Ground-up project to bring Class A warehouse space to redevelopment zone

Joseph Jingoli & Son, Inc. (Jingoli) held a groundbreaking ceremony today at 111 Main Street in South Amboy, New Jersey. Located in the Broadway/Main Street redevelopment zone, the site spans 22 acres and will comprise 152,100 square feet of Class A warehouse space at completion.

"The development at 111 Main Street will benefit South Amboy both economically and socially for years to come," said South Amboy Mayor, Fred Henry. "We're thankful to have Woodmont and Jingoli involved in the revitalization of this area of the City. We look forward to the redevelopment generating quality union jobs and providing necessary environmental restoration to the site."

In addition to ample square footage, the development will include 22 dock doors, with several key acquisitions in the most active an additional 22 knock-out doors available if desired by a tenant; abundant trailer and car parking; and a 36' clear height.

"It's been a pleasure working with the City of South Amboy, which continues to demonstrate the importance of a forward-thinking municipal government that understands market trends and economic development. Woodmont shares the City's vision for the project as well as the importance of local redevelopment," said Stephen Santola, Executive Vice President

Woodmont Industrial Partners (WIP) and of Woodmont Properties. "We look forward to the completion of 111 Main Street as well as our ongoing expansion in New Jersey and beyond."

> 'South Amboy offers employers an appealing Central New Jersey location, less than 10 minutes from several main thoroughfares," said Anthony Amadeo, Vice President of WIP. "With the construction of 111 Main Street, we're able to capitalize on this prime location and bring high-quality industrial space to an area that is experiencing unprecedented demand for the asset class.'

> WIP and Jingoli joined forces several years ago to develop the property. In late 2021, the South Amboy Planning Board unanimously approved the project.

> Over the past year, WIP has executed industrial growth markets in the country, adding approximately 8 million square feet to its portfolio. The team breaks ground on projects in South Brunswick and Woodbridge, New Jersey this summer. In early 2022, WIP also acquired 2401 West Emmaus Avenue in Allentown, Pennsylvania consisting of a 91,350-square-foot building on 13.75 acres, with plans to reposition the site into a stateof-the-art Class A facility that will meet the Lehigh Valley market's demand for industrial space as vacancies hit a record low.

From checking the newspaper ads available under Archives on the dowdell. org site, via the old Citizen, the now defunct Foodtown was advertising Sirloin Tip Roasts, Shoulder Roasts and Boneless Chuck Roasts all for \$1.67 per lb, Top Roasts, \$1.87, Rump Roasts and Eye Round Roasts for \$1.99 per lb., Polska Kielbasy 16 oz. \$1.99, Soup Chickens 69 cents per lb. Deli sliced Boiled Ham \$1.99 per lb. Sold by the pound: Chicken thighs \$.89, Chicken drumsticks \$.99, and Pork loin \$1.39. From the same flour for 79 cents, a 16 oz box of spaghetti for \$.39, a 5 lb. bag of Baking potatoes \$.89, Cottage cheese 16 oz. for \$.99, and a whopping FIVE cents for a can of Campbell's Chicken noodle soup!

In 1982, while Ronald Reagan was in the White House, the top news story was the UK's Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher, sending warships to stop the unrest in the Falkland Islands without a moment's hesitation. Another headliner was Monaco's Princess Grace losing her life when the car she was driving in Monte Carlo plunged off a cliff when going around a sharp curve. 



The Smoke Column BY Ex-Chief Richard Kosmoski, BA., MS.

In my February, 2022, Smoke Column am with the cause of the fire. It is just awful dwelling, it should be placed in a bathtub article, I had discussed the dangers of Lithium-Ion Batteries (LIB's). I tried to impress to my readers the hazards that these batteries pose. Due to the many recent deadly and serious fires involving LIB's, I feel that additional information should be provided to our first responders. Many of our local firefighters have yet to respond to one of these fires. It is only a matter of time before they encounter a LIB fire and it is essential that they know in advance the procedures necessary in attacking this type of fire/explosion. LIB fires are not like any other type of burning material fires. As I draft this article, I am aware of the death of a FDNY Firefighter who died in a fire on April 24, 2022. Brother Firefighter, Timothy Kline, died in the Line-of-Duty while fighting a fire in a residential structure in Brooklyn. Firefighter Kline was the nozzleman on his crew when the evacuation signal was sounded for a possible building collapse. Unfortunately, as he and his crew attempted to evacuate, Firefighter Kline was trapped in the collapse and died as a result. RIP Firefighter Timothy Kline! Besides his death, a civilian also died in the fire and 10 other FDNY Firefighters were injured. I am

not concerned with the intensity of the fire or

how severely the structure was damaged as I


that Firefighter Kline had to lose his life in another fire that was caused by LIB's. I cannot emphasize enough the dangers that LIB's cause and that the users of these LIB's need to be made aware of those dangers. Just because a product is on the market, does not always mean it is safe. Science and Technology has developed these LIB's and BUT they may not be safe in all situations. They serve a function, have a purpose, and are efficient in the devices they are designed to be used in. It is when they malfunction that a serious and dangerous situation occurs. Refer to my February,2022 Smoke Column for a list of some of the devices that use LIB's. You can expand on that list by going to the internet. You would be very surprised by the amount of devices that contain LIB's.

For our Firefighters, below are some of the "Tips from Training" that the FDNY has presented to their Firefighters when dealing with LIB's and the dangers/hazards they present. If you must move a LIB, use a non-conductive tool, a shovel with a wooden handle, or any other method that does not require carrying the LIB in your hands. If the fire involves a mobility device (scooter, E-Bike, skateboard, hoverboard, etc.) and the device can be safely moved inside a





with all the cells fully submerged in water. If batteries, that are small enough, are involved in a fire, they can be submerged in water filled containers. The idea is to extinguish the fire and/or prevent a fire from occurring. If it is impossible to remove the burned device from the structure, safely move it to a non-combustible area and protect it and the surrounding area with a charged hoseline. When using a handline to extinguish a LIB fire, it will be necessary to use copious amounts of water to extinguish the fire and keep the LIB's cool. Continually apply water to the device until conditions are dormant and no more flames or smoke are being released from the LIB's. If the LIB's have exploded, it is possible that loose cells may be strewn across the explosive area. Be careful as these tossed batteries may also explode and catch fire due to any heat or fire they may have been exposed to. Fire departments should have adopted procedures dealing with LIB fires BEFORE they are encountered. Be prepared, be safe!

In addition to the beachfront location the







Spring into a Healthy **Exercise Program**





Salt Water

Striped Bass continues to be caught in Perth Amboy near the Victory Bridge. I saw one nice keeper about 30 inches taken there. Shore fishing is improving in Raritan Bay at Cliffwood beach. I saw another nice keeper caught there and other anglers were missing bites. All of this could change as Bluefish have invaded the Manasquan River and south Jersey surf and bay areas. Some Blues are big, up to 8 pounds and they can show up at any time. With Fluke season now open more keeper Fluke with the liberal regulations of 2 fish at 17 inches allowed are available. The 3rd fish of the bag limit must be 18 inches. Barnegat Bay and Great Bay are the best spots now. Some Fluke have been caught at Shark River and they should start soon at Sandy Hook. Party boat fishing is still some Ling, a few cod, Blackfish and the first Sea Bass. Regulations on Sea Bass are stricter with 2 fish at certain times and ten fish at other times. Later on, in the season, more keepers will be allowed. In the LBI surf Striped Bass, Bluefish and a few Black Drum can be found as well as Flounder in the Shark River.

Fresh Water

High water conditions continue with heavy rainfall feeding our rivers and streams. The main Raritan off of RT 287 has been very high as are most upstate streams. I gave it a try one afternoon a few days after opening day at the North Branch in Far Hills. I found high water conditions but did manage to catch an average size Trout. Shad are in the Delaware River which remains high. The Lewis Brothers were not able to drop their nets as debris from the high water was a hindrance.

Radio and Television Yesterday By John "Flip" Phillips

Part 2 Television


The first time I remember watching sing the weekly hits. Russell Arms, Gisele television was 1947. My neighbor and friend Frankie "Tank" Leonard and I watched the World Series between the Yankees and Dodgers at his Aunt's house on lower David Street on an 8-inch television. Yes, 8 inches! We got to see South Amboy's Allie Clark who played for the Yankees pinch hit for Yogi Berra. Maybe the only time Yogi was ever pinch hit for. Television started to appear in more and more city homes as we moved into the early 1950s. In South Amboy a lot of families purchased their TV from Frank's Radio and Television on Broadway. There you could buy a TV on-time for monthly payments. A TV could cost hundreds of dollars depending on the size of the screen. A 12-inch screen would cost around \$150 to \$200 and consoles with bigger screens up to \$500 Soon along came a combination: Television, Radio and Record Player all in one unit, really a piece of furniture and a lot more expensive. Our first TV was a Philco 12-inch screen, and it came with Rabbit Ears. (remember them?) My brother Joey (Pinger) and I would take turns "playing" with the darn thing trying to improve the picture. For an additional \$50 dollars Frank's Radio and TV would install an antenna on the roof. The brands I remember were Admiral, RCA, GE, Zenith, Philco, Dumont, Sylvania, Westinghouse and Fada. Today the best sellers are Samsung, Sharp, LC, and Sony. The only TV made in America is Vizio! And there are more but I think these are the most popular.

Like radio we had a lot of programs to choose from. Here are some of the ones I remembered. I bet you can add a few.

The Colgate Comedy Hour- Every Sunday night at 8 O'clock we got to watch some of the best performers of our time: Bob

Hope, Martin & Lewes, Jimmy Durante, Eddie Cantor, Abbot and Costello and more.

h e Honeymooners I would run home early on Saturday evening to watch my favorite TV show starring



I Love Lucy One of the most popular TV series ever! Lucy, and husband Desi Arnez along with neighbors Ethel and Fred Mertz were always involved in something funny, usually started by Lucy.

Gunsmoke Marshall Dillon, Kitty and deputy Chester moved from radio to television.

The Red Skelton Show Also moved from radio to TV and became a very popular comedy show. One of my favorite characters was Freddie The Freeloader.



The Milton Berle Show Uncle Milte became known as Mr. Television as the Texaco Star Theatre topped the ratings year after year. The show had a South Amboy connection as one of the weekly characters was Marco Marcella who lived on Catherine Street. When Uncle Milte called for make-up, Marco would run on to the stage and hit him in the face with a large powder puff.

Your Lucky Strike Hit Parade On Saturday night you could see and listen to Snooky Lanson, and Dorothy Collins

Mackenzie, June Valli and Johnny Desmond were added as the show went from a half hour to one hour. A few #1s from the 50s you might remember: If Perry Como 1951, R&R Waltz Kay Starr 1955, Because of You Tony Bennett 1951, Too Young Nat "King" Cole 1951, Cry Johnnie Ray 1951, Heartbreak Hotel Elvis 1956 and Cold Cold Heart Tony Bennett 1951. To name just a few.

The Nightly News Ralph Edwards, John Cameron Swayze, and the Huntley-Brinkley Report told us what was happening in the world. And Carol Reed the weather girl told us if it was going to rain, snow or be nice tomorrow.

Arthur Godfrey Talent Scouts Every Monday night we got to see up and coming entertainers. A few notables included Tony Bennett, Patsy Cline and Bat Boone. A few notable rejects included Buddy Holly, The 4 Freshmen, and surprise... Elvis Presley! (Remember Julius LaRosa? Godfrey "fired" him while on the air!)

Howdy Doody Every day at 5 O'clock it was Howdy Doody Time...who could forget Howdy, Buffalo Bob, Clarabelle and Mr. Bluster doing their "thing" making kids in the studio and those watching TV laugh. Probably one of the most watched children shows ever.

American Bandstand Every day after school Philadelphia teens danced to the top 40s, and guests performed their hit songs. The Coasters, Freddy "Boom, Boom" Cannon, Danny and the Juniors, Connie Francis, Bobby Darin- the list goes on. Hosted by Dick Clark

The Early and Late Show Black and white movies primarily from the 40s. The early show 5:30? And the Late show after the 11pm news.

Sports

PRO Baseball, Football , Hockey, Basketball The Yankees and Giants were on WPIX Channel 11, and the Dodgers were on WOR Channel 9. The New York Rangers Hockey games were also on WOR. The Knicks were on WPIX. The football Giants away games were on CBS Channel 2, their home games were on radio only until the home game TV black out was lifted by the NFL.

College Basketball WPIX televised local teams from Madison Square Garden. Including St Johns, NYU (New York



University) CCNY (City College New York) and LIU (Long Island University). WPIX also televised the Holiday Festival in December and the NIT (National Invitational Tournament) in March. Newark's channel 13 televised Seton Hall. A lot of basketball was on TV, and that was OK with me!

Pallone Statement on Suspected **Woodbridge Cancer** Cluster

Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) issued the following statement on the suspected cancer cluster in Woodbridge, New Jersey: "The questions raised by local advocates and families require serious scrutiny from health and environmental experts, which is exactly why I personally convened state and federal agencies on April 4 and asked them to investigate these serious concerns. So far, the experts have provided the community with important scientific consultation, but I still have not seen enough

"The community is lucky to have Mayor John McCormac who refused to wait and instead pressed ahead with his own environmental reviews. My understanding is that those results will be ready later this month, which will help guide our next steps.

"We still need environmental research to see if there is evidence for concern. We also need to verify reported cancer cases and determining based on the specific timing, type, and frequency if they are statistically higher than normal rates. "That's why I have called on the state to take two very specific actions. First, I've asked the Department of Environmental Protection to show its commitment to the community and its concerns by reimbursing Woodbridge for the cost of the environmental studies and by taking over any subsequent tests if they are necessary in the future. "Second, I have asked the New Jersey Department of Health to create a process to collect and verify the cases so health experts can complete a scientific evaluation. There's a reason the state has a cancer registry and epidemiologists. It is my understanding that the state has agreed to work with Mayor McCormac to create a portal to collect the necessary information.

"In addition, federal agencies have committed their full support should the state request their assistance.

Coughlin, Lampitt & Jasey "Working Class Families' Anti-Hunger Act" Advanced by **Committee**

Designed to expand student eligibility of financial uncertainty and helps to ensure for free school meals, the Assembly Appropriations Committee on Thursday advanced legislation putting New Jersey on course toward universal school breakfast and lunch. Sponsored by Assembly Speaker Craig J. Coughlin, Assemblywoman Pamela Lampitt, and Assemblywoman Mila Jasey, another 26,463 K-12 students stand to benefit from the "Working Class Families' Anti-Hunger Act" (A-2368).

"This bill is critical to meeting the needs of many working families and puts us on a direct path to feeding breakfast and lunch to every child who needs it," said Coughlin (D-Middlesex). "Exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, many New Jersey residents experienced unemployment and faced food insecurity as a result. Many are still struggling to keep up with bills, which means helping keep money in people's pockets while ensuring their most basic needs are met has never been more important."

Families with an annual household income of up to 200 percent the Federal Poverty Level (FPL), raised above the current eligibility of 185 percent of FPL, would benefit from free of charge breakfast and lunch at school under the bill. For a New Jersey family of four with two kids in school that could amount to \$240 or 22 percent in savings on their monthly food bill, according to ALICE estimates of a minimal family food budget that is around \$1,000 a month.

"Ensuring children have access to proper nutrition is critical not only to their overall health, but also their academic success," said Lampitt (D-Camden, Burlington). "As many working families continue to feel the financial toll of the COVID-19 pandemic, it can be difficult at times to put food on the table. By expanding eligibility for free breakfast and lunch programs, this legislation provides families with the support they need in times

that no student is forced to go hungry."

Importantly, the bill also seeks to address hunger among students in potentially more affluent communities. It does that by expanding the number of school districts in New Jersey serving school lunch and breakfast with changes to school meal program participation thresholds, which would require schools to offer breakfast if ten percent of the student population is income eligible and to offer lunch if five percent of students are eligible.

"Ensuring they have a healthy start in the morning and are nourished throughout the school day sets our children up for academic success," said Jasey (D-Essex, Morris). "By expanding the requirements for these free school meal programs, we can reach more children around the state and assist more families in their time of need."

The legislation would require the State to provide funding to each school district, as needed to reimburse the costs of providing free meals to middle-income students who are federally ineligible under the National School Lunch Program or federal School Breakfast Program. This would amount to an annual cost of \$19.4 million to the State.

This measure is part of a larger legislative package put forward to combat hunger and expand programs for working-class families, seniors, and disabled residents.



Middlesex College Awarded 2022 ACLS Sustaining Public **Engagement Grant**

Grant Made Possible by Support from the National Endowment for the Humanities Supports Outstanding Publicly Engaged **Humanities Programs**

Middlesex College has received an American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS) Sustaining Public Engagement Grant, as part of a \$3.5 million funding program made possible by the National Endowment for the Humanities' (NEH) Sustaining the Humanities through the American Rescue Plan (SHARP) initiative.

Middlesex College has been awarded \$148,400 for "Breaking Barriers: Humanities Discourse within Carceral Settings," which will repair the disruptions caused by the pandemic across two detention centers located in New Jersey through comprehensive humanities programming centered on an inside-out learning model. In turn, this will also revitalize interest in the humanities for current College students while bridging the gap between traditional college students, faculty members, and detained and incarcerated youth.

The members of the principal project team are Dr. Alexandra Fields, professor of English, and Senem Kaptan, program manager, Center for Justice-Impacted Students at the College.

'Before the pandemic began, our Middlesex College students and Juvenile Detention Center residents shared how much they loved engaging in English Composition classes together, and through these funds, we can now bring that opportunity back to detention center residents and traditional Middlesex College students," Dr. Fields said.

Middlesex College is one of 24 grantees, representing outstanding public programs based at a variety of public and private institutions from 18 states and Puerto Rico. Awarded programs have demonstrated a in contributing to solutions for a brighter deep commitment to the co-creation of knowledge with diverse communities outside of academia and promising approaches to appropriated supplemental funding to the addressing the most pressing issues society faces today.

"The National Endowment for the Humanities is grateful to the American Council of Learned Societies for administering American Rescue Plan funding to speed economic recovery within the higher education sector," said NEH Chair Shelly C. Lowe. "Our colleges and universities are important centers for public humanities, with immense potential to serve their communities through educational resources and public programs that reach broad audiences. These ARP awards will expand public access to new information and discoveries in the humanities, and foster greater collaboration between academic institutions and community partners."

ACLS President Joy Connolly said the organization is proud to support these examples of publicly engaged, communitycentered scholarship.

"Direct engagement with communities beyond the walls of academia is essential to the continued creation of knowledge for the public good," she said. "At the same time, these programs will help in expanding our definitions of humanistic scholarship and future for all."


