Pallone Secures \$800,000 for South Amboy Ferry Terminal

Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) recently announced that he secured \$800,000 for South Amboy's ferry terminal in the Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation, and Housing and Urban Development spending bill. President Biden signed the underlying legislation into law last week.

The funding will help complete the ferry terminal, which serves as an important transportation hub for Central New Jersey

York City. The funding will be used for environmental remediation, the construction of waterfront bulkheads, a seawall, access roadways, curbing, sidewalks, parking, a pavilion, site lighting as well as water, sewer, gas, and electric infrastructure.

Spring finally is upon us. I hope all of you are enjoying the year's first days of pleasant weather and take comfort in knowing there is much more to come. Whether you are enjoying baseball season, the St. Patrick's Day Parade, or just a pleasant walk along the waterfront, there are few parallels to experiencing some fresh air and sunshine after a long winter. The early days of spring also are a holy time of year for people of many different faiths. To all who celebrate, whatever your faith, I wish you a happy and blessed season.

What you may not know is that spring also is a great time of year for civic engagement. Each April the City celebrates Government Week to foster public participation and education regarding municipal operations and affairs. The night will conclude with the announcement of the winners of our high school essay contest, followed by our regular council meeting. I am sure I speak for everyone in our local government in expressing my hope that we will see you there.



For all the anticipation of warm spring weather, I'm sure some of us are less enthused that spring also brings tax season. That said, I hope you will find some comfort in knowing that our City remains on the path of fiscal responsibility, while also providing a full slate of public services for our residents. Indeed, perhaps the City Council's single most important function is to approve a municipal budget. We have accomplished all of this while still enjoying a favorable bond rating-meaning that the City's credit and fiscal solvency remains in strong shape.

D.B.Kelly Pipes & Drums Continues Long-Standing Traditions (Story submitted)

an important role in the cultural and historical in Scotland. "Kilt" is a Scots word which history of many nations. The bagpipe has means to tuck up clothes around one's body. become synonymous with Scottish & Irish culture where they were often used as a means of communication during battles, to intimidate the enemy and motivate soldiers. In addition to their cultural significance, pipes and drums have a unique sound that sets them apart from other musical instruments.

Today, pipes and drums are often featured in parades, funerals, festivals, weddings and special occasions, adding an element of tradition and pride.

Dedicated to preserving this tradition of music celebration and remembrance, the

Col. D. B. Kelly Pipes & Drums of South Amboy, NJ. was founded in 2005 as a 501c3 Non-profit organization. Named in honor of Col. David B. Kelly, (1918 - 1979) a career New Jersey State Trooper and resident of South Amboy, who served as the head of the New Jersey State Police from 1965 to 1974, the band currently has 16 dedicated members.

Membership is open to individuals 10 years of age and older who are willing to make a large commitment of time & effort and in return receive the great rewards of travel and camaraderie. The band travels to New York and many other towns and cities throughout the East coast to participate in events, parades, and performances. Past performances include the South Amboy Annual St. Patrick's

Day Parade, the annual New York City NYC St. Patrick's Day Parade, the Savannah, Georgia St Patrick's Day parade and the Woodbridge Township, NJ St. Patrick's Day parade. Often, the band will volunteer their time post parades to visit local locations and play for their patrons.

The Col. D. B. Kelly Pipes & Drums consists of pipers playing the Great Highland bagpipe, snare drummers (often referred to as 'side drummers'), hopefully a tenor drummer and usually one, though occasionally two, bass drummers. The marching band is usually led by a large man or woman carrying what is traditionally called a"mace". The mace is used for transferring signals to the band as he reacts to situations that occur such as starting a set, stopping for slowdowns and whatever may effect playing conditions.

Weekly practices are held at the Ancient Order of Hibernians, 271 Second Street, South Amboy each Tuesday at 6 p.m. where the numerous trophies won by the band are on display. Interested individuals who would like to learn more about membership, cost and obligations are invited to stop in at practice sessions.

Band mates wear a Traditional Celtic Military uniform while wearing kilts of a tartan known as American Irish; a universal tartan designed for anyone to wear to celebrate Irish American heritage. Emerging during

The Pipes and Drums have long played the 16th century the origin of the kilt lies Originally, many kilts were a full-length piece of clothing, which could be worn as a cloak wrapped over the shoulder.

Members are asked to purchase their own kilt, but financial assistance is happily provided. The band provides most of the remainder of the uniform, including jacket, vest and sporran. The sporran is a small pouch made of leather or fur worn around the waist replacing pockets while hanging in the front part of the kilt. In response to the age-old question, "What do band mates wear under their kilts?", band manager Anne Marie Knittle replied, "Shoes and socks, otherwise they are called skirts!".

Performances by The Col. D. B. Kelly Pipes and Drums generally include traditional Irish and Scottish tunes played in sets usually composed of three tunes, a compilation of official fight songs of the U.S. Armed Forces and patriotic songs. The band follows the direction of the Pipe Major for the music and Drum Major for the march. The Drum Major's uniform is unique and may be more ornate than the other members of the band and are often a Military type of uniform. Since the D. B. Kelly Pipes and Drums is a civilian group their uniforms follow a less ornate dress code.

Pipe Major John McCarthy has been with the band since its inception and has been an integral part of its growth and high level of skill. Standing at 6'5" and a biscuit over 320 lbs, South Amboy resident George Fuller has been with the band since 2005 serving as Drum Major (DM) since 2008. His impressive height and dignified nature set him apart from other bands DM's, while his pride in his heritage, the band and our country are evident at each and every performance.

Band Manager Anne Marie Knittle has been with the band since 2007 and has witnessed firsthand the comradery, sense of family and commitment of the members. She explained, "The goal of The Col. D. B. Kelly Pipes & Drums has been to honor Irish tradition, keep the songs of Ireland and Scotland alive and proudly represent Col. D. B. Kelly, his family, his legacy, and the City of South Amboy. Nothing compares to our sense of pride when we see smiles from young and old or hear how our music has brought back memories and joy to individuals. This is what making our commitment to keeping this tradition alive is all about."

fire service reached a point of no return? The current membership of the volunteer fire service can no longer be sustained due to the lack of new recruits. The average age of a volunteer firefighter in the state is in the mid-50's, with many of them in their 60's and 70's. By the age of 55, most career firefighters have or are considering retiring. Volunteering for any organization has been on the decline for many years, not just in the fire service. The sociological fabric of our country has changed dramatically over the years. We see declining volunteers applying for membership in fraternal organizations, veteran's organizations, religious groups, EMS squads and many others in the area. This is what our society has become. The volunteer fire service in particular has declined in membership throughout the country by 25% since the 1990's. The concern I have is "what is being done to correct the situation?" We need to rebuild our ranks and infuse them with new volunteers willing to help their community. We also need to retain those members who are highly trained/skilled and are a valuable asset to the fire service. The burden of recruiting new members and retaining those we already have should not be placed on our current members. The resources and support must come from the top down. What has our governor done to initiate an incentive for volunteers? What have our state legislators done to increase funding and other programs to entice new members to join? And locally, what have the mayors, council members, county commissioners done to promote volunteerism? Do we have to wait for a disaster to strike before action is taken? Why is everyone reactive instead of being proactive? Throwing money at the problem of supplying equipment and supplies does no good if there is no one to man them. When additional manpower is needed for an incident, a mutual call is made for help from surrounding communities. Many times, this call goes unanswered due to lack of

By Ex-Chief Richard Kosmoski, BA., MS. Has the participation in the volunteer manpower. What happens in your community when there is no one to answer the call? The emergency situation, being medical or fire, only gets worse as time passes waiting for responders to arrive. And if they are delayed, or worse yet, no one responds, then what? Many a time when asking a new resident if they would like to join the volunteer fire department, the answer is usually, "how much do they pay?" Many of the fire departments in the county have gone to some type of career fire protection service due to the lack of volunteers. The writing is on the wall, sooner or later it will be necessary in your community. When it becomes necessary for a career fire department, who is going to inform the residents of the property tax increase necessary to support the department? The annual price tag would be similar to the amount of funding necessary to support the police department. Can the community afford that tremendous increase in property taxes? And if they cannot afford the increase? Something must be done now to recruit and retain our volunteers. Talk and promises do not get volunteers in our doors. Years ago, there were waiting lists to join the fire department, those days are history. Action must be taken by our community leaders NOW because the lights are slowly being turned off in the volunteer fire stations as there is no one there to keep them lit. How many times have ANY of your local elected officials attended a company/department meeting and asked, "how can we help you?" In my fifty active years in the fire service, I have NEVER seen this occur. Many of us senior members are in the twilight of our fire careers and looking for someone to fill our boots. As we look out the door for those new volunteers, we see NONE.

In Memory Of A Trailblazer Guitarist Eddie "Whitey" Dill By Roger Johnson and Clem Skarzynski

a vast array of unbelievable musical talent precedes itself. I remember, as a young, "beginning" guitarist, seeing members of the Dill family, playing in local bands at the "block dances," behind the Hoffman High School, and turning my attentions to the guitarists on stage, brothers LeRoy and Eddie Dill..Leroy, being a "smooth" jazz type guitarist, and Eddie more of the "Fast Rock 'n' Roll style of play, and hearing "Eddie tear into a searing solo for the first time! Talk about "realization and incentive" hitting you in the face all at once! Realization, damn I'm nowhere near that caliber of musical ability, and Incentive, I gotta listen to this guy if I wanna get anywhere near that level. That's how and when I first saw and met Eddie Dill. And along the way, I got to see Eddie master the guitar in ways I just couldn't comprehend. "Playing the Guitar with HIS FEET"! And his "signature behind the back of the head" technique, which he saved for the "closing number at every show"! My first "real guitar lessons were coming at me full speed!" "Go home and try that"was Eddie's "advice"". And how fate plays a big part in a musician's life. Eddie would join the area's first Garage/ Basement Band, based in Morgan, N.J. The Iconic "Roger Johnson and The Hubcaps" in 1964. The "Caps" needed to have a bass player, so Roger got in touch with Eddie and asked him to join, and "switch guitar and bass duties with founding member Darryl James. Eddie was hesitant, because of his love for the guitar, but came on board to help Roger

When the Dill Family Name is mentioned, achieve the sound he was looking for. Eddie stayed with Roger for a year before leaving to become a member of "Megaton." Roger and Eddie were friends since the mid/late 50s when Eddie and his brother Le Roy Dill were doing a "Duo Act" in the South Amboy bars playing mostly Country music! So their friendship was sealed, as Roger could count on Eddie for whatever was needed in the group. As per Roger's thoughts. "Eddie was always there for ANYONE who needed help in any way. Ed would give you the shirt off his back if you needed it, the salt of the earth. No matter what problems Eddie was having, yours were more important to take care of, and as I, the writer, got to know Ed better, he came across as such a "humble person." Another "dream of mine came true" when after I sponsored the 1998 "Rock 'n' Roll Reunion Benefit, Roger Johnson took me on as an "honorary member and full time guitarist with "the Hubcaps." There I was alongside the "Master" sharing "licks and solos, playin Rock 'n'Roll Music. ALWAYS awaiting the "Nod" from Ed to jump in with the "licks" I've learned from his technique! And as mentioned previously, another Dill family member was also a member of the 'Caps." Ed's nephew Frankie Dill, who is BEYOND a MASTER of multiple musical instruments, on the drums! I'm still trying to figure out how that happened! Me onstage with Eddie Dill, Frankie Dill, Roger Johnson, and Frankie Joisne, the guys I used to sneak into high school dances and clubs to listen to, and learn! What an honor! Eddie was such a perfect guitarist to be a part of the band. He "cut his teeth" on this Rock 'n' Roll from the 50s! Note for note, Eddie had it down! Eddie was such a humble man and guitarist. He was a member of the longest running local band "Megaton," who dominated the Rt.35 strip music scene, and beyond from the mid 60s thru the 90s and beyond! Musicians like him, and the entire Dill Family, along with the entire "Hubcaps" lineup, were truly the "Trailblazers" for local rock 'n' roll musicians and forming a band! My sincerest thanks go out to Eddie and Roger Johnson, for thinking this kid {the writer) could easily share the stage with them, and their groundbreaking music styles from the 50's, when it all started! Special special thanks to Roger Johnson for coming on board for this month's column with his memories and thoughts of his "best friend" in music and everyday life, Eddie"Whitey" Dill. It's still slow from the Raritan Bay shore. Recent heavy rain runoff doesn't help, however back bay areas in back of LBI have produced a few Bass to our south. Some White Perch are also there and at Toms River too. Fluke regulations are also in place with a return to 3 fish at 13 inches with a longer season from May 4th to September 25th as per the cut mandated by the feds. Party boats are catching Blackfish, some Ling and a few Cod and Pollock. One party boat ran into a school of Pollock and everyone did very well one time. Special trips to far out waters have been producing some Pollock. Not much word on Winter Flounder but Shark River would be a likely spot to try. The latest word I have is that some Stripers were caught at Ideal Beach.

As of now rivers and streams are closed and spring Trout stocking will start. Opening day is Saturday April 8th at 8AM. With warm weather approaching, lakes in the south and central portions of the state are producing some Largemouth Bass, Pickerel and Panfish. Walleyes are in the Delaware River and the first Shad will show up anytime soon.

Pallone Secures Nearly \$1 Million for Sewer **Pump Station in Sayreville**

Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06), recently announced that he secured \$959,752 for a sewer pump station in Sayreville in the Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation, and Housing and Urban Development spending bill. President Biden signed the underlying legislation into law last week.

The funding will be used for the reconstruction of the sanitary sewer pumping station in the Melrose section of the Borough. The proposed facility would eliminate the potential for operational failure during future flood events and the associated health and safety issues that result from wastewater overflows. The station suffered significant damage from Superstorm Sandy, and more recent flooding events exposed the risk the station faces without upgrades.
