
Dems Claim 3 Seats In South Amboy

Special Charter Buses Used in South Amboy By Steve Schmid

Right before Thanksgiving you may have noticed the strange sight of New Jersey Transit charter buses waiting by South Amboy City Hall and the train station. A derailed train in Perth Amboy near the Route 440 bridge in the early morning hours of November 24, caused the suspension of NJ Transit's North Jersey Coast Line service from South Amboy and points north. Inbound passengers were shuttled to the Metropark station where they took NJ Transit trains to Newark and New York City. Outbound passengers were transported from Metropark to South Amboy where they continued to Long Branch and Bay

Head. A modified schedule between South Amboy and Bay Head was put in place. The shuttle buses ran from South Amboy, to Perth Amboy, Woodbridge and Avenel. Service was finally restored in time for Thanksgiving on November 26.

The Sweetest Christmas Memories

By Elaine Holton Scott growing up in the '50s and '60s, I remember a much simpler way of celebrating the Christmas season. How nostalgic the old memories have become...going to Perth Amboy via the Marathon Bus to the stores on Smith Street; window shopping while the cold winter air mingled with the sound of the many, usually badly suited, Salvation Army Santas ringing their bells, all vying with each other for donations; hearing Christmas Carols playing on radios from inside the stores; and every once in a while having money to actually buy something before ending our "shopping spree" inside the picture booth in Woolworth's to document our happy day with 4 connecting photos, all for the price of 25 cents. Broke, cold, and always laughing, we'd be on the corner in front of Woolworth's, waiting for the bus to take us home...usually with Red the Bus Driver at the wheel. Ah, but there was something else about Christmas in those long ago years, something which "sweetened" up the Christmas season like nothing else. It was the much awaited aroma coming from what was baking in the oven... the sweetest and best "gifts" of the holiday.

Later, as a young adult, for me baking began in November. The first time I ever made a Fruitcake, a really big one, I was newly turned 22, and listening to the Waltons Thanksgiving Special on television in the other room. It was a night in November of 1972. Not realizing how long it would take from start to finish, I soon found out I should have done it earlier in the day, but staying up late was all worth it. A Fruitcake really does need to be made at least a month before it's eaten, and strangely, the older the cake gets the better it becomes...that is, for those of us who love it. Later, I began baking fruitcake in small foil loaf pans to wrap up in see-through red wrapping paper to give as gifts.

I had loved to bake....still do (just not as much), and no Christmas could have been complete without homemade Kolaczki, Polish filled cookies. With the dough made flaky by using cream cheese instead of butter and with all different kinds of fillings, I don't think any cookie in this world could taste as good. My favorite filling was always orange marmalade. Second choice was a nut pasty filling.

The Christmas season for me was the JEWISH FRIENDS !! time to bake as many cookies as possible,

Whenever I think of Christmases mostly to give to family and friends. I remember baking cookies in the shape of Christmas wreaths and Christmas trees, oatmeal cookies plain and oatmeal cookies with raisins, coconut macaroons, chocolate chip cookies, peanut butter cookies, chocolate cookies with nuts, Polish nut horns, crescent cookies, and almond balls. Then came the sugar cookies cut into different shapes and iced in bright red and green icing, and decorated gingerbread "boys and girls." One year, for my son's class, I made the gingerbread cookies into keepsake Christmas tree ornaments by quickly pressing a hole into the top of the cookies as soon as I took them from the oven for a hook to be placed. After cooling the gingerbread on wire racks, then decorating them. I painted all of those "boys and girls" with clear varnish. When you're young, tedious things like that just didn't seem tedious at all. Now, I can get tired just thinking about all the work. In addition to the fruitcake and cookies, I would make a Yule Log cake with a real whipped cream filling, cheesecake bars decorated with red candied cherries, loaves of cranberry sweet bread, and pies...always pumpkin pies made from "scratch" using the squash pumpkins sold at stands in the countryside. Of course, at that time no one ever wondered if all of the sugar filled, calorie packed Christmas desserts were at least a little bit bad for a person's health. Actually, no one really cared.

*** Peanut Butter Cookies (Arecipe I got from my sister, Nancy Holton Berry, about 50 years ago.)

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease baking sheets. In a medium-sized bowl, sift together 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ cups of flour, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. baking soda, 1/2 tsp. each of salt and baking powder. In a large mixing bowl, cream together 1/2 cup of softened margarine and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of peanut butter. Add one egg, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of white sugar and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of brown sugar. Beat well. Mix in flour, beating until smooth. Roll dough into 1" balls and place on greased sheets. Take a fork dipped into flour and press on each ball to flatten. Bake for about 8 minutes. Cool on a wire rack. I always doubled the recipe. (Never over bake a cookie.)***



Preserving Our History ~ Historical Designation of Independence Firehouse

the town, this main thoroughfare of South Amboy sees residents and visitors alike taking strolls, catching trains, and supporting local businesses countless times a day, every day. The welcoming look and feel of Broadway buildings that reflect the essence and spirit Register of Historic Places, a state-level

of a small town deeply rooted in history and stories told about "the good old days."

The Independence Firehouse, perhaps one of the oldest standing continuous use structures in town, is a local landmark that exemplifies South Amboy's hometown feel. This firehouse has a unique history as the home of our first two fire companies, Independence and Enterprise. Both companies,

organized in 1890 following a devastating fire in February of that year that destroyed the entire block of Broadway near David Street, shared the same building for almost one hundred years.

The original firehouse, a frame building, can be found on Broadway on the Sanborn map of 1901. In June of 1924, with the original building showing significant signs of age and decline, was demolished with the new firehouse completed in August on the original expanded lot. An emblem on the front façade captures the completion date of 1924.

Perhaps one of the most well-known historical members of the Independence Firehouse was Governor Harold G. Hoffman. Born in South Amboy in 1896, Hoffman served as Mayor of South Amboy in 1925 and 1926 and as Governor of New Jersey from 1935 to 1938. Following his death in 1954, his local obituary tells of his service as a volunteer fireman with the Independence Engine and Hose Company, with members of his firehouse marching in the funeral procession.

The Historical Society of South Amboy has submitted a formal proposal to the South Amboy Historic Preservation Commission for

Downtown is thought of by many as local historic designation of the Independence the heart of a city, and Broadway is no Firehouse. The process will move forward in exception. As one of the oldest sections of early 2021, including public hearings and an optimistically anticipated approval following a satisfactory demonstration of all elements of the required criteria.



designation distinct from the local process. Currently, the only structure on the state register in South Amboy is the Great Beds Light Station, designated in 2008. The state register lists the Camden and Amboy Railroad Main Line Historic District in South Amboy (2016) and the Camden and Amboy Railroad/ Pennsylvania Railroad South Amboy Terminal archaeological site, recently listed in July of 2019

following the dig at the proposed ferry site. With a historic 2020 in the rear-view

mirror, we look ahead to 2021 and better times. The Historical Society of South Amboy will celebrate a milestone tenth anniversary in 2021 with a renewed focus on identifying, preserving, and protecting the city's remaining historic buildings. Historic preservation is more important than ever with the few historic structures we have left in our town. Next time you visit Broadway, tip your hat to our history and look for the landmark emblems on the Independence Firehouse, the Madura Building, and the Gundrum name carved on the storefront to the right of the Blue Moon.

We're hoping to find new ways of safely reconnecting with the community, including opening the History Gallery on Broadway to small groups or individuals for private visits within current safety restrictions. Please like us on Facebook and send a message if you'd like to schedule a private tour of the History Gallery. We'd also love to hear from you about other historic buildings, structures, or houses you know of, such as a Sears home. Perhaps together, we can even identify the most historic building in South Amboy.

November's What Is It was geared toward musicians. The object was a guitar capo. Taking its name from the Italian word for "head," a capo is a small device that clamps onto the neck of a guitar and shortens the length of the strings, raising their pitch. A capo is usually fastened across all the strings of a guitar or other fretted stringed instrument, although less often they are used on

only some strings rather than all of them.

The main advantage of using a capo is that it lets a guitarist play a song in different keys while still using first-position openstring chord forms, which have a more droning and fully resonant tone than, for example, many bar chords



Did You Ever Hear Of The Nashville Teens? By Tom Burkard

The Nashville Teens were a talented rock 'n' roll band from would you believe, England, and came over during the "British Invasion" in '64, when an influx of amazing bands arrived in the U.S. from Europe, and changed our music forever. The Teens released an excellent song with a powerful rock beat titled, "Tobacco Road," which was written by John Loudermilk. On November 7, 1964, a few weeks before Thanksgiving, the song peaked at #14 in the United States on the Billboard "The Hot 100" chart, and went on to hit the #1 slot in some European countries.

Fast forward to the present or pre-Co-Vid 19, and if you happened to stop in the Blue Moon on Broadway in South Amboy, on one of their entertainment nights, you probably would have noticed a tall man doing an outstanding job on the keyboards during the show. Well, the man's name is John Hawken, one of the most renowned keyboard players in the world, who happens to enjoy jamming at the South Amboy pub, which he did quite often. Most patrons probably did not realize that John was the keyboard player for The Nashville Teens, and has had quite an amazing run during his fabulous career, including winning two Gold Records. I was honored to interview this talented entertainer at the home of his good friends, fellow rocker Sandor Schneck and Gwen Feuerstein in South Amboy.

John Hawken took music lessons from ages 5-16 in England. He said that prior to hitting the big time with The Nashville Teens, his favorite rockers were Jerry Lee Lewis, Little Richard, Fats Domino, and Chuck Berry. When asked about how a British band chose the name Nashville Teens, he said that "Someone in England knew about Nashville's reputation for being a great music town." The band stayed together with a few changes in their members from 1963-68, and "Tobacco Road" rose on the English charts to "number 3 or 4, and did well throughout Europe," according to Hawken.

He recalled his most memorable concert being in Budapest, Hungary"Behind the Iron great John Hawken for sharing so many Curtain, we headlined, and played twice in one day in front of 30,000 people, which was career in music. one of the largest crowds we played in front of at the time." The Nashville Teens in John Hawken's words "Played 360 gigs in their first year, and didn't have a follow-up hit to "Tobacco Road," because our writers were lazy and should have written new stuff." John played piano for rock legend Chuck Berry on his first trip to England, and also Carl Perkins on his first tour over there. "They were two of the nicest guys you could meet. I played Chess with Berry on the tour bus, and also got to hang out a bit with Jimi Hendrix in England." Hawken also had fond memories of having a very exciting, nerve-wracking ride, in a brand new Rolls Royce with Keith Moon and Harry Nilsson. In addition, he appeared in a movie titled "That'll Be The Day," where he played keyboards.

Nashville Teens played live shows for 4 weeks on the Murray The K. Christmas Show in New York City. "We did 6 shows a day, and played 3 songs at each show. Also performing was Dionne Warwick, LaBelle, The Shangri-Las, The Zombies, and The Hullabaloos." The group was at the height of its popularity around this time, and appeared on U.S. TV shows including "Shindig," and "Hullabaloo."

John Hawken was a highly-regarded musician, and was once recruited by two of the most famous musicians in the world, George Harrison and Ringo Starr, who brought him into the Apple Records basement recording studio, to add some keys to a song they were working on for Cilla Black. "It was a very hot day, and the air conditioner was down, so it wouldn't affect the sound of the recording. George had Ringo change his drumming style three times, and Ringo did it exactly as he was told." Hawken spoke highly of both, saying Harrison "was the nicest guy," and Starr "was a good, regular guy."

In addition to playing with The Nashville Teens, he went on to other popular bands including Spooky Tooth (from Sept.-Dec. 1971), Renaissance, Third World War, Vinegar Joe, The Strawbs, and Illusion (which was Renaissance with the name changed). He had amazing experiences, touring all over the world including Europe, Canada, behind the Iron Curtain, and of course the U.S.A.

In 1973 or '74, he played "With the Strawbs out West, along with The Beach Boys at a Bill Graham Show, where 110,000 people came out for the concert. I also had the chance to play twice at the Royal Albert Hall in England with The Nashville Teens, and also Renaissance."

When asked what it was like to see himself performing with The Nashville Teens on youtube.com, he said, "It reminds me of a carefree time. The first time, there is no replacement. It holds a special place in my heart."





Back Pain?

Santa Claus may be able to travel around the world in a single night, but when it comes to his health, he's no Superman. That bowl full of jelly, a diet rich in fatty cookies and a lack of regular exercise all put Santa at risk for back pain.

Santa is a perfect candidate for back problems – He's overweight. The same holds true for us mortals. Sometimes the cause of your back problems is not your back, but your front: your "spare tire" may be the cause of your aching back. And the solution to your back problem may not involve a pill or surgery.

Your spine is the central support of your entire skeletal system. It is designed for strength to support your body weight and flexibility to allow movement. When healthy, your spine is S shaped with three natural curves. When these curves are in balance, your body weight is evenly distributed. To maintain this alignment, you need to have strong and flexible muscles in your back, legs and abdomen. The abdominal muscles are especially important in supporting the spine.

A potbelly changes the curvature of the back. The stomach pulls the backbone forward, stressing muscles and ligaments and putting pressure on discs. If you have ten extra pounds on your abdomen, you are putting an additional 100 pound strain on your back. This additional strain occurs because the lower part of your spine is not receiving adequate support from your weakened abdominal muscles. Your back muscles try to maintain the proper spinal balance, but after end up strained or sprained.

Although excess weight does not cause back problems, you can do something about it. Follow a diet and exercise program to maintain a healthy weight and strengthen your muscles. Develop healthy eating habits that work for you. And make exercise, diet and proper spinal hygiene an important part of your day.



Salt Water Surffishing in the ocean, especially at Island Beach and LBI, has been productive for Striped Bass with many keepers reported. There were shorts and some big ones over 35 inches up to 45 inches which had to be released. Some Bluefish are around too. A few Red Drum had been reported in these areas also. Party boats that fish for Striped Bass are also doing well. Some trips produced many oversized fish which had to be released. Big Bluefish up to 14 pounds were caught using jigs. Surf fishing in the local bay in are area is just about nonexistent. I checked the beaches at Keansburg and Cliffwood several times. The few people that were fishing reported no bites or fish. The party boats that bottom fish are catching Blackfish weighing in up to 10-12 pounds. Ling, a few Porgies and Sea Bass are mixed in the catch. Unfortunately, Spiny Dogfish have invaded most fishing areas in large numbers. They are even catching them in the surf at night. Winter Flounder are in Shark River.




