A South Amboy **Tribute To Our Fallen Veterans: New Red,** White, And Blue Street Signs

As the Mayor of South Amboy, it is my honor and privilege to name newly created streets. At Woodmont Cove, a recently completed redevelopment site, I named two streets for South Amboy veterans killed in World War II (Max Nebus and Howard Little), one street for a veteran who survived the D-Day Invasion and became an outstanding citizen of South Amboy (Walter "Pete" Casey), and a firefighter who died in the line of duty (Gerald "Bear" Celecki). All were very well deserving of that honor.

During the same time frame, a request was made to honor another firefighter who died in the line of duty (Russell Newcomb) and a long outstanding volunteer to our First Aid Squad (Jim "Doc" Ryan). As South Amboy is not a very large community with new streets to name, I decided to honorarily "re-nam" two streets at appropriate sites. As Russell was a member of the Mechanicsville Fire Company, I dedicated Alpine St. at the Mechanicsville Firehouse to honor him, and Thompson St. at the First Aid building to honor"Doc." Again, two very well-deserving individuals.

However, there were many others like Martin Bailey, Eugene Gatz, and Thomas Pizzillo to name a few, who called South Amboy home, but lost their lives in faraway places during World War I, World War II, Vietnam, and Iraq. How could we honor them? How could we remember them? They too made the ultimate sacrifice for our great nation and should not be forgotten! She was ordained a priest in June 2016 in the Diocese of New Jersey and continued serving St. Mark's Church as the priest-in-charge while the rector was on sabbatical. Most recently, she served at Christ Church Christiana Hundred, Wilmington, Delaware, where she has served as priest associate since March 2017.

Christ Church South Amboy was founded in 1856. According to a statement from the church, "our members are steadfast in our faith and our commitment to God. We are determined to maintain an integral presence in the community, opening our doors to all who worship Jesus. 

Rush was set to begin when a carpenter from our very own state of New Jersey by the name of James Wilson Marshall found flakes of gold as he worked building a waterpowered sawmill for John Sutter. When word got around, men came from all over America and from across the Pacific Ocean hoping to stake claims on land so they could find gold too. Many arrived carrying tools in their rough, work-hardened hands, while many others arrived in their best "Sunday suits" with hands which had never known a day's work in their lives. A few would hit the big time...but most would end up broken and penniless. Someone who really hit "gold" was Levi Strauss when he began making bib overalls from tent material and selling most of them to miners. 172 years later another gold rush is occurring, but this time it's for "white gold"...otherwise known as toilet paper. Yes, during this Coronavirus pandemic, having a good supply of toilet paper is worth more than plain old gold.

We, Americans are spoiled. We have grown up and lived with every food item and product readily available. All that was ever needed was money to buy it. For many of us that had meant saving relentlessly to be able to purchase the things we really wanted. Going to the bank to cash our paychecks before there was such a thing as automatic deposits and, hopefully, to put some of our hard earned money into a savings account, was routine. For others, there were different ways to save money for the future, one of which was buying gold...real gold, like what's held in Fort Knox.

Life changed in a blink of an eye when this Covid-19 virus started spreading in the U.S. All of us must now go back to the basics because shelves usually loaded with every type of product aren't so loaded anymore. For many, especially for those of us living in the southern portion of the state, the warehouses have been emptying of even the barest of hoarded what was more important... "white people locked in.

70 Years Ago-May, 1950. The long-established Empire Theatre on North Broadway in South Amboy burned down. It was located across from The Presbyterian Church, in the vicinity where the Chinese Restaurant is now located.

Recalling The 1950 South Amboy Explosion By Bill "Biff" McKeon

said " this day will live in Infamy " referring to the December 7th 1941 bombing of Pearl Harbor, while May 19, 1950 is the Day of Infamy for South Amboy, New Jersey.

Friday May 19th was the day that St. Mary's High School, South Amboy, NJ Class of 1950 was scheduled to experience their final high school dance, their senior prom.

Several weeks prior to this memorable Senior Day of gown/tux dancing, there was a debate on where to have this senior prom. Some Class of '50 students, who wanted the big event to be held in the Molly Pitcher Hotel in Red Bank, were informed by principal Sister Loretta, that it would be more prudent to have it within the school.

As the young Ladies and Gentlemen prepared for the night of enchanting dancing several blocks away at the South Amboy, Pennsylvania Railroad dock workers were transferring 420 tons of Pakistan Military Explosives from Pennsy Railroad Cars onto several barges when some time shortly after 7 PM., the sky showered black mud from the Raritan Bay onto the city, and its neighboring fact that buildings shook before the rumbling sound of the explosion and the black mud rained down from the sky.

Many believed the Russians had bombed New York City, others opined the Jersey Central Power Plant had exploded, as the city was aghast with illogical theories.

Jersey Central Electric wires started to fall, sparking as they hit the road, windows were blown out, and the roof of the St. Mary's HS. Gym fell to the floor. God had His hand blessing these St. Mary's HS senior prom-goers, who had not yet arrived for their

President Franklin Delano Roosevelt evening of remembrance. If the explosion occurred several hours later God knows how many students would have been killed.

There were 36 workers killed and hundreds of South Amboy people suffered minor physical injuries, however the scars of this disaster are life long. One resident said his daughter lying in her crib, had the Lord's crucifix fall from the wall, landing on her face, and the crucifix was fully embedded in glass. Another person said his bed had a large section of the window glass landed in the area where he slept. Probably one of the weirdest was where a person was thrown though Frank O'Connor's store window at North Broadway, and had a slitter of glass stuck in his back, where no blood was visible however. After several days of discomfort the Doctor discovered this embedded piece of glass within his spinal area.

The anchor of one of these barges flew across the Raritan River and landed in Staten Island, New York, and another anchor landed on lower Augusta St. at the home of the late Jimmy Gray. Many windows in New York City were also blown out, and this massive communities. What was so amazing is the explosion was major in property damage as well as to lives. Land mines were discovered throughout South Amboy/ Sayreville/Old Bridge, that required the US. Army, who were stationed in Fort Monmouth, NJ. to be called/ activated into Marshall Law, where they also dismantled many unexploded land mines.

There are hundreds of stories relating to what happened that day as WPIX-TV covered this story for weeks. PS. The insurance companies paid (.010 cents on the dollar) whereas, no one had Explosion Insurance.





Little Richard Performs In South Amboy In 1966-Part 1

The Founding Fathers of Rock and Roll were having it real tough in the early '60's because of the phenomenon called "The British Invasion." However, the sad irony of it all was that the "British Invasion" was nothing more than young, white, frilly Englishmen singing recycled, anemic versions of the black rhythm and blues masterpieces that these same now redundant Founding Fathers had crafted. For example, in 1965, Herman's Hermits, a throwaway British bubble gum "Silhouettes" to band were performing millions on The Ed Sullivan Show, while The Rays, were singing their original, soulful 1957 version to 23 drunks in Patsy's Clam Bar in Providence, Rhode Island, and happy to get the gig.

And this was the scenario that produced in beloved 60's South Amboy a "happening" the idea of which was as likely as the Hindenburg landing on the corner of Augusta Street and Broadway: Little Richard was coming to town!

There were two very conflicting reasons that made his appearance in town virtually impossible. First, he was way too big a star. How big? The almighty Beatles themselves ruling the world's airwaves at the time humbly pointed to Little Richard as their hero and mentor; two of his songs (Tutti Fruitti & Long Tall Sally) had been covered greedily by the likes of Elvis Presley and Pat Boone, and been made #1 hits for them; he was the performing star in a Hollywood movie, "The Girl Can't Help It." starring Janye Mansfield! Why in the world would he be coming to a small bar in a small town in Central New Jersey?

On the other hand, Little Richard was way too small. For one, he had given up

Flush with the success from the England gig, he came back to the States, and put out a new album, but it went nowhere. His early music wasn't dead, those early songs made up a big part of the English groups repertoire, but nobody wanted to hear him sing them.

In 1966 Colonel Coopers was a thriving, successful night club on Route 35 North in South Amboy. It was a hit! If Snooki and The Situation and Jwow and DJ Pauly etc. were around then this is the place they would have frequented. On the weekends, it was where the great current bands (Gary Criss and the Crystals, The Green Men) played 60's hits and where the girls came from everywhere to dance. But on Thursday nights they featured big name Rock and Roll All Stars: Smokey Robinson, Ben E, King, The Drifters, Chuck Jackson, The Coasters, Del Shannon, The Isley Brothers, and now, magically, for me, Little Richard!!!





Avoid Injury While Enjoying Golf

Most golf injuries are related to the swing. The most common injuries are to the lower back, and for right handed people, the left wrist, followed by the left hand, left shoulder and left knee. Left handed people would be the opposite; the right wrist, followed by the right hand, right shoulder and right knee. Sprains, strains and tendonitis are the most common complaints.

Many of today's volunteer firefighters prevents millennials from building a longare following in the footsteps of a long standing family tradition. Many are fifth generation firefighters, and some have even followed the family footsteps and served as fire chiefs. But, is this dedicated service to the community nearing its end? The volunteer fire service in this country is in a "CRISIS" and there is NO doubt about it. Volunteerism is dying a slow death. Those of you that belong to organizations, clubs, or any type of volunteer group are finding it difficult to find members to step forward, step up and take leadership positions, or just volunteer their time. Society has changed over the last 50 years and so has the fire service. It seems that nobody has the spare time any more or we hear the excuse that there are not enough hours in the day to accomplish what needs to be done. Remember, we still have the same 24 hours in a day in year 2020 as we had in a day in 1950. It is all about how you manage those 24 hours.


Although nearly 70% of the firefighters in this country are volunteers, our recruitment and retention rates are in decline and our ranks must also be involved in making changes are aging. The average age of a volunteer firefighter is 54 years old. Fire departments are finding it difficult to attract younger members due to a variety of reasons, including increased demands on people's time, longer commuting distances to and from work, the prevalence of two-income households, and increased training requirements.


According to a PEW study, millennials place a higher value on helping people than on making money. In a 2015 study commissioned by the National Volunteer Fire Council, they were also the generation most interested in volunteering for the fire service. Why then does the fire service volunteerism continue to decline? The fire service resists change, leaving many departments structured for a time when people worked in or near the communities they lived. This is not the norm any longer. Employees are no longer devoted to one employer and continue working for that single employer until retirement age. Without pensions or other financial incentives, young employees frequently switch jobs, which


term relationship with employers that would give them the flexibility for remaining active in the local fire department. In order to make ends meet, we find middle- and workingclass people, who form the backbone of our volunteer firefighting force, working longer hours or multiple jobs. There is not just one negative aspect to retaining and recruiting firefighters. What are our local governments doing to provide an incentive to retain those highly skilled and trained firefighters? What are they doing to bring new members into the departments? It has been calculated that at the present time, it would cost approximately \$6 million to provide a career fire department in our local community. Can our community afford the increase in taxes to support such a move? Divide the number of households in town into \$6 million. The resulting figure would be the amount of increased tax per homeowner per year. It would be substantial, and many residents would not be able to absorb these increased taxes.

The fire departments themselves to the rules and regulations that govern their departments. Sometimes it may be necessary to alter or adjust the regulations due to a member's working status. There are various rule changes that can be adopted to compensate for a member's work schedule, family responsibilities, traveling, etc. We also need to have competent leaders in the fire service. I have personally seen many firefighters leave the fire service due to incompetent and/or undesirable leaders, leaders who made them feel unwanted or unappreciated. A "Thank You" or a "Good Job" said by the Chief after a large fire goes a long way in making that firefighter feel appreciated for their efforts. In closing, I see that changes need to be made and made soon if there is to continue to be a volunteer firefighting service in our country. Hopefully those in charge of the fire services will also see the need to make changes and get stared!



With the recent outbreak of COVID-19, communities all across the nation are finding creative ways to support those on the front lines and show love with social distancing. They noticed that the senior citizens were struggling to get groceries and local restaurants were losing business. First they name, address and phone number for any senior citizens who were looking for support in terms of food. Members were allowed to submit information for a senior they know

After several meetings, they put a plan in place. Beginning in mid-March, these officers have been collecting monetary donations from Sayreville residents and

A small community joins together to surrounding communities of any amount via a PayPal transaction. In just 2 hours, they had collected over \$2,000 worth of donations, and the contributions kept coming.

> The money collected would be used to purchase individual dinners from local restaurants, rotating on a weekly basis which are used. They would then hand deliver these meals to local senior citizens who were on the list, every Sunday evening. As each week passed, more seniors were added or re-added, and more donations flooded the account.

> "We are overwhelmed with the support, never did we expect it to mean this much," says Magee, "we've even had restaurants so willing to help, that they are trying to give us free meals to deliver. We are grateful for their generosity, but insist on paying full price. It is so important for us to keep these local businesses open, in addition to feeding our elderly citizens."

> These officers have received card after card of tear-filled elders and family members overfilled with gratitude. Because of all the donations, these officers also set up a "Drive By Pick Up" once a week for senior citizens to pick up prepared meals at headquarters.

On March 6, Tara was performing with her fellow Knicks dancers as the Knicks hosted the Oklahoma City Thunder. A week later the NBA halted the season due to the COVID-19 crisis. The loss of her dancing job didn't make her idle, because she is an ICU nurse at Robert Wood Johnson, hospital caring for COVID-19 patents. She said their unit went almost overnight from regular patients to COVID. She has been working around 60 hours a week.
