Partnership and Collaboration Pays Dividends

As redevelopment continues in the City of South Amboy, the City Government and South Amboy Redevelopment Agency have taken a major step to bring improvements to benefit all residents that would not have been possible without their collective efforts. Tuesday, June 23rd Mayor Fred Henry and Executive Director of Redevelopment Eric Chubenko presented a check in the amount of \$100,000 to Superintendent of Schools Jorge Diaz and Board of Education President Anthony Conrad to begin the process of equipping every South Amboy Public School student with a Chromebook computer. The check represents a third of the cost involved with a goal to fund the remaining two thirds of the project through impact fees collected by the Redevelopment Agency.

"This is an excellent example of how partnership and collaboration between the City, its Redevelopment Agency, and our Board of Education can enhance the academic opportunities to our children at no cost to the taxpayer!" said Mayor Fred Henry. Eric Chubenko agreed with that idea. "Gradual smart development and careful negotiations have provided opportunities for the City which under normal circumstances would not have been possible. A good example of past success is our outstanding Community Center/YMCA that was the result of one of our earliest redevelopment projects".

School Superintendent Jorge Diaz echoed those sentiments. "The level of cooperation between the Mayor's Administration, the Redevelopment Agency, and the Board of Education shows how partnerships like this can provide great opportunities where working together we can provide both a superior academic and social environment

The City of South Amboy has been awarded 5.3 million dollars from the Federal Transit Administration 2020 Passenger Ferry Grant Program. Mayor Fred Henry was notified of the award by Congressman Frank Pallone (DNJ-06).

"South Amboy has been working to establish regular passenger ferry service

between the City and New York for almost two decades. This major funding opportunity would not have been possible without the strong support of Congressman Pallone" said Mayor Henry.

Henry continued, "This ambitious project has not been without complications.

Tropical Storm Fay and Heat Blast Area

July 2020 will be remembered for very high temperatures plus a tropical storm. Friday July 10 saw Tropical Storm Fay come up the east coast and hammer our area with relentless rain and high winds. The storm gave us rainfall totals of about two and a half inches and flooded several roadways and caused damage to trees. It is the earliest tropical system to hit our area as these storms usually come in late August and September. The storm was followed by a heat wave that started July 18 and lasted several days. The heat wave brought in temperatures in the mid 90s with heat indexes over 100 degrees. Our heat wave developed when hot air from the Midwest came into the area and remained. The high humidity made for very uncomfortable conditions. We can only hope August will bring us cooler and more comfortable weather.

Jim Dieker, a third generation owner said that the farm was established in 1903 by his grandfather Fred Dieker, who was later succeeded by Jim's father Harry Dieker. Jim left his job as a machinist in 1982 to work the 17 acres with his father. In 2008, Dieker's, which was the last farm in the Borough of Sayreville, was declared a Preserved Farmland by Agriculture Secretary Charles M. Kuperus under New Jersey's Farmland Preservation Program. This agreement will keep the farmland

forever, according to Jim.

Dieker's Farm is currently offering many delicious seasonal vegetables and fruits, including several new super-sweet corns, standard Jersey and Heirloom tomatoes, and new varieties of peaches and nectarines.

In late September, don't forget to bring the children out to Dieker's Pumpkin Patch, where you can pick your own pumpkin, and have some fun, as well as great photo opportunities at the farm.

Dieker's Farm is closed for the winter, and reopens on May 1st, when you can get ready for 2021, and pick up some very healthy plants, vegetables, flowers, and hanging baskets for your home.

Dedrah Parisen of South Amboy has had a most interesting life, with one job in particular that afforded her the opportunity to meet some very well-known recording artists.

In a recent interview, she said that she grew up in Old Bridge, and graduated from Cedar Ridge HS in 1981. She then studied at Middlesex County College and Thomas Edison University. Her degrees are in Chemistry and Culinary Arts. Her family owned a Stewart's Root Beer stand on Englishtown Rd. in Old Bridge and a vending machine business as well, and Dedrah worked in businesses.

She went on to work for Unilever in Research and Development for 25 years, holding such positions as Chemist, Product Developer, and Research Chef. "I did a lot of work on the Hellmann's and Knorr brands. I loved creating new products and the science involved in the process, she stated.

Dedrah currently works as a Realtor Associate for Green Light Realty. She said that "I decided to go into real estate for a few reasons. First, I never really lost that entrepreneurial spirit that I had while growing up and working in the family business and the real estate business certainly taps into that. Secondly, buying or selling a home is a major milestone in your life and I have that attention to detail mindset which has carried me through my previous career in R & D."

In a previous job, she was a hostess/bartender for a tour bus company. "I did many trips to Atlantic City. The buses were converted into luxury space with a bar/kitchen. I was assigned to a few local jobs where we would transport celebrities from their hotel to the gig, and wait while they performed and then return them to the hotel." Between 1982-1984, she had the opportunity of a lifetime to meet:

Kenny Rogers – "We picked him up at the Marriott (I think) and drove him to the Brendan Byrne Arena for a show. We were late and he was just sitting on a sofa near the door with sunglasses on. Nobody recognized him. He got up and walked over to us with

a smile. He wasn't even mad that we were late. He was a nice guy."

Pointer Sisters – "I had to get a background check before I was allowed to work on that trip. They were very nice and didn't ask for much so I was mostly sitting up front with the driver but I could hear them singing in the back. It was great. We were always given backstage passes and special parking for the gigs. The food and atmosphere was very enjoyable and we had speakers in the back to hear the concert."

Rod Stewart – "We drove him to the Garden State Arts Center, now known as PNC. He was just a normal guy and I was a big fan but kept calm."

Bon Jovi – "We didn't drive him anywhere with the tour bus company, but my sister and I were sitting at the bar at the Jernee Mill Inn, and Jon happened to be sitting next to us. He had just released his first hit record "Runaway," and we were big fans. He was great. We drank with Bon Jovi!"

Dedrah mentioned that "I love genealogy and have traced the Parisen side of the family to the early 16th century. They have been in South Amboy since the mid 1800's. She also hopes to travel in the future. "I have

plans to visit Poland and Czech Republic to search for my roots there, and I have Iceland on my bucket list to see the northern lights.

Dedrah said that her personal philosophy is to "Always be grateful for what you have in life, and if you can, help someone who needs it."

The Smoke Column

While reading an article in one of the many first responder publications, I came across an interesting article that pertains to the majority of us that drive motor vehicles. It sparked my interest when the headline stated, “His Keyless Car Killed Him While He Slept”. What in the world could this mean? After digging through mounds of reports and documentation on keyless vehicles I was stunned to read what had happened.

When keyless ignition first started to appear in our vehicles, it was the greatest thing. We were all amazed that now we could start our cars from inside our home on those cold winter mornings and have it cozy/warm when we entered it. This also worked in the summer when we wanted the interior cooled down, when the vehicle started so did the air conditioner. There was also the benefit of not needing a key to open the doors especially with our hands full or in the dark. To accomplish these tasks, all we needed to do was to get close enough to the vehicle with the key fob and a radio wave would send a signal to the car and the doors would unlock. This was one of the greatest innovations to be added to our vehicles. But would this new idea turn out to be an “Achilles Heel”? For those of you that have the keyless start option and must depress the start button on the dashboard, have you ever forgot to push that button to shut off the vehicle when you parked? I know that I did on numerous occasions. With the quiet running engines of today sometimes it becomes difficult to hear if the motor is still running as you walk away from the vehicle.

When a gasoline engine is running it is producing Carbon Monoxide. There I go again mentioning that deadly gas! Since its inception, keyless cars HAVE killed many people. Where do we place the blame, on the

vehicle owners or the vehicle manufacturers? A common occurrence of carbon monoxide poisoning with these vehicles would be in a residence with an enclosed/attached garage. Picture the scenario where someone returning home from a day of shopping, pulls into their garage and starts to unload their groceries, especially if those items need to be refrigerated or kept frozen. Your concentration may be on those groceries that need quick refrigeration and not on the vehicle that you left running and could not hear. You go into the house with your groceries, close the garage door and forget all about the running car. During the time that the vehicle is running it is producing Carbon Monoxide, the odorless, colorless, deadly killer. You do not hear the vehicle running and therefore never think about it again. If it is evening, you retire to bed and fall asleep, never to wake up because you are being asphyxiated by that forgotten running vehicle leaking deadly carbon monoxide into the living areas.

Data from the Safety Research & Strategies Inc. has reported 37 of these incidents. There is not one brand of car to blame because all manufacturers have installed keyless starting mechanisms in their vehicles. There is help on the way. But it took the U.S. Senate and the House to propose a law “That automakers be required to provide an automatic shutoff for keyless internal combustion engines when a car has been idling for a designated period of time”?

That is great news for new car buyers but those of you with the earlier versions of keyless start must be aware of the hazards that still exist in your vehicles. A good way to determine if your car is still running, attempt to alarm the vehicle. If it is running, you will not hear the alarm activate.

They are the first of a multi-phase project dubbed the Manhattan Beach Club that will ultimately bring 1,875 new residences to an underutilized 55-acre property located between the South Amboy train station, and the Raritan Bay.

The \$500 million redevelopment effort will also include the construction of a long-awaited ferry terminal, making it the only state-designated transit village offering both rail and ferry service. Earlier this week, U.S. Rep. Frank Pallone, D-6th Dist., announced that the U.S. Department of Transportation will grant \$5.3 million to South Amboy for the proposed 20,000 square-foot facility which will operate up to three ferries between the city's Raritan Bay waterfront and downtown Manhattan. Located adjacent to The Manhattan Beach Club, the terminal will also include 700 parking spaces and a second story space ideal for a restaurant to take advantage of the views. City officials believe the ferry operation, which will accommodate hundreds of commuters to New York City, will also draw more visitors to South Amboy's growing downtown district.

"Smart, well planned growth is a tremendous asset to our City," said Mayor Henry. "The Manhattan Beach Club will transform vacant industrial land into a bayfront destination providing stable long-term revenue to benefit our residents, both new and old, for decades to come."

BNE Real Estate Group expects to deliver this initial phase of 291 residences in Summer of 2022, according to Jonathan Schwartz, a partner at the Livingston, NJ-based development and management company.

Packages will be securely delivered to Amazon® package lockers. The pet-friendly community will also include a dog spa.

Located in suburban Middlesex county, where the mouth of the Raritan River empties into the Raritan Bay, South Amboy is a tight-knit community of about 9,000 residents. The city's main commercial avenue, Broadway, is home to a variety of shops, restaurants, and family-owned businesses, as well as the South Amboy train station. The city is also home to Raritan Bay Waterfront Park, a 114-acre county park with athletic fields, walkways, a playground, a nature study area, gazebos, and a landmark pavilion with sweeping views of the bay.

Nautical-minded residents of Manhattan Beach Club will appreciate the selection of marinas nearby. NJ TRANSIT commuters will have a ride of about 50 minutes to New York Penn Station. For motorists, the entrances to the Garden State Parkway, Route 9 and Route 35 are all about a mile away.

However, we are finally able to move forward with construction of this major transportation improvement that will benefit our residents, and the residents of Middlesex County."

The City of South Amboy has been at the nexus of commercial and residential redevelopment in New Jersey. The Manhattan Beach development is currently under construction and is adjacent to the Ferry Terminal site. Using a design conceived by French and Parelo Engineering and USA Architects, the ferry facility will offer a state-of-the-art terminal building, over 700 hundred parking spaces, and convenient dock facilities to provide safe and easy boarding.

Mayor Henry said, "Working closely with our team of professionals, our partners at the New Jersey State Department of Transportation, The Department of

Environmental Protection, and the State Historic Preservation Office, the facility will feature historical artifacts recovered from the site of the Amboy & Camden Railroad which operated from the waterfront location in the 1800s. While we always have to look to accommodate our needs for the future, we don't want to neglect the role the City has played as a transportation hub in the past."

As one of the four original State designated Transit Villages South Amboy will be the only site in New Jersey to offer rail and ferry services within walking distance of each other. Over the next few months, the Mayor's staff will be finalizing some remaining governmental approvals and expects to be able to advertise for bids before the end of 2020.

Historical Society Gallery Break-In

On April 29, 2020, the historical society was notified that their gallery located at 141 North Broadway had been broken-into and was vandalized. President Mary Szaro and several members went to the gallery to assess the damage and to verify if any of their items had been stolen.

Upon arrival it was observed that entry was gained by forcing the rear door open. There were pry marks on the outside and inside of the rear door. A quick assessment showed that a person or persons took up residence in the gallery. A leather couch belonging to the SARA which is in the next office space from the gallery had been moved into our gallery. Numerous coffee cups and water bottles had been placed around the couch on the floor for the occupant's convenience. The small kitchen and bathroom also displayed signs of usage and damage.

After an inventory was taken it appeared that several items were missing. Some are

owned by the historical society, but most are from members' private collections. An exceedingly rare "Mummers String Band" costume on loan to the society was vandalized and hopefully it can be repaired and placed back on display. Some books and photographs from the 1930's and 1940's were removed and dumped into the dumpster at the rear of the building. The items were recovered, sanitized and replaced back where they belong. Several days later the society was notified by the South Amboy Police that employees of Dunkin Donuts had discovered additional items in their dumpster that were taken from the gallery. The items were recovered and placed back into the gallery.

After the South Amboy Police were notified of the break-in, a quick arrest was initiated. The name of the person arrested is being withheld pending court procedures. The quick action and diligence on behalf of our city police department is paramount in

detering this type of behavior. On behalf of the Historical Society a heartfelt thank you goes out to the South Amboy Police and Dunkin Donuts employees for their diligence.

It should be noted that most of the historical items on display at the gallery belong to members of the historical society. The members are proud and honored to display their personal items which are mainly family heirlooms depicting the history of South Amboy which can never be replaced if vandalized or stolen. Its sad to think that people would vandalize such treasured items for the mere pleasure of just vandalizing. After speaking with the mayor and business administrator it was determined that greater security measures must be installed at not only the historical gallery but the Arts & Culture Association and SARA offices which we share in the building.

When things get back to some sort of normal the Historical Society of South Amboy

is planning to have a Grand Reopening in the new space at the gallery location. Also, the HSSA is in the planning stages of the Most Popular "Cemetery Tour" at Christ Church Cemetery in late October 2020. Read the SA Sayreville Times for updates on the Grand Reopening and the cemetery tour.

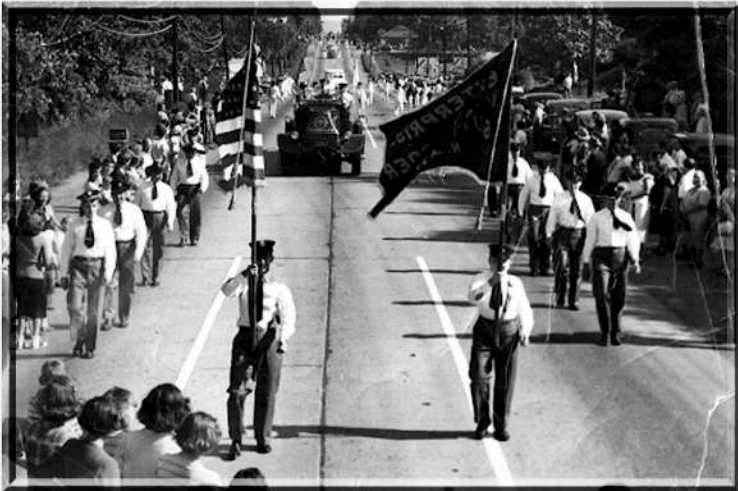

**Harold “Hal” Dennen Recalls
South Amboy In The 60’s**

Harold “Hal” Dennen was born and raised in South Amboy, and went on to a highly-successful career as a teacher for the Sayreville schools system. He was so gracious to share his memories of The 1960’s in “The Pleasant Little City.”

In a recent interview with The SA Times, he said “Back in the 50’s and 60’s, like most kids, our summer days were filled with hanging with friends and playing ball. We always played baseball, and had a pickup game going. I had several cousins living in town, the Dennens and Nemeths, and we played baseball everyday. One of our favorite places to play was on the rocky, Star Field on lower Augusta St.”

Hal played on the First Aid baseball team in the South Amboy Little League for 4 years, and was a huge contributor to two championship teams. He said that his coaches were John Hayden, Wilbur Schmidt, Stan Jankowski and Mr. Kelly. “My best memory of those days was the way all of us kids had enjoyed playing sports, with a friendly competitiveness.” His favorite teams/players were the Yankees/Mickey Mantle, and Knicks in basketball with Bill Bradley his fave player. In ‘58, while on vacation in Florida with his family, he was thrilled to meet Yankee players Don Larsen and Bob Turley.

Dennen went on to play 4 years of varsity baseball under legendary Coach John Zdanewicz, and in the winter, a combination of varsity/jayvees basketball under the great coach Jim Croddick. Hal’s favorite teammates were the late John Jankowski and Ed Szatkowski. When asked what his best baseball game was, he said, “As a senior in my first varsity pitching victory, I had 3 hits against Croydon Hall Academy.” Also in his final year of basketball, he poured in 20 points against Union Catholic.

Hoffman H.S. had some terrific teachers back in the 60’s, and Hal’s favorites were “Mr. McCarthy, Mr. Moran, Mr. Poll, and Mr. Croddick.” His closest friends in school were John Jankowski, Ed Szatkowski, Dave Parsons, his cousins Paul Kosovich and Bobby Nemeth.

Following high school graduation in 1965, Hal attended Glassboro State College (now Rowan University). He graduated in ‘69 with a degree in Junior High School Education. He went on to an outstanding career at Sayreville Junior High/Middle School, where he taught Math for a total of 39 years until retiring in 2008. “My best memory of teaching is having worked with such a wonderful staff, and fellow teachers, and playing in the annual basketball, softball and volleyball games against the students.”

Since his retirement, he has “taken an interest in gardening, reading, watching my favorite sports on TV, but my favorite “hobby” of all is my grandchildren. My father, Harold Dennen II, was “my biggest inspiration. He taught me to always try my best in life. He enlisted in the military at the young age of 17 to serve in World War II, and later the Korean War. He was also a longtime firefighter and baseball coach in the South Amboy Youth Leagues.” Hal also praised Mr. Jim Croddick, who “was a huge inspiration in my life as coach, mentor and

friend.” Dennen said that “I am proudest of my children, grandchildren, and my 39 years of teaching and tutoring those children who needed a little help.”

How would Harold “Hal” Dennen like to be remembered someday? “After I’m gone, I would like to mostly be remembered for always sharing a smile and good word about everyone.”

**66 Years Ago - Melrose Family Was First On
The Parkway Bridge**

July 30, 1954-Theodore Laskiewicz, his wife and 5 children, plus a niece and nephew were the first people to drive over the new Garden State Parkway Bridge over the Raritan River, that ran from Sayreville to Woodbridge, and parallel to the Edison Bridge. 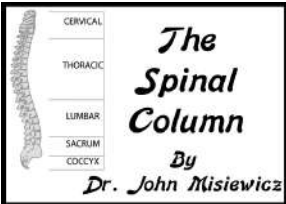

How to Cope with Heat Emergencies
The summer sun can lift our spirits and warm our bodies. Every year summer also brings heat exhaustion and death when people get too hot, for too long.

“When the heat and humidity both rise above 90 degrees, about four to ten cases of heat-related illness show up each day in the emergency room at Brigham and Women’s Hospital in Boston,” says Stephen Bohan, M.D., clinical director of the department. “That’s as high as any other single complaint.”
Heat exhaustion is the most common syndrome complicating physical exertion in warm or hot weather. Both the degree of outside temperature and the intensity of physical activity play important roles. Intense physical exertion in moderately warm weather may be as dangerous in this regard as moderate exertion in hot weather. Heavy sweating resulting in dehydration, excessive hyperthermia, and failing cardiovascular functions causes symptoms of heat exhaustion.

On average, 371 people die each year in the U.S. of “excessive heat exposure” according to the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention statistics from 1979 through 1997, the most recent available. The death rate among people aged 65 and older is three times the average.
The age groups most adversely affected by the heat are small children, the elderly, and those infirmed and bothered by mental illness. Among people who are not elderly or impaired, the most common heat emergencies occur when people exercise at midday, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on hot humid days, and don’t drink enough fluids.

The body’s cooling mechanism depends on evaporating perspiration, but if the humidity is really high that can’t happen and those people become rapidly hypothermic.
As always, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure! Drink plenty of fluids before, during and after exercising; wear lightweight, light-colored clothing. If you feel not only hot, but lightheaded or weak as well, it may be time to seek help.

Fishing Flashes

Salt Water
The bay beach fishing that I have seen is slow at Keansburg and Cliffwood Beach. I also checked a beach in Morgan, and had the same result. I could see some people getting bites and someone losing a fish, most likely a small Bluefish. Fluke fishing in the bay is not that much better. It’s mostly shorts with a few keepers. It’s better down in Barnegat Bay and Inlet. A friend in a private boat had his 3 fish limits with up to 4 pounds with some other people. Surf fishing for Fluke is good at LBI. Bucktails with gulp are doing the trick. Some Bluefish, Kingfish and the usual junk fish are being caught. Cow Nose Rays are there too. Party Boats are catching a variety of fish due to the water temperature in the 70’s. Bonito, Bluefish, Chub Mackerel, Sea Bass, Fluke and Ling, among them are Spanish Mackerel and Triggerfish moving into the mix are in the catch. 30 miles offshore, Charter Boats are catching small Bluefin and Yellowfin Tuna are being trolled along with some False Albacore.

Fresh Water
Largemouth Bass, Carp Catfish and a variety of panfish are being caught in most statewide waters. The Passaic River has Pike and Smallmouth Bass are active in the Delaware River. Trout fishing is slow, but you may want to try the Mulhockaway Creek near Spruce Run of Rt 78. It runs cold in the Summer and it’s lined with overgrowth, difficult to fish, but it holds Trout all year round.

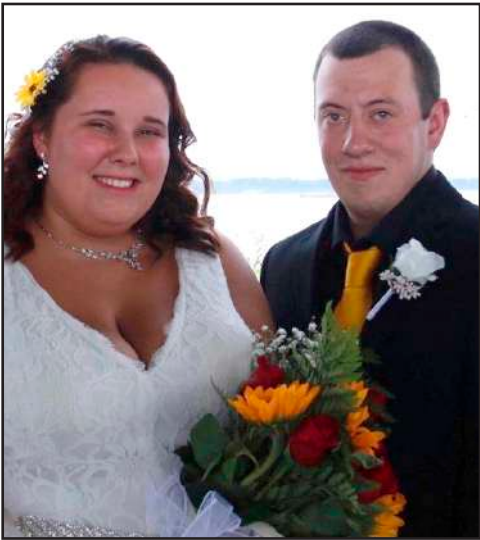

Baseball Then and Now

A few weeks ago I had the great pleasure of watching a replay of the seventh game of the 1952 World Series on the MLB network when the New York Yankees played the Brooklyn Dodgers at Ebbets Field on October 7th.

Both lineups were stocked with future Hall of Famers: Mickey Mantle, Yogi Berra, Phil Rizzuto, and Johnny Mize for the Yankees and Pee Wee Reese, Jackie Robinson, Roy Campanella, and Duke Snider for the Dodgers. What a thrill it was to see these great players in action! The Yankees were attempting to gain their fourth consecutive world championship under Hall of Fame manager, Casey Stengel, while the Dodgers were still trying to best the Yankees after failing in 4 previous World Series appearances.

In watching the black and white broadcast, there were quite a few things that I noticed compared to how baseball is broadcast today. The first thing that you discover is that no one is wearing a batting helmet or batting gloves. That meant that the batters did not need to step out of the batter's box after almost every pitch to adjust their gloves. Secondly, in some cases, the fielders left their gloves on the field of play after the end of an inning!

What really jumped out at me was that there was no square in the upper right hand corner of the screen which showed the score, the balls and strikes count, the pitch count, the speed of the last pitch, what inning it was, and if runners were on base. In fact, you had to depend on the announcers to occasionally tell what the score was and what the inning was. It really brought back a lot of fond memories to hear two Hall of Fame announcers, the Ol' Redhead, Red Barber, the voice of the Dodgers and Mel Allen, the voice of the Yankees, call the game. I can remember watching the Yankees on TV in the late '50's and early 60's and listening to these greats explain some of the nuances of baseball, like the Infield Fly rule, as if they were talking to me directly. I'll never forget it.

Since there were no video tape replays, you really couldn't leave the room for a moment because you could miss a spectacular play, which would not be shown again. In

fact, the only technical innovation that I noticed was a split screen shot, that showed the pitcher on the mound and the runner leading off of first base.

The Yankees won the contest 4 to 2 with Mickey Mantle knocking in the go-ahead run and later adding a solo home run off of Joe Black. Gene Woodling, the left fielder, who later followed Casey Stengel to the Mets years later, added a home run in the 4th inning. Bob Kuzava, a left-handed relief pitcher, pitched 2 2/3 innings of hitless relief to save the game for Allie "Big Chief" Reynolds. Billy Martin made a spectacular running catch of a wind-blown pop-up off the bat of Jackie Robinson, which the rest of the infield had lost in the sun, to end the Dodgers last major threat with the bases loaded in the 7th inning.

There were also some oddities that occurred during the game such as "Yogi" Berra being announced as "Larry Berra" before he came to the plate. One of the Dodger pitchers, Ralph "Number 13" Branca, the man who gave up the Giants' Bobby Thompson's pennant winning "shot heard round the world" the year before, was ejected from the bench by the home plate umpire late in the game. Ralph Houk, who was a journeyman catcher and ultimately the Yankee manager in 1961, grounded out as a pinch hitter. But the strangest sight that I ever saw was that Casey Stengel had 3 relief pitchers warming up on the sidelines next to the left field foul line at the same time. Normally, that area could only accommodate two pitchers and catchers, but Casey had one pitcher and catcher warming up closer to the Yankee dugout. Finally, the Dodger manager, Charlie Dressen, coached third base instead of directing his players from the dugout. I know that Leo Durocher used to do it, but this was something new for me.

As I look back on this game, it reminded me about how complicated life has become. In those days, things used to be much simpler, as if to say that they were in black and white like the television screen. Today, our world is so complicated that everything seems to be gray. I wish I could bring back the simpler good ol' days. I am very thankful to have been able to watch this game and reminisce about that time.

Middlesex County College Announces Fall Instructional Plans

Middlesex County College is planning a fall semester with most classes being offered remotely.

"So that students can continue their education while mitigating the risks of exposure to COVID-19, we are modifying our fall 2020 schedule of course offerings to reduce the number of on-campus classes," said College President Mark McCormick. "We anticipate a 90/10 percent split, with about 90 percent of classes offered online and 10 percent on campus."

Linda Scherr, vice president for Academic Affairs, said MCC is offering classes in different formats to provide flexibility for students.

"The formats give students choices about

their learning, while emphasizing health and safety practices to prevent the spread of COVID-19," she said.

Many of the courses will be converted into what the College is calling "Remote Live," which are classes held at a scheduled day and time using video conferencing. Students interact with the professor and fellow students in real-time, although some sections may include assignments for students to complete on their own instead of meeting for every scheduled class session.

"The second half of our spring semester was conducted using Remote Live, and it was very successful," Dr. McCormick said.

Traditional online courses will also be offered. In these, the student works when it

is convenient, and completes assignments by the due date. There are no required weekly meeting times and course materials and assignments are submitted online.

"This mode is a good option for students who prefer a flexible schedule and have effective time management skills," Dr. McCormick said.

Some programs—such as nursing, dental hygiene, fine arts, radiography, engineering, and culinary arts—include courses that require in-person instruction and those courses will be offered in a hybrid format, with about half of the sessions online or Remote Live and half in person.

"All on-campus instruction will adhere to strict health and safety protocols in

compliance with state and local guidance," he said.

For all fall courses, students will need access to a computer or tablet with microphone and the internet. For students without access to a computer, the College has laptops available for loan. Please contact student_services@middlesexcc.edu for details.

"We want to ensure that students receive the education they need and deserve while at the same time protecting their health and safety," Dr. McCormick said.
