Raymond "Butch" Tomaszewski

The City of South Amboy and Borough of Sayreville are in mourning over the passing away of three of their finest, highlyrespected and loved citizens. Ray "Butch" Tomaszewski, 88, died on Jan. 13. He was a teacher/varsity basketball coach for many, many years at Hoffman HS. Ray, who was a graduate of Hoffman in the mid-1950's, starred on the basketball team, and following graduation went on to Monmouth College, where he became the college's first 1,000 point scorer in history. He later had a long and illustrious career as one of the greatest varsity basketball coaches of all-time for Hoffman/ South Amboy High School. His team racked up an estimated 200 plus victories, and captured the 1967 Central Jersey Group 1 championship. He also coached several 1,000 point scorers including basketball legends Curt Wood, Billy Clayon, Gary Lange, Frank Kuziemski, and Bob Clayton. "Butch" was also the South Amboy Democratic Chairman for many years, and also served as an assistant to Recreation Director John Zdanewicz.

Municipal Clerk for the City of South Amboy until retiring in 2014. Kathleen also served as committeewoman and Mayor's secretary. She was always very helpful to all, and a kind-hearted lady who will be sadly missed.

Gerard "Jerry" Pizzillo Sr. 71, of Parlin, the former Police Chief of South Amboy died on January 14. Jerry was always helpful, caring, dedicated and hard-working in everything he was involved in. A '70 graduate of St. Mary's HS, he enlisted in the U.S.Marine Corps, where he proudly served his country. Jerry later went into the law enforcement field, and worked his way up through the ranks to become South Amboy Police Chief in 2003, a position he held until he retired. He was always a very active and contributing member of The Historical Society of South Amboy, and instrumental in obtaining historical markers from Middlesex County to be placed at different locations, where major events happened many years ago in the City of South Amboy. Jerry was also an outstanding actor, and portrayed many local historical figures at different events through the years. He was currently a Code

Enforcement Officer. Jerry truly loved his country and was so proud to be an American. He was also very proud to be a Marine and Police Officer, and was a member of PBA Local 63. In addition, he was a Model A enthusiast. Jerry was without a doubt one of the most patriotic men I have ever met, and his pride really showed in November, 2022, when the Veterans Plaza on Bordentown Ave. was dedicated. He was very involved, working side-by-side with city workers and local veterans during the construction of the beautiful Plaza. In addition, he was an eloquent speaker, and served as Master of Ceremonies at many historical, veterans, and police related events.




talking about those gigantic warehouses that are popping up everywhere. With more and more people shopping online, there is a need for locally placed warehouses to store and distribute products. For the fire service, this could be the catastrophic event no one wants to have occur. Some of these new warehouses are a quarter mile long or longer. It is not necessarily the building itself that is the concern but the products stored inside these massive structures and if the fire suppression systems are adequate should a fire occur. Is the sprinkler suppression system designed and installed properly and capable of handling any fire that may occur? Unfortunately, this is not always the case. On June 21st, 1982, K-Mart's 1.2 million square foot warehouse in Falls Township, Pennsylvania was totally destroyed by fire. The fire in this one-story, 1250 foot (quarter mile) long by 1000-footwide distribution warehouse caused \$113 in damages. The fire was determined to be accidental and started when a carton of carburetor cleaner fell to the ground from a stored pallet. As the carton hit the ground, one or more of the cans under pressure ruptured, spraying the liquid cleaner around the area of a moving forklift truck. It was determined that an electrical spark from the forklift ignited the flammable liquid vapors. The fire suppression system was activated but was quickly overwhelmed due to the large amount of flammable liquids stored in the facility. It was estimated that over 580,000 cans of petroleum distillate-based aerosols and 480,000 cans of alcohol-based aerosols were stored in the facility. One of the major factors that resulted in the total loss of the warehouse was an unintentional open door in the fire-protection wall. This open door allowed the fire to spread to the area of the warehouse where general merchandise was being stored. Other products stored in this facility were butane lighter fluids, paint, propane tanks, and small arms ammunition.

Eventually it will be in YOUR town. I am When aerosol cans are exposed to fire, they rupture along the seams, and using propane and butane as propellants, they can fly through the air leaving a blazing trail of fire in their wake. Fire was able to spread in all directions as cans traveling at rocket speeds had no sense of direction. Fire sprinkler suppression systems are designed to suppress a fire in its initial stages. In this case, the massive amount of flammable liquids quickly overwhelmed that sprinkler system. Another concern is the water used to fight the fire that becomes contaminated from the hazardous materials involved in the fire. Where was the runoff going? Did it seep into the ground where wells and aquifers are located or into the storm drains that feed into the rivers, lakes and bays and pollute them? With that being said, look throughout your community for new construction (existing ones too) of massive-sized warehouses. Take a moment and think of what might be stored in those warehouses and the quantities. Will there be any unauthorized storage of materials that at times may overwhelm the fire suppression system? Those may be the cases when we hear the property manager say, "I didn't think it would cause a fire or I only intended to store it there for a few days and I didn't think there would be a problem." These are the times when unexpected incidents occur and can lead to disaster. Who is the watchdog over these massive facilities? How will the first responders be made aware of the diverse types and quantities of hazardous materials stored in these warehouses? Are our firefighting resources adequate to manage a K-Mart warehouse type fire in our community?

Three Winter Storms In New Year By Steve Schmid



The Road To The '84 State Championship By Pete Smith

won the Group 1 State Championship. As the 40th anniversary approaches, a look back is worthwhile. The journey of the championship team started in 1976 in the 9 and 10 year old South Amboy Little Fellas All Star team. The 9-and 10-year-old allstars typically played the Fords tournament. The South Amboy team was good, but was undone by Jeff Kipila and Iselin. Iselin was a nemesis throughout the 1976-1983 period. Jeff was drafted by the Angels and made it to triple A. In the tournament knockout stages, Jeff homered to put Iselin ahead and eliminate South Amboy for good in the double elimination tourney. The 11-12 year old team includes the core members who would go on to the state championship win at Hoffman. Since this was age-group rather than class level, some of the guys that were a grade ahead were on the team including Jimmy Beshada, and John McQuade. The players were Steve Martin, Pete Smith, Mark Thompson, Carson Bloodgood, John McQuade, Kevin Gorczyca, Wilbur O'Leary, Jeff Pacansky, Billy Bright, Joe Lewis, Jimmy Beshada, Kenny Huryk, Craig Gorczyca, John "Skeets" Skarzynski. Coaches were Pat Leonard (his son was the bat boy), Joe Pacansky's dad, and Coach Wence.

South Amboy made the Middlesex County Freeholders championship. The game was against Iselin... of course. South Amboy went ahead 3-2 in extra innings. With two outs, Jeff Kipila comes up with one runner on. South Amboy had learned. We walked Kipila. The next batter hit a pop fly to right that should have been the final out. Unfortunately, two runs were scored. South Amboy loses to Iselin 4-3. The team was bitter.Next up was the 15-year-old Junior Baseball (Babe Ruth) Middlesex County Freeholders Tournament. The coaches were James Beshada, Alan Pasztornyicky, and Michael Leonard. The players included Ned Faircloth, Pete Smith, Mark Thompson, James Shaw, Jimmy Beshada, Kevin Gorczyca, John Skarzynski, John McQuade, Jeff Pacansky, Carson Bloodgood, Mike Toth, Steve Martin, Joe Lewis, Billy Bright. The tournament was a grind. In the first game, South Amboy beat Edison's B team 8-6 and Mark Thompson picked up the win. This game was closer than it should have been. Next up, John Skarzynski picked up a dominant win with 4 and 2/3 innings pitched and Mark Thompson picked up the save with 2 and 1/3 innings. The formula was repeated with a 8-3 win over Colonia with Skeets throwing 5 innings and Mark saving the game with 2 innings. In the semi-final, against New Brunswick, Mark Thompson went 7 innings with 14K's and a 6-2 victory. The atmosphere of this game was intense. South Amboy was up 5-0 going into the 6th inning. A bad call led to a runner called safe and Mark lost his no-hitter. This shook the confidence and lead to two earned runs allowed. We recovered and closed out the game. The final was set: Edison A versus South Amboy. Edison was feeling confident given our underperformance versus Edison B. We were a bit disappointed that Iselin was not in the final.... A little more on that later. South Amboy lost the coin flip and went down 1-2-3 in the top of the first. Edison scored a run in the first and maintained the lead for 3 more innings. Joe DeSantis from Edison had a good fastball/ curveball combination. In the top of the 4th South Amboy scored a run and loaded the bases with one out. Mark Thompson was next up. Mark struck out leaving the bases loaded and two outs. Pete Smith stepped to the plate and lined a 2-run base hit up the middle for the lead. South Amboy was ahead for good. In the bottom of the 4th, Kevin Gorczyca was playing center and made an over the shoulder catch reminiscent of Willie Mays. In the 6th inning, Edison's pitchers could not find the plate and we scored 5 runs on walks. South Amboy completed a 9-1 victory and claimed the 15-year-old Middlesex County championship.At this point, the team members moved onto high school. The age group competition was sunset. The class year and high school selection prevails. Throughout this period, 1976-1981, Billy Bright, Kevin Gorczyca,

On June 9, 1984 Hoffman High School John Skarzynski, Pete Smith and Mark Thompson played nearly every game together. You might call these 5 guys South Amboy's own Fab Five. These five guys wound up as seniors on the 1984 Hoffman baseball team. The full team is shown in the picture. The team was coached by first year head coach George Krzyzanowski. Also, the assistant coach was Fred Henry who taught English. To finish up the acknowledgement of our nemesis, Iselin-Hoffman played Iselin again in 1983, our junior season. We lost as Skeets was exhausted from pitching the bulk of the innings that year. Mark Thompson sat out the year. In our senior year, we had Iselin scheduled. Iselin canceled the game. Hoffman took that as the ultimate atonement. Coming into the 1984 season, a News Tribune preview highlighted that Hoffman had won or shared in the Central Valley Conference title the preceding 6 years and claimed that the 1984 team was the best yet. Hoffman finished the season at (19-3). Hoffman entered the state tournament as the Central Valley Conference Champions. In the State Group 1 tournament, Hoffman had several byes based on an outstanding regular season record. Hoffman faced Metuchen and the dangerous hitter Adrian Farris. We won 3-0 on Mark Thompson's strong outing. Mark got Adrian to line out twice. Hoffman avoided the distraction of prom night. Hoffman moved on to the Central Jersey final and faced Bound Brook at North Brunswick. It was a tough outing where Skeets went 9 innings and we claimed a 4-3 win in extra innings. There were no pitch counts in those days. In this game, Billy Bright homered in the 5th. In the 9th, Billy doubled with one out and moved to third on Stan Zawacki's infield single. With two outs, Kevin Gorczyca singled home the winning run. Hoffman moved onto the State Semi final and faced Woodstown at Bordentown High School. This was a more comfortable 5-2 win, with Mark Thompson going the distance. Mark tossed a 3-hitter and homered. Randy Stratton and Pete Smith contributed RBI singles. This set up the final at Princeton.

State Championship Game

Hoffman faced Emerson Boro with Skeets on the mound. Emerson Borough was ranked 12th in the Star Ledger state rankings and finished 19th. Emerson finished the season (29-3) and won the State Championship in 1982 and six times all together. The game was tied 0-0 until the top of the 4th. With one out, Skeets drew a walk. Pete Smith blooped a single to right. Mark Thompson drove a double to right scoring two runs. Mark was caught at third trying to stretch a triple.

First 2 runs scored

In the top of the 6th, Pete Smith singled again, and moved to second on a throwing error. Pete advanced to third on a wild pitch, and scored on a passed ball to give Skeets a 3-0 lead heading into the bottom of the 6th. Skeets closed out the bottom of the 6th and 7th for a 3-0 victory.

Rob Ruskuski said, "I remember the tunes on the bus on road trips. Skeets had the boombox. What a great bunch of characters we had."


John Skarzynski said "it was the best team and best group of guys I ever played with"

If you were around "The Pleasant Little very hard to organize their players, students City" of South Amboy, NJ around 1989, you and others to solicit advertising and also probably heard of, or maybe even purchased a to actually sell the game throughout board game (Yes, board games were popular the community. First the "Weeblemeister "once again wishes all a great fishing year for 2024. The year ended with bay beach fishing for Striped Bass on the slow side. The best spot, if there is any, is Spy Harbor area near Belford. I checked Keansburg a few times and the people I spoke to did not even get a bite. The same for Cliffwood and Lawrence Harbor. I checked Perth Amboy at the Victory Bridge, I checked almost daily, but the results were much the same. Raritan Bay, other rivers, and bays are now closed for the winter months until March 1st for Striped Bass and Winter Flounder. It's a different story in the open ocean where fishing is open year-round. Strippers have been caught in the surf at Island Beach and LBI. Boaters are still catching them. Fishing should continue until winter storms disrupt things. Blackfishing is still good at the rocks at Barnegat Light. Party and charter boats are doing OK. There are fewer fish, but many are over 10 pounds. The largest I heard of was over 14 pounds. There have been Ling and very few Cod also caught. Later on, White Perch can be caught in Toms River and Barnegat Bay.

Fresh Water

There is no ice at all currently, so ice fishing is not feasible. Holdover Trout statewide are a possibility. The recent heavy rains will scatter and move the fish around. At the Round Valley Reservoir, fishing near the boat ramp is a good bet for shore fishing, otherwise fishing for Bass, Pickerel and Panfish will be slow because of wintry weather.




