

So. Amboy Approves Warehouse Project

The South Amboy Planning Board has unanimously approved a new warehouse facility at 111 Main Street in the City. Woodmont properties is slated to construct a 152,000 square foot warehouse distribution facility on 22 acres in the Broadway/Main Street redevelopment zone.

Founded in 1963 and based in Fairfield, NJ, Woodmont Properties is one of the region's leading developers of residential and commercial real estate. No stranger to SouthAmboy, Woodmont opened Woodmont Cove, a residential development, in 2017.

When asked for comment Woodmont Executive Vice President Stephen Santolasaid, "South Amboy understands redevelopment like few other towns in New Jersey. They have a vision and negotiate fairly and firmly to see that vision come to light. It is always a pleasure to work with a municipality that follows through on its commitments and expects the redeveloper to do the same."

In the past few years South Amboy has been experiencing intense interest from commercial and residential developers due to its close proximity to major highways and its location on the shores of the Raritan Bay.

"This project will be constructed with union labor and will bring additional jobs to the City. It will also provide environmental remediation to a brownfield site and add another piece to the revitalization of our

How to vote in the 2021 General Election Middlesex County provides easy voting methods, including voting in-person and voting early, mailing ballots through the USPS, or dropping a ballot in a secure drop box in over 30 locations countywide

Residents will have many options for casting their votes in the 2021 General Election, including: mailing ballots through the USPS or dropping a ballot in a secure drop box, voting in-person early, or on Election Day, Tuesday, November 2, 2021.

The County has created a convenient, easy to use resource to learn about how Middlesexcountynj.gov/vote.

"Middlesex County is making voting as convenient for our voters as possible. This year, we are expanding the ways in which voters can cast their ballot with the addition of ten early voting locations throughout the County," said Middlesex County Clerk Nancy J. Pinkin. "Voting is the cornerstone of our democracy and a vital, all-important tool we as Americans use to shape our communities." There are three ways to vote in the 2021 **General Election:**

- Vote by Mail with a Mail-in Ballot
- In person Early Voting October 23 October 31
- In person on Election Day November 2 VOTE BY MAIL

Registered voters who wish to vote from the on "Early Voting". comfort of their home can submit a mail-in ballot request in writing by filling out a Mailin Ballot Application found on the Middlesex County website. A personal signature is required. The County Clerk's office must receive Vote by Mail Applications by mail by Tuesday, October 26. Voters may apply for a Mail-in Ballot in person or by authorized messenger at the Office of the County Clerk in New Brunswick up to 3 pm the day before machine is designed to be easy to use by the election (Monday, November 1).

Your Vote Counts!

A list of drop box locations located in every municipality throughout the County can be found on the County's website here. Drop boxes are maintained by the Middlesex County Board of Elections, are secure, and monitored by video surveillance. Ballots are collected from drop boxes on a regular basis. Mail-in Ballots for the General Election began being sent to voters on September 18. If you do not receive your ballot, you can request a replacement ballot from the County Clerk's office by calling 732-745-4202 or by sending a replacement ballot request form.

IN-PERSON EARLY VOTING

to vote in the General Election, found at Newtothis election, the County is enabling all registered voters to cast their ballot in-person, using a voting machine, during a nine-day period prior to Election Day at any of the early voting locations within Middlesex County. Voters can now choose to vote, in-person, when it's most convenient for their schedule. In-person early voting locations will be open Saturday, October 23 through Sunday, October 31. Hours will be Monday-Saturday, 10 am - 8 pm and Sunday, 10 am - 6 pm. No appointment is necessary.



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I WAS A SAILOR ONCE

with salt spray and ocean wind in my face, the ship beneath me feeling like a living thing as she drove swiftly through the sea. I liked the sounds of the Navy-the shrill boatswain's pipe, the ship's bell on the quarterdeck, the I liked quiet mid-watches with the aroma harsh squawk of the 1MC, and the strong language and laughter of the sailors. I liked Navy vessels: fast destroyers, plodding fleet auxiliaries and amphibs, sleek submarines and steady solid aircraft carriers. I liked the proud names of Navy ships: Midway, Lexington, Saratoga, Coral Sea, Antietam, Valley Forge...memorials of great battles won and tribulations overcome. I liked the lean angular names of Navy ``tin-cans' ': Lawrence, Adams, King, Ricketts: and escorts; Dewey, Farragut, Law, McCloy momentos of heroes who went before us. And the others, San Jose, San Diego, Los Angeles, St. Paul, Chicago all named for our cities. I liked the tempo of a Navy band blaring through the topside speakers as we stood out to sea. I liked Liberty Call and the spicy scent of a foreign port. I even liked the all-hands working parties as my ship filled herself with stores, ammunition, and fuel in order to cut ties to the land and carry out her mission anywhere on the globe. I liked sailors from all parts of the land. We trusted and depended on each other for competence, comradeship, strength and courage. They were "shipmates" for then and forever. I liked the surge of adventure in my heart, when the word was passed: "Now set the special sea and anchor detail—all hands to quarters for leaving port."I liked the thrill of visiting home again, with the waving hands of welcome from family and friends waiting on the pier side. The work was hard and dangerous, the going rough at times; the parting from loved ones painful, but the companionship of robust Navy laughter, the "all for one and one for all" philosophy of the sea was ever present. I liked the serenity of the sea after a day of DO IT AGAIN." hard ship's work, as flying fish flitted across the wave tops and sunset gave way to night. I liked the feel of the Navy in darkness-the mast head and range lights, the red and green navigation lights and stern light, the pulsating phosphorescence of radar repeaters-they cut

I liked standing on the bridge at sunrise through the dusk and joined with the mirror of stars overhead. And I liked drifting off to sleep lulled by the myriad of noises that told me that my ship was well, and that my shipmates on watch would keep me safe. of strong coffee; the lifeblood of the Navy permeating everywhere. And I liked the hectic watches when the exact minute of haze-gray shapes racing at flank speed kept all hands o a razor edge of alertness. I liked the sudden cry of "General quarters, general quarters, all hands man your battle stations," followed by the clamor of running feet on ladders and the resounding thump of watertight doors as the ship transformed herself in a few seconds from a peaceful workplace to a weapon of war ready for anything. And I liked the sight of space-age equipment manned by youngsters clad in dungarees and sound-powered phones that their grandfathers would still recognize. I liked the traditions of the Navy and those who made them. I liked the proud names of Navy heroes: Halsey, Nimitz, Perry, Farragut, John Paul Jones, and Burke. A sailor could find much in the Navy: comrades-in-arms, pride in self and country, mastery of the seaman's trade. In years to come, when sailors are home from the sea, they will still remember with fondness and respect the ocean in all its moods-the impossible shimmering mirror calm or the storm-tossed green water surging over the bow. And then there will come again a faint whiff of stack gas, a faint echo of engine and rudder orders, a vision of the bright bunting of signal flags snapping at the yardarm, a refrain of hearty laughter in the wardroom and chief's quarters and mess decks. Gone ashore for good they will grow wistful about their Navy days, when the seas belonged to them and a new port of call was ever over the horizon. Remembering this, they will stand taller and they will say, "I WAS A SAILOR ONCE AND I WOULD



He was the "beat" of the "Morgan Mob" of musicians...Mr. Santo "Sammy" Cavallaro. His drumming expertise was in demand in our area and beyond from the early 60's, thru the 90's. I hooked up with Sammy in high school, along with Morgan's premier tenor saxman, Jerry "Mokes" Mokar. As all of us rocker "Wannabees" wandered and roamed from band to band through our school years, we developed a camaraderie unequaled.

In my senior year, I was asked to join up with the 3rd edition of Sayreville's top group, The Elegants, as they also needed a drummer...Sammy was the pick. This began a true friendship between him and I. How I remember riding around in Sammy's '58 Chevy that burned so much oil, that he had a case of oil in quarts to stop every so many miles, and dump into the empty crankcasethat was my job.

My most cherished memory with Sam was when we took the '58 Chevy all the way to Asbury Park Convention Hall to see "Paul Revere and The Raiders" in concert! My first ever concert! We had a blast...oh yeah...our mascot was the infamous "Rubber Chicken" which held high esteem on the '58's antenna! We worked together with The Elegants at "The Cave" and numerous Rutgers Frat parties. (I won't get into that here in this family newspaper), through the late '60's. Then we went our "ways," working with new musicians to hone our 'crafts." In 1996, I began to organize the '98 Rock 'n' Roll Reunion, a fundraiser for the new Morgan First Aid building on Rt. 35 North. I remember how happy I felt seeing my son and his three friends building what was supposed to look like a coffin on our patio. They were all 14 years old, an age when boys are still children but teetering on manhood. He and his friends had felt they were too old to go trick or treating, so they came up with an idea how to celebrate Halloween, one of the most exciting times of the year, even beating out Christmas for many kids back then. So, they decided to dress like monks wearing hoods attached to robes, 3 wearing black, and one in white who would walk in front of the casket. Sewing most of my life, I somehow made the three black robes without a pattern during one weekend. I remember, too, how I had decorated the front of my house, including the garage windows, with hand drawn maple leaves using colored construction paper. For adults around my age, Halloween was "in our blood"....all the happy memories of Halloween bags filled with those big Hershey Bars, and, boy, were they big, still filling our heads. Then, it happened. Somehow hearing weirdos were planning to insert razor blades into apples and anything else their twisted minds could do to harm children, the Borough of Sayreville called off Halloween. The year was 1983, a year, which literally began spoiling Halloween for the years to come. Halloween has never been the same all because of truly evil people.

Growing up in Mechanicsville, on the "other side of the hole in the wall," the mostly forgotten side, was at a time when NOTHING was on the long walk to town, absolutely nothing. So, we did our trick or treating house to house without any adults along with all the other kids. Nancy Newcomb Schade, and I were only in third grade when we went out by ourselves. The unbreakable "rule" was to be home by 8 o'clock. Another "rule" was not to go into Melrose. Of course, we had ignored both.


After WWII and later the Korean War, there just wasn't just a baby boom....there was a baby explosion. Seemed like most women of child bearing age were pregnant.... and continued getting pregnant. Soon, little Mechanicsville, with its three and a half streets, was literally overflowing with kids. When I was small, no child ever went out to trick or treat during daylight. Only at the


onset of darkness did all of us kids run out the door with our bags to get the most candy we could. Chocolate is what we had wanted. After that first year, we bypassed the houses which gave out only bags of homemade popcorn or apples. Pennies were okay as just one cent could buy loose candy, sometimes even two pieces, after we had eaten all the chocolate bars. For "energy," Nance and I would begin eating them as we hurriedly made our rounds.

In the '50's, guys who had fought in WWII and the Korean War, sometimes both wars, had come home to an abundance of jobs, usually jobs working in factories like National Lead, DuPont's, and Hercules. There was no leisure time for them. Back to work they all went as if the wars hadn't happened. How they were psychologically able to do that after all they had gone through is astounding. As for all the white collar jobs, they had been mostly dependent upon getting business from the factory workers. So, really everyone "was in the same boat" especially in the small towns of South Amboy and Sayreville, just like it had been across the country.

The 1950s was a decade of plenty. Weekly paychecks enabled families to make large purchases like cars, television sets, wringer washer machines, and refrigerators ending the use of the pain in the neck ice boxes. Commercials on the new television sets had shown adults all they could buy, while tempting kids with commercials for everything a child would want. Watching them, I remember how the Chiquita Banana and Bosco commercials made me want to put bananas in my cereal and drink as much chocolate milk made with Bosco as I could. All the old-time cowboy shows like Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, and Hopalong Cassidy had a huge effect on our young minds too.

Halloween of years gone by. Living now in an adult community, instead of kids coming to trick or treat, I go to my neighbors to hand them quart sized, Ziplock bags filled with chocolate, always leaving a bag in my mailbox for the "mail person" who delivers the mail that day. People really don't change with age, I have discovered. Halloween will always remain my favorite "holiday" of all. Happy Halloween to you all !!!



country. Sayreville and South Amboy have "many" veterans. I am sure they remember the day they raised their right hand and their life honoring that pledge, to them so much is owed. Those that served and were honorably separated from the military became "Veterans". This article is about that Oath:

History

It was first given to new Colonial Army volunteers during the Revolutionary War. The first bill of the first Constitutional Congress signed on June 1, 1789, was to officially document the oath for both enlisted and officer personnel. Over the years the oath changed to reflect current events and times. For example, prior to 1862 both officers and enlisted personnel took the same oath. In 1862 a separate Loyalty Oath was established for officers swearing loyalty to the Union during the Civil War.

The Revolutionary War Oath

I "name" have this day, voluntarily enlisted myself as a soldier in the American Continental Army for one year unless sooner discharged: and do bind myself to conform in all instances to such rules and regulations as are or shall be established for the government of the said Army.

The 1789 Oath

I "name" swear to be true to the United States of America, and to serve honestly and faithfully against all enemies and oppressors whatsoever; and to observe and obey the orders of the Continental Congress and the orders of the Generals and officers over me.

Today: The Enlisted Oath

I "name" do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; and that I will obey the orders of the President of the United States and the orders of the officers appointed over me according to the Military Code of Justice. So, help me God

The Commissioned Officers Oath

I "name" having been appointed an officer in the (Army, Navy etc.) as indicated above in the grade of (Rank) of the United States do solemnly swear that

November 11th is the day we remember I will support and defend the Constitution and thank those who over the years took an of the United States against all enemies oath and pledged to support and defend our foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservations or purpose of evasion; and that took the oath of enlistment. Some gave I will and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter. So, help me God.

I took the oath when I enlisted in the Marines on a warm June morning in 1958 in New York City, just 5 days after graduating from Saint Mary's. I will always remember that large room full of young people about to enter the United States: Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marines. The oath was given by a senior officer. He told us to think carefully before we took the oath, because once we took it we were committed to 6 years of military obligation. This included active duty and reserve time. After taking the oath off we went to begin a new adventure and chapter in our lives. For me it was an adventure I will never forget!

I am proud to be a United States Marine Corps veteran.



The Smoke Column

Castle" most people would start to think of a medieval castle somewhere in the mountains of Europe. One of the worst maritime fires along the New Jersey coast occurred on September 7, 1934. Though there are some people still alive who witnessed this tragic event, most people have never heard of it. The luxury cruise liner S.S. Morro Castle, only 4 years old at the time of the disaster, was en route from Havana, Cuba to New York City. The ship was built at the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company located in Virginia where many U.S. Navy warships were built. The ship was under contract from the U.S. Government to deliver mail and other cargo to Havana. To make this cost effective, the ship's Art Deco profile attracted passengers from all walks of life and took them on a luxurious cruise to Havana where they were able to enjoy the nightlife and the beautiful beaches. The original construction cost was \$5 million, and the ship was named after the fortress and lighthouse in the Havana harbor. During the early hours of September 7, 1934, fire erupted on board the ship in the First-Class Writing Room. Now this is where the story gets strange as fire was also reported in another area of the ship. Suspicious, arson, or accidental? As members of the crew attempted to fight the fire, two young girls wanted the crew members to sound the fire alarm but the girls were told to be quiet lest they awake the other passengers. The majority of crew and officers were unhappy with their jobs and the pay they were receiving. Many were paid less than those working in the Civilian Conservation Corps at the time earning less than \$30 a month. Being that unhappy on the ship would you really think a disgruntled crew member or officer would help the trapped passengers or would they think more about saving their own hide? Another suspicious event occurred when the

If I mentioned the name, "The Morro ship's Captain Robert Willmont was found dead in his stateroom only hours before the fire erupted. At the time of the fire, the ship was located off the New Jersey coast just north of the Delaware Bay. The acting Captain had ordered the ship to continue sailing north up the coastline and heading into winds up to 30 mph which only intensified the raging inferno. The incompetence of the crew and officers played a significant role in the deaths of so many passengers. Abandon ship drills and safety instructions were continually ignored. No one on a cruise ship ever wants to hear over the loudspeaker system the warning, "Fire, Fire, Fire, Abandon Ship." But on this tragic morning that is exactly what the sleeping passengers heard. The ship had more than enough lifeboats for the passengers but only 6 of the twelve lifeboats were lowered into the water. Some boats were not filled to capacity while others had the crew and officers jumping into the lifeboats before the ship's passengers. People not only died from the intense fire and smoke but also from falling into the water from the height of the deck, from being crushed by the ship's propellers, or by drowning in the high seas and bad weather. The ship proceeded up along the New Jersey coastline coming to rest in the oceanfront of Asbury Park Convention Hall. What would you do if faced with a similar situation? In the fire service, we call that situational awareness. Form a mental picture of your surroundings. Physically walk the emergency exit route from your stateroom to your designated lifeboat. Better to know where to go in an emergency than to "guess" when the emergency occurs and you are under stress. The actual cause of the sinking of the S.S. Morro Castle has never been determined nor has the origin of the fires. It was also a fact that there were some shady characters among the crew and officers and there was no investigation into the cause of death of the captain.



100 YEARS OF HONORING OUR WARTIME HEROES

Many of us have made the trip down Interstate 95 to the Capitol of our country, Washington, D.C. We have taken this trip to visit and learn about our country's various memorials located in the Washington, D.C. area. One of the most frequently visited iconic memorials is The Tomb of The Unknown Soldier. On March 4, 1921, his last day in office, President Woodrow Wilson signed into law a congressional resolution authorizing the "bringing to the United States of the body of an unknown American" who served in Europe during World War I "for the burial of the remains with appropriate ceremonies.


The tomb is a neoclassical, white marble sarcophagus that is situated atop a hill overlooking Washington, D.C. Since 1921, it has served as a final resting place for one of America's unidentified World War I service members. Unknown remains were interred in crypts alongside the Tomb again in 1958 and 1984. Throughout the ages, one of the consequences of warfare has been large numbers of unidentified dead. Sometimes unidentified remains resulted from poor record keeping, the damages that weapons of war inflicted on bodies, or the haste required to bury the dead and mark gravesites. During World War I, U.S. service members received aluminum identification discs, the precursors to "dog tags," to aid the process of identifying remains. The War Department created a new unit, the Graves Registration Service, to oversee burials. During and after World War I, Americans debated whether bodies should be repatriated since there were over 100,000 casualties from the war buried in European cemeteries. The American policy gave options to families of the war dead. If requested by the next of kin, the remains of service members who died in Europe would be transported to anywhere in the United states at no cost to the family. Or families could choose to bury their dead at permanent U.S. military cemeteries to be established in Europe. In December 1920, legislation was proposed that provided for the internment of one unknown American soldier at a special tomb to be built in Arlington national Cemetery. The purpose of the legislation was, "to bring home the body of an unknown American warrior who in himself represents no section, creed, or race in the late war and who typifies, moreover, the soul of America and the supreme sacrifice of her heroic dead." In October 1921, four bodies of unidentified U.S. military personnel were exhumed from different American military cemeteries in France. On October 23, 1921, the four caskets arrived at the city hall of Chalons-sur-Marne. Early on the morning of October 24, 1921, Major Robert Harbold rearranged the caskets so that each rested on a shipping case other than the one in which it had arrived. He

then asked Sgt. Edward Younger to select the Unknown Soldier by placing a spray of white roses on one of the caskets. The Unknown then journeyed by caisson and rail to Le

an unknown soldier from that war. But before that could be accomplished, the Korean War broke out and the idea came to a stop. In 1956, President Eisenhower approved the selection and internment of Unknowns from both WWII and Korea. This presented a problem as World War II was conducted on four continents. Then Unknown needed to represent all unidentified American dead, not just those from one theater of the war. The Army exhumed 13 bodies from military cemeteries in North Africa and Europe. As they were lined up, Major General placed a red and white wreath on one casket. This selected UNKNOWN was taken aboard the USS Blandy for its journey to the United States. The Pacific Theater of Operations selected five Unknowns from the Manila American Cemetery and the Punchbowl in Hawaii. At the same time, four Unknowns from the Korean War were exhumed from the National Cemetery of the Pacific. All these Unknowns were taken to Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii where on May 15, 1958, Army Master Sergeant Ned Lyle selected the Korean Unknown. On the following day, Air Force Colonel Glenn Eagleston selected the World War II Trans-Pacific Unknown. Both these caskets were flown to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. After arriving in Cuba, the three caskets were loaded aboard the USS Boston then sailed to the coast of Virginia where the USS Boston and the USS Blandy met up with the USS Canberra. On May 26, 1958, all three caskets of the Unknowns were placed on deck of the USS Canberra, with the Korean Un known in between the two World War II Unknowns. Navy Hospital Corpsman 1st Class William Charette, a Medal of Honor recipient of the Korean War, selected the World War II Unknown. The caskets of the selected two Unknowns were transported to Washington, D.C. while aboard the USS Bland and the other World War II Unknown received a solemn burial at sea. On May 30th, 1958, both the World War II and the Korean War Unknowns were interred in crypts to the west of the World War I Unknown.

Even before the Vietnam War ended, Arlington National Cemetery began preparing to add a third crypt that would include a Vietnam War Unknown. This posed a problem as advances in forensics would mean that all remains from the Vietnam War could be Marine Corps Sergeant Major Jay Kellogg, Jr., a Medal of Honor recipient, designated the remains as the Vietnam War Unknown. The Unknown remains were transported to Travis Air Force Base in California aboard the USS Brewton, where it was loaded on a C-141B Starlifter and flown to Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland. On Memorial Day, May 28, 1984, the Unknown was interred at the Tomb in a ceremony presided over by President Ronald

Reagan. The Unknown would remain in the Tomb for 14 years. The Department of Defense and civilian agencies worked together to identify the remains from the Vietnam War. As they reviewed all the evidence brought forward, it suggested that the remains in the Tomb were those of Air Force 1st Lieutenant Michael Joseph Blassie who had been shot down and killed in 1972. The family requested that his remains be exhumed from the Unknown's crypt and be interred at the Jefferson Barracks national cemetery in St. Louis, Missouri. The crypt designated for a Vietnam War Unknown remains empty. At a ceremony on September 17, 1999, National POW/MIA Recognition day, the crypt was rededicated to honor ALL missing U.S. service members from the Vietnam War be they POW's or KIA's. The Tomb of the Unknown is guarded 24/7, 365 days a year regardless of climate conditions by the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, known as the "Old Guard." This ceremonial unit started guarding the Tomb on April 6, 1948, and has done so continuously every minute since then.



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Havre, France and was loaded on board the USS Olympia which

transported the Unknown to the Washington Navy Yard arriving on November 9, 1921. The Unknown then laid in state in the U.S. capitol Rotunda for a public viewing in which 90,000 visitors paid their respects.

On November 11, 1921, the Unknown was placed on a horse-drawn caisson and carried in a procession through Washington, D.C. and on to its final resting place at Arlington National Cemetery. President Warren G. Harding officiated at the ceremony where he placed a Medal of Honor on the casket. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was originally a simple marble slab. The Tomb sarcophagus is decorated with three wreaths on each side panel. On the front side there are three figures which represent Peace, Victory, and Valor. The backside of the Tomb has inscribed, "Here rests in honored glory an American soldier known but to God."

Following World War II, many Americans supported the idea of interring





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
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Cold Weather Exercise

Exercising outdoors in cold weather can be exhilarating. Even if skiing isn't your all-time favorite sport, you can have just as much fun running, cycling, or walking in winter time. Winter sunlight can revive vour spirits, and exercise in the cool, crisp air can relieve the stress and tension related to the busy holidays.

There are special considerations to remember for cold-weather exercise:

Athletes may not be aware of the loss of fluids in cold weather, but the loss is real and potentially dangerous. Athletes have similar hydration needs year round, but many of them simply don't drink enough fluids during the winter months. Sports nutrition experts advise athletes to drink about one quart of non-caffeinated fluids for every 1.000 calories expended each day. "Drink two cups of fluid two hours before exercise and least 4-6 ounces of fluid every 15-20 minutes during exercise."

Don't overdose. Exercise raises body temperatures significantly and even a moderate workout can make you feel as if it's 30 degrees warmer. The answer to this is wearing several layers of loose-fitting thin layers of clothes.

The first layer should be thermal underwear made of a fabric that draws perspiration away form your body. That layer should not be cotton, as cotton holds moisture next to your skin and makes you feel cold and clammy.

Your middle layer should be a synthetic turtleneck and wool swather. Sweat pants or Lycratights worn over thermals will help keep your legs warm. If precipitation is evident, your outer jacket should be waterproof, wind-resistant, yet breathable. Or for a short workout in dry weather, just an ordinary windbreaker would be suitable.

Zippers make clothes more adaptable for controlling the amount of air you let in or for removing quickly. Mittens are warmer than gloves. Fingers resting against each other stay warmer than fingers separated by the added air surface between the fingers of gloves.

Headgear is important since you lose so much heat through your head. Be sure to wear good running shoes, with enough support and cushion.





gratitude for the outpouring of love and support they have received..she will be missed by all who knew and loved her.





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


