a lot of research on his sports background. I found out that he was a very talented athlete at St. Mary's HS, and was selected as an All-State outfielder in 1951, while also excelling at basketball. In addition, during his high school days, he also boxed in the Golden Gloves and did very well, probably the only one from South Amboy to box in this prestigious boxing event.

> After retiring, he wrote and published 3 books, "Jill," "The Wayward Wind," and 'When We Meet Again."

> It will be a very happy time, when we all get together and 'meet again' with George and other loved ones someday. He was one of the truly great guys, who was always there to help if you were in need, and will never be forgotten. God Bless George Spiecker!"

FIRE SAFETY RECOMMENDATIONS DURING THE HOLIDAY SEASON

Everyone looks forward to the holidays, and • activities like decorating and entertaining. However, items like trees, lights and fireplaces also create fire hazards. When you learn to identify and fix unsafe conditions in your home, you can make it a safer place • for everyone.

Trees

- When buying a live tree, check for freshness - green needles, trunk sticky Holiday Entertaining with resin, and few lost needles when • tapped on the ground.
- Never place a fresh Christmas tree next to a heat source. Heat dries out trees • and makes them easier to catch on fire.
- Make sure your tree stand is always filled with water. This will prevent it • from drying out.
- When the tree gets dry, get rid of it. You can drop it off at a recycling center •
- Never burn a Christmas tree or its branches in a fireplace or wood stove.
- the label "Fire Resistant" or "Flame Retardant."

Lights, candles, and other decorations

- Use only Underwriters Laboratories- or Intertek- (ETL) listed holiday lights.
- Check your lights each year. Replace those with frayed or heavily kinked wires, gaps in insulation or cracked sockets.
- When decorating outside, only use lights labeled for outdoor use.
- Do not link more than three strings of


- Turn off holiday lights when you leave your home or go to bed.
- Use sturdy candle holders and place them where they're unlikely to be knocked over.
- Blow out candles before you leave your home or go to bed.
- Do not burn wrapping paper in the fireplace.

- When cooking for guests, stay in the kitchen and keep an eye on the stove.
- If you or your guests smoke, do it outside. Provide deep ashtrays for smokers.
- Before dumping ashes in the trash, soak them in water.
- After a party, check for ashes and butts on the floor and seat cushions where people were smoking.
- Christmas Day is the peak day of the year for home candle fires, so be sure to watch all your candles closely and keep them away from children and pets.

Salt Water

Striped Bass fishing is still going on but the fish are moving south. Party Boats are still catching them on jigs but it is more shorts and fewer keepers. Bluefish are gone. In the surf, especially at Long Beach and LBI. A good number of shorts and some keepers are being caught on jigs, teasers and plugs and cut bunker. In Raritan Bay there is hardly anything caught from local beaches. The few times that I checked some beach areas no one was fishing at all. Party Boat fishing for Blackfish has picked up. With the bag limit increase to 5 fish per person, some nice ones have been caught. Some Blackfish were weight in at 10 to 14 pounds. Winter Flounder continue to be caught in Shark River, but it's just about over for them now.

Fresh Water

Too much heavy rain has been creating high water conditions, but despite the rain, fall Trout fishing is still continuing. I tried the Black River on State Park Road in mid November for a few hours. Regardless of the high water conditions I managed to get one Rainbow about 16 inches. My wife and I returned to the Pequest. Water conditions were well above normal. We tried to fish anyway but to no avail. As you can probably guess we left empty handed. We went from there to Tilcon Lake hoping for a better chance. Even though the water was above its banks we were lucky enough to bring home one Landlocked Salmon

Thomas J Scully: 1863-1921 By Jerry Pizzillo, Historical Society of South Amboy

many popular and respected individuals in its existence. These prominent figures constitute some of the fields of military, business, sports, doctors, teachers, lawyers and political figures. One that calls to mind and should be recognized is Thomas J. Scully

Thomas J. Scully was born in then the Borough of South Amboy on September 9, 1868. Mr. Scully lived in the city his entire Congressman Scully would run in the next life. He attended the city schools and upon graduation he attended Seton Hall College for his formal education. After college he went to work for his father, John Scully in the marine transportation business that was owned by his father. At this position he honed his skills in the business field and brought the company to be one of the largest maritime businesses on the east coast. While at this position his friends and colleagues sought his advice and counsel, which he would give freely. His main interest was the welfare and concerns for the residents of the City of South Amboy.

His first experiences in the political field was when he was elected to the Board of Education, he held this position from 1893 to 1895. While at this position, he held a high regard for the education of the city's children. In 1909, after being voted in, Mayor Dr. Treganowan passed the reigns of mayor on to Thomas J. Scully. While in the office of mayor, Mr. Scully had moved the infant city to a higher standard of modernization. He Thomas J. Scully this city would not have reorganized the police department, he had the sewer system installed, brought a municipal owned and operated water department, rebuilt the city docks, and increased mail service

The City of South Amboy has produced utilizing the trolley system. He accomplished so much for the city that after one year in office he was nominated for a congressional seat for the congress. In 1911 he was elected as a Democrat to the 62nd United States Congress and to the next four succeeding Congresses, serving in office from March 4, 1911 to March 4, 1921.

Early in 1919, it was announced that gubernatorial election, but in the summer of 1919, he withdrew his candidacy. With his love of the city he was encouraged to run for a second term as mayor. He was elected in 1921 and remained mayor till his death on December 14, 1921.

On October 4, 1918 the T.A. Gillespie Shell loading Plant exploded causing death and destruction in South Amboy and surrounding communities. During this time Congressman Scully was representing the 3rd Congress District and upon notification of the event he rushed to the city and worked hard to alleviate the pain and suffering the townspeople endured. He introduced a bill to the House of Representatives a resolution calling for an investigation to the cause of the explosion and if the plant is to be reconstructed necessary safeguards to be put in place. Also included in the bill was to reimburse those who suffered property losses.

If not for the dedication of people like evolved to what the City of South Amboy is today. Mr. Scully is interred in his family plot located within St Mary's Cemetery.

VFW Patriotism Essay Winners






