His virtual speech mentioned the Covid-19 pandemic, renovating the Allie Clark sports complex, the state of the police and fire departments, plus continued development of the waterfront and ferry service to New York City. "It appears that the Covid pandemic is finally behind us, and many aspects of our lives are getting back to normal. I would like to begin by thanking all our first responders, our food pantries, and all of those who volunteered in so many ways for the service they provided during this natural crisis." Henry said he was thankful to those who offered their time and money to help those affected by Covid-19. He said the senior

Messiah Lutheran Church Food Pantry

Messiah Lutheran Church is located on 3091 Bordentown Avenue in Parlin, next door to PNC Bank.

Our food pantry is open to anyone in need every second Tuesday of each month from 6-8 PM, and every third Saturday of each month from 12-2 PM. These are the days no other food pantry in the area is open.

We don't require ID, and it doesn't matter where the people are from. We have a monthly food drive on the last Saturday of each month, posting only on social media pages of surrounding communities. This helps us to replenish our pantry, besides what our congregants donate. It started slowly, but now we have been getting more and more families in need. As you know, grocery prices have increased 40% over the last several months, and more and more families are feeling the pinch. There is also a Blessing Box in our

front parking lot that is filled almost daily with nonperishables and available 24/7 to anyone in need. We keep a small donation box next to it that people use to drop off donations if no one is at the church. We are fortunate to have a full size freezer and a refrigerator that enables us to take in perishables like dairy products and meats to distribute. For Thanksgiving we had donations of turkeys and chickens to hand out with all the items to make a Thanksgiving dinner.

At Christmas there were turkeys and hams with fixings, and for Easter we had hams and chickens to hand out along with bags containing goods to make chicken soup, including a recipe. There was also a goodie bag to go with the ham and a recipe and fixings for pea soup. No one should have to worry about having enough food to feed their family. We hope to keep growing.

Yearbook-Hoffman 1977

The Bee Gees had the top hit in the U.S. with "You Should Be Dancing," when Hoffman High School Class of '77 returned for its final year in September 1976. Joseph DePasquale was principal, and some of his fine faculty included Joseph Donnelly, Thomas Gifford, Carlotta Miller, Christine Silla. Joanne Szatkowski was editor of the yearbook, which was dedicated to teachers, Tony Gonsalves and Carol McDonnell. Cindy Coughlin was president of the National Honor Society. Senior Class officers were president-Patti Dooling, vice president-Mark Costanzo, treasurer-Sharon Pawlowski, secretary-Joanne Szatkowski. "Roots" appeared on TV and was a huge hit. The nation suffered its coldest January in history... While on the sports scene at Hoffman, the baseball team under rookie coach Reggie Carney turned in an impressive 15-9 mark. Some of the talented senior athletes at the John St. institution were: Nancy Bloodgood, Susan DiGiambattista, Mary Ellen Donnelly, Dennis Quinlan, Patti Dooling, Greg Kardos, Guy Peters, Karen Kubinak, Judith Neumann, John Stratton, Karen Munck, Sandra Nagy, Keith Switzer, Sharon Pawlowski, Chester Zygmanski, David Newton, Joanne Szatkowski, John Conlon, Pat Eppinger. At graduation time, "I'm Your Boogie Man" was the #1 song in the nation. Sandra Nagy was valedictorian and Cindy Coughlin, the salutatorian. This class will go down in history as one of the nicest and friendliest in the school's spectacular history!

cost to the taxpayers of South Amboy," he added. Henry also thanked Brian Noble and Tom Bikinski for their input into the design of the fields. Mayor Henry said safety is very important to city residents and noted a new emergency generator was installed at city hall. He said South Amboy received a \$1 million grant to install new lighting and cameras along Broadway and the waterfront walkway. He praised the city fire department. "Our volunteer fire department is the finest there is, and I continue to support them with the upgrades that they need to keep us safe. Last year we replaced two of our fire fighting vehicles and now that we have more revenue coming in, we replaced two of our fire chief's cars. These items cost over \$2 million." he said. Henry noted they spent tens of thousands of dollars for equipment the firefighters need and added he wanted to ensure the fire department has the best equipment that can be provided. Henry said the First Aid Squad has been reorganized under the fire department. They now have a shared agreement with Woodbridge to cover South Amboy when we can't and at no cost to the residents. A new vehicle has been budgeted for the First Aid Squad with zero increase to taxpayers. Mayor Henry said the police department is also important to public safety. "In cooperation with Police Chief Darren LaVigne there will be no "defunding the police" in South Amboy! In fact it is just the opposite. It was my honor and pleasure earlier this year to promote two new lieutenants. I congratulate Lieutenant Dan Holovacko, and Lieutenant Patti Kanecke. Patti was the first female sergeant in South Amboy history, and now the first female Lieutenant." he said. Henry said the city is planning to add more patrol officers later this year to continue making South Amboy a safe place to live and grow a family. Mayor Henry said he sees the light

of the tunnel for the ferry project. He said the city has received the waterfront permit from the Army Corps of Engineers to proceed with work on the ferry. He said paperwork and filings have been submitted and they are waiting for final approval to go out and bid for the ferry complex construction. "This has been a long process which started decades ago and has not been without a few snags along the way." he said. The mayor thanked Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin, Congressman Frank Pallone, Assemblywoman Yvonne Lopez, and Senator Joe Vitale for their continued support of the project. "We have a team of professionals who have been working diligently and we are preparing to have a temporary service this fall" he added. Mayor Henry is proud of the changes occurring in South Amboy. "Redevelopment has been an important component for the progress we have witnessed in South Amboy. It has helped bring about a transformation of our city with additions to LightHouse Bay, Ryan Homes, and Bayshore Cove (formerly Woodmont Cove). It has also brought us the YMCA and Venetian Healthcare. And now we can add Station Bay to our beautiful waterfront." Henry said. He added there were six brownfields in South Amboy when he became mayor that have been remediated or are in the process of remediation at no cost to the taxpayer. He said the city is putting residential where it should be, along the waterfront and industry, where it belongs, at the old JCP&L power plant and along lower Main Street. He said future projects include replacing our old American Legion office and building new homes for homeless veterans. He said construction of a Memorial Veterans Park near the gazebo on Bordentown Ave. is being planned to properly honor South Amboy veterans who have made the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty.

Construction Engineering Contract Awarded For South Amboy Ferry

The South Amboy City Council has awarded a contract to Colliers Engineering & Design to provide engineering services during the construction of the City's Radford Passenger Ferry facility. This was the last critical step to complete prior to the project being approved to go out to bid.

Over the past several months the City has been completing final preparations to begin construction of this long awaited addition

to Middlesex County mass transit facilities. Through an agreement with the New Jersey Department of Transportation the State of New Jersey has agreed to provide needed dredging at the ferry site this summer. Once the construction bid is awarded Colliers will be providing direct project oversight until delivery of the finished facility.

"Providing a ferry service between ports in New York and New Jersey plays a vital role in connecting communities by supporting social and economic activities and access to amenities that is beneficial to both locations. We are proud to be the Construction Engineering & Inspection firm that is an integral part in facilitating this significant transportation project" said Paul Nolan PE, senior principal at Colliers.

"The Ferry project is the keystone to our continued development of the waterfront and we are working with all stakeholders to begin construction and establish an interim Ferry service at the earliest possible date" said City Administrator Glenn Skarzynski.

Census records include invaluable resource information that can help make connections across generations and provide your family history research building blocks.

As a strategy for locating earlier

generations, family researchers generally find it most helpful to begin with the most current census and work backward. It was also suggested to search for the last/first name of the head of the household (plus state and county of residence if known), as that surname was usually written on the form. Multiple filters can be selected to narrow your search. To access the 1950 census, visit <https://1950Census.Archives.gov>. The community is welcome to drop in the Library for assistance.

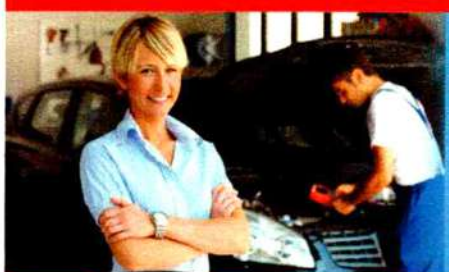

My home is all electric. To save money, I lowered my thermostat and even shut the heat off in rooms I seldom enter. For a few days I had no heat at all because of the maintenance man coming here to check why four of my heating registers weren't working. When he found the problem, he forgot to turn the heat back on when he was done. So, when I got my electric bill, I couldn't believe my eyes, as it was almost \$170 more than it was for January 2021. So, I used less heat but had to pay more.

All of us are seeing and feeling the "pinch" of increased costs. Gasoline prices are eating away at our budgets and the predictions are almost ominous over how high a gallon of gas will go. Meanwhile, all the necessities of life which we had taken for granted, e.g. paper items such as toilet paper, paper towels, and paper napkins, are getting thinner and thinner. Last year when toilet paper became harder to find than the proverbial pot of gold at the end of the rainbow, paper products suddenly reappeared on store shelves. The difference was it had changed drastically. Toilet paper became thinner, paper towels became thinner, and so did paper napkins. In fact every paper product continued to become thinner except for their cost, meaning we are now getting less but paying more...in some cases, a lot more.

Has anyone else noticed how tiny our postage stamps have become? They are so small now it's getting difficult to peel them from the sheet. The stamps may have shrunk but the cost surely hasn't. It's the same with magazines. Soon, they'll be the size of the old TV Guide magazines we used to buy years ago except, although the pages in each have become less, the cost for each has skyrocketed.

I remember when I used to go for a grocery order every week. Having far, far less choices at the store, I would usually have six doubled bags of groceries to carry into the house, enough to last until the next weekly paycheck rolled around. Living on a budget, it had actually been easy back then to grocery shop as there hadn't been about 20 aisles filled with fifty different brands and sizes of the same item. How quick it was to choose from the standard 16 oz. or 8 oz. canned foods on the shelves and the 1 lb.

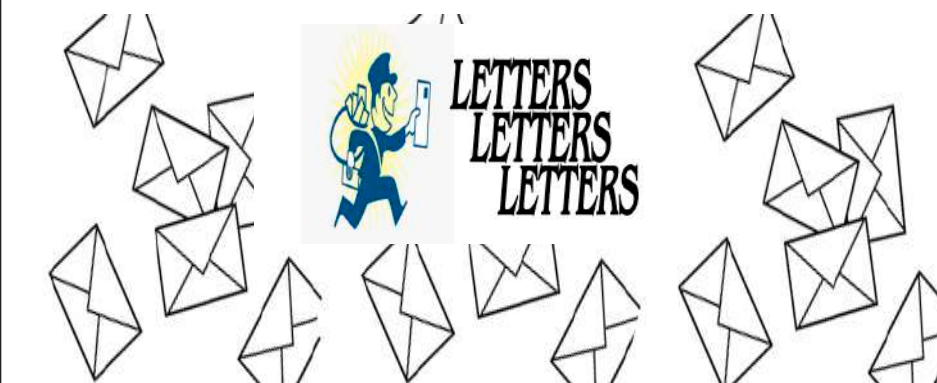


Letter to the Editor

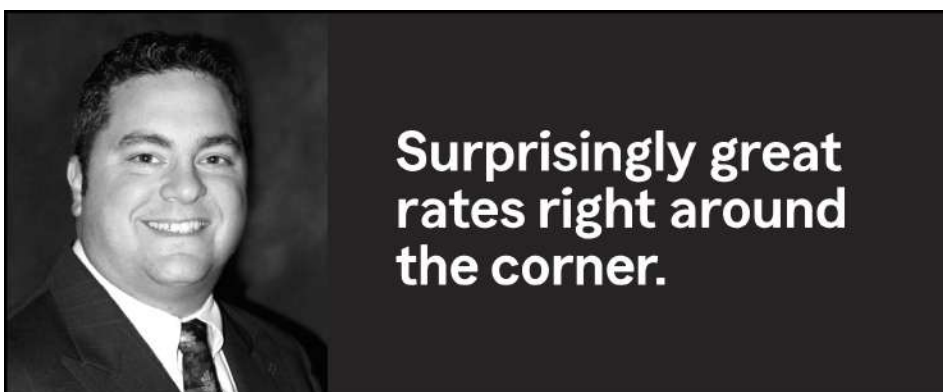

40 Years Ago: South Amboy P.B.A. Helps First Aid

April 16, 1982-Amateur Boxing matches came to South Amboy, courtesy of the South Amboy Police Dept. P.B.A. #63, in a fundraising event they organized for the benefit of the South Amboy First Aid Squad. Sgt. James Holovacko (who later became Chief of Police) along with Det. Sgt. Ray Durski, South Amboy Police Officers Steve Malkiewicz, Ken Szatkowski, and Bob McKeon, put lots of time, work and energy into making the event a huge success, and it certainly was outstanding, as over 1,000 fans attended, and more than \$1,500 was raised for the First Aid.

There were 24 boxers on the Golden Gloves sanctioned slate, and they were paired off into 12 three-round bouts from different boxing clubs including Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Plainfield, and other hot spots throughout the state. The Sayreville Karate Association (SKA) participated in 2 bouts, winning one. Det. Steve Malkiewicz served as ring announcer, and was dressed in a black dinner jacket with a carnation in the lapel.

The hometown fans couldn't wait to see the match between the locals, 27-year old Randy "Pigeon" Poliny of Morgan, a left-hander, who was a former NJ Golden Gloves contender, against South Amboy's own Ron Stillwagon. The highly-anticipated bout did not last the scheduled 3 rounds, and The News Tribune, who covered the event, reported that "Randy Poliny knocked out Ron Stillwagon with a big left hook, flooring him twice in the second round." The story also said, "Before the fight, Stillwagon called it a "grudge" match, and the two boxers displayed noticeable hostility toward each other in the ring." In a recent phone interview, Stillwagon said "There were hostilities between us, and being well-known, local guys, we were used to draw a crowd for the fundraising event." There was probably a good portion of the 1,000 plus crowd from South Amboy/Sayreville on hand to root for their favorite boxer.

Holovacko said, "I think local boxers who took part were used to schoolyard or playground fights, where a couple of punches were thrown, and a lot of pushing and shoving was involved. Most of the participants found that 3 rounds of 2 minutes each, took a lot of stamina, just to stand and move around the ring with their arms raised, throwing or blocking punches. The fundraiser was quite challenging, and we all came away with a real appreciation of the effort the boxers gave."

Poliny shared his recollections of this big night, saying, "This was the first time in my life that my dad, Andy Poliny, who was the founder of Fred's Bait & Tackle Shop in

Morgan, came to see me compete in anything. It was like the Ali-Frazier fight. He proudly continued, "After the fight, when I walked out of there, I was on top of the world, with my girl Carrie L. on one arm, and a trophy on the other. No matter where I went that night after the fight, I owned South Amboy."

Notes: Randy Poliny boxed in the NJ Golden Gloves in 1973, turning in a (3-1) record in the Middleweight class, with the lone defeat coming on a decision in the semifinals at Elizabeth Armory. He has three boxing trophies that he is very proud of including one from the Bayonne PAL (where he trained for the Golden Gloves), a Golden Gloves trophy, and also the trophy from South Amboy P.B.A. for his victory in 1982...

Jim Holovacko praised his fellow police officers for the help they gave him in "arranging things for the event." He singled out Ray Durski, Steve Malkiewicz, Bob McKeon and Ken Szatkowski. In addition he shared that "One of the highlights each year was local fan, Louis Meszaros, who was one of the first to purchase a ringside seat. He always shadow-boxed during each match, and heartily cheered on the participants."

The P.B.A. sponsored Amateur Boxing fundraising events were held for 4 years from 1981-1984. The first one in '81 was for a local youth who was badly burned in an accident. The 1982 event was for the South Amboy First Aid Squad, while the 1983 and 1984 were for the benefit of the Scholarship Fund for St. Mary's and Hoffman High Schools.

The Smoke Column

Fire safety has come a long way in the state of New Jersey over the last forty years. Before 1980, there was no state-wide recognized fire safety organization to monitor all aspects of fire safety throughout the state. There was no licensing of fire inspectors in communities, no certified training requirements for firefighters, and no single umbrella organization for all fire related personnel and activities to fall under. Each town followed rules established by their own community and there was a lot of freelancing among the people inspecting buildings. There were no legal responsibilities in place nor regulating agencies for inspections.

Deadly incidents that occurred in the early 80's brought a welcomed change to the fire service. The Division of Fire Safety under the Department of Community Affairs was established. On July 26, 1980, in the shore community of Bradley Beach, a deadly fire occurred at the Brindley Inn Boarding Home. Most of the residents had been referred to the boarding home by state mental health care institutions. Most of the residents were elderly or mentally impaired and 24 of the 38 residents died because of the fire. The fire started in a concealed space in the basement and traveled up the open stairway to the sleeping areas on the second and third floors. There were no legal requirements in effect at the time for boarding home safety inspections.

Only six months later and ten miles from Bradley Beach, 13 residents of the Beachview Rest Home in Keansburg died because of a roaring fire. This facility housed 114 residents who were mostly elderly and mentally challenged. The fire started at approximately 4:00am and was so intense that flames were coming out of the entire front of the building as first responders arrived on scene. Survivors, some naked, others in pajamas, were huddled in front of the building in sub-freezing temperatures when authorities first arrived. The building

did not have fire sprinklers because they were not required under state law at that time but did have smoke detectors. Once again, there were no state fire inspection laws in effect at the time of this disaster.

Once the Division of Fire Safety was established, Fire Bureaus were formed in all communities throughout the state. Inspections are now required in many buildings of high occupancy and high hazard. The types of inspections and the frequency of inspection depend on the use type and occupancy. Buildings now had to follow a multitude of life safety initiatives and were given a prescribed time to complete them. Credentialing of fire officials, fire inspectors, firefighters was now the norm. Courses were developed and were made mandatory for these positions. It was not just a matter of completing the course but to prove your knowledge of the material, each position required the successful passing of a 100-question state test to be certified for that position. Fire officials and fire inspectors must continue to take classes to keep their certification. Rules, regulations, and codes are constantly changing and these inspectors must keep abreast of the changes.

The benefit of the Division of Fire Safety has been a reduction in the loss of life from fires. Local fire inspectors have the responsibility of inspecting structures where people live, meet, play, and work. By inspecting these facilities for fire violations and having these violations corrected, may help to prevent a tragedy from occurring. If these provisions were in place in the early 80's, maybe those boarding homes fires would not have occurred.

So, when you see your local fire inspectors entering buildings and structures in your community, they are doing their job in protecting the residents of the community and gathering vital structural information for the fire service.

ICYMI: Now Law Coughlin, Mukherji, Moriarty & McKnight Legislation Helping Food Pantries Transition to Reusable Bags

Law to Give 6-Month Extension, Donate 500,000 Reusable Bags

Food banks and pantries have faced several challenges over the past two years with rising demand for food, supply chain disruptions, labor shortages, and inflation straining operational capacity.

Recognizing that the ban on single-use carryout bags could further hamper food aid operations, Assembly Speaker Craig J. Coughlin together with Assembly members Raj Mukherji, Paul Moriarty and Angela McKnight sponsor a new law (A-2065).

Signed by the Governor on Friday, it gives food banks and food pantries another six months to prepare for compliance with New Jersey's ban on single-use plastic and disposable paper carryout bags that starts on May 4th/

"The demand for food assistance persists and so what this legislation does is balance the desire to become a more environmentally friendly state with our ability to support organizations which continue to be critical in keeping people fed," said Coughlin (D-Middlesex).

The measure also provides 500,000 free reusable carryout bags for the State's food banks as part of the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection's information and education campaign.

"By creating this extension in addition to distributing 500,000 reusable bags, we're providing both the time and resources that we recognize pantries facing high demand need in order to be successful in making

the shift," said Coughlin. "We simply can't leave our food insecure families behind and this bill thoughtfully ensures that we don't."

"It's important to make sure we transition away from single-use plastic and paper carryout bags responsibly," said Assemblyman Mukherji (D-Hudson). "By giving organizations that help fight homelessness and food insecurity more time to prepare for the transition to reusable bags, we can ensure our residents do not lose access to critical resources they need to keep food on their tables."

"Food pantries and food banks perform a noble service in our communities. They are on the front lines in the fight against food and security," said Assemblyman Paul Moriarty (D-Camden, Gloucester). "This new law supports them as we move to reduce our reliance on the use of plastic bags throughout the state."

"Food banks and pantries do important work connecting our food insecure residents with critical assistance," said Assemblywoman McKnight (D-Hudson). "The new law gives food banks and pantries the time and resources they need to prepare for the upcoming statewide ban on single-use plastic and paper bags, ensuring they can continue helping countless New Jersey families in need."

The law passed both houses of the Legislature last Thursday, with a vote of 58-16-1 in the Assembly.

Pallone Announces New Jersey Will Receive an Estimated \$154 Million for New Transportation and Climate Investments from Bipartisan Infrastructure Law

Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) today announced that New Jersey will receive an estimated \$154,483,918 in funding from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. The funding will provide more transportation options, ease congestion, and reduce carbon pollution across the state.

"The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law continues to deliver more funding for cleaner, more convenient transportation options in New Jersey," said Pallone. "At a time when oil companies are ripping off New Jerseyans at the gas pump, this funding will help slash commute times, lower costs for working

families, combat harmful carbon pollution and support good-paying jobs right here at home. I'm going to continue partnering with our state and local leaders to put these investments to work."

The funding comes from the Federal Highway Administration's Carbon Reduction Program, a new initiative established by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. The funding can be used to improve public transit services, bolster electric vehicle charging infrastructure, improve traffic flow, and construct pedestrian and bicycle trails.

The Spinal Column

Age and Muscle Loss

As the years pass, our bodies change. Our body's muscle, atrophy. The muscle mass in our bodies generally shrink and strength and power decline. This is called sarcopenia, age related muscle loss. It can begin around age 35 and occurs at a rate of 1 to 2 percent per year. After the age of 60, it can increase to 3 per cent per year. On average adults who don't do any regular strength training can expect to lose 4-6 pounds of muscle per decade. However, most people don't see the numbers on the scale going down, which means they are replacing that muscle with fat! There are two types of muscle fibers, fast-twitch and slow-twitch. Fast-twitch fibers provide bursts of power which are lost at a greater rate than slow-twitch fibers, which provide steady power. This means that you're not only growing weaker, you are also getting slower!

Weak muscles speed the loss of independence putting everyday activities out of reach, such as walking, cleaning, shopping, yard work and dressing. It also limits recovery time from illness or injury. Disability is 1.5 to 5 times higher in older adults with moderate to severe muscle loss than those with normal muscle mass. Weak muscles also make it more difficult to move and balance properly.

It is not surprising that one in every three adults age 65 and older fall each year. Some of these falls can be very serious with bone fractures and admittance into long term facilities. According to the CDC, these falls lead to more than 800,000 hospitalizations per year. But strength, balance and power training help. People with stronger muscles are less likely to fall and when they do fall, they are less likely to sustain serious injuries.

As always, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure!

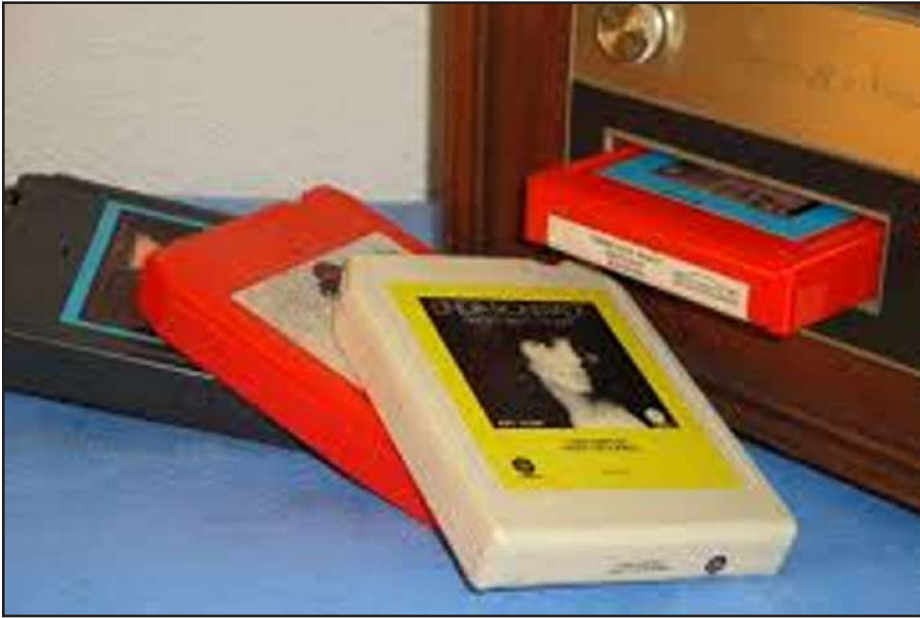

Salt Water

Striped Bass fishing in Raritan Bay has picked up. A charter boat caught and released a 40 inch Striped Bass by the Victory Bridge in Perth Amboy. That area is producing fish. I saw 3 short Bass caught in a row within 5 minutes. I also saw people missing bites at the usual spots at Ideal Beach, Keansburg and Cliffwood beaches. Party boat fishing is still fair for Blackfish, a few Cod and Ling. A good bet is rock jetties lining Barnegat Inlet by the light. Some nice keeper Blackfish are being caught here. The surf at both LBI and Island Beach is coming to life with a few Stripers caught in the surf. Stripers continue to bite in the back bay at LBI and the first Black Drum of the year was caught there. Some White Perch are also biting in the lagoon in that area. Striped Bass and Bluefish regulations remain the same as last year. The new Fluke regulations are a few more days added to the season with 3 fish limit. Two can be at 17 to 17.9 inches and the 3rd must be 18 inches. This rule awaits final approval.

Fresh Water

Opening day Trout season was flooded out by the recent torrential downpours. I didn't even bother to go due to the bad conditions. A few Trout may have been caught in the high swollen waters. My wife and I headed down to Spring Lake to try for the big Trout stocked there a day earlier. We seem to have caught everything but Trout. Among our catches were 3 Largemouth Bass, a Yellow Perch and a Sunfish. The biggest was a 16 inch Largemouth Bass caught by my wife. I only saw 2 Trout by other anglers. Shad are moving into the Delaware River which remains high.

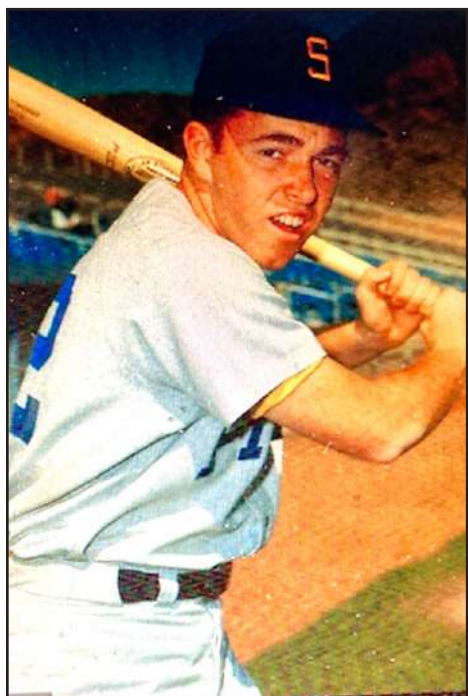

Remembering Dale Kurowsky

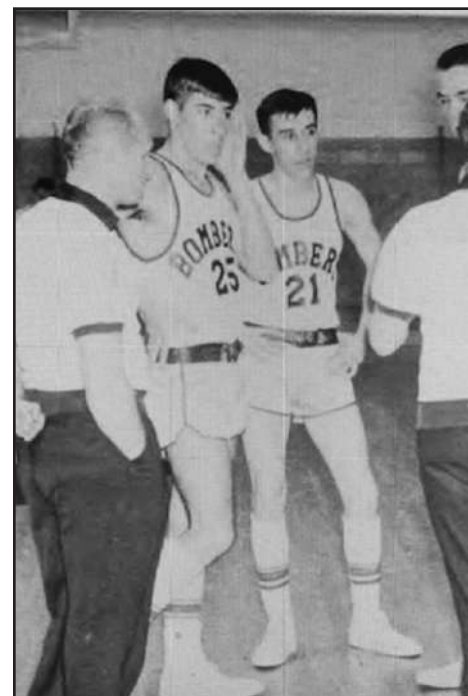

Dale Kurowsky was one of the greatest Sayreville Bombers two-sport stars in the school's history. Five years ago on April 10, 2017, he passed away at the age of 67, and it was recently brought to our attention that this outstanding person/athlete had died.

A '67 graduate of Sayreville War Memorial HS, he set a new single game scoring record for the Blue & Gray basketball team in 1967, by pouring in 50 points. He had a great year and was rewarded by being a 1st Team All-County, All-State, and just about All-Everything selection.

In addition, Dale was amazing on the baseball diamond. He was selected 1st Team All-State, All-Groups in the Star Ledger, (which translates to the #1, best first baseman in all of NJ); 1st Team All-State Group IV; 1st Team Middlesex County All Star first baseman by the New York Daily News; 1st Team All-Middlesex in the Star Ledger; 1st Team All-County-The Evening News; 1st Team All-County-New Brunswick Home News.

Dale was an incredible athlete and team leader. I was blessed and lucky to be one of his teammates in 1967 on Coach Danny Lewis' South Amboy Carleton League baseball champions. Dale batted a superb .407 on that team. Following his stellar high school career, Dale attended Randolph-Macon College, where he starred in baseball and basketball. After graduating from college he served in the U.S. Armed Forces, was a

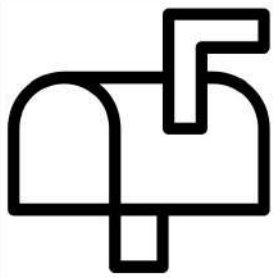

**New Jersey State Legislators Coughlin &
Gopal Propose Later School Start Time for
NJ High Schools to Boost Teen Mental Health**

New Jersey's education system continues
to rank best in the nation, but following two
incredibly tough pandemic years the national
picture for child mental health is worsening to
the detriment of students and their educational
outcomes.

Beginning the work of addressing this
national youth mental health crisis, Assembly
Speaker Craig J. Coughlin and Senator Vin
Gopal introduced legislation Thursday, which
proposes to push statewide high school start
times in New Jersey to no earlier than 8.30
a.m. beginning in the 2024-2025 school year.

"When students are well-rested and
eat nutritious meals they're better prepared
to succeed in school," said Coughlin
(D-Middlesex). "Overwhelmingly the
research and success stories out of other
states' school districts show that the benefits
of later start times to students' holistic well-
being, in terms of both mental health and
academic performance, easily outweigh the
costs."

Biological rhythms naturally induce
teenagers to get to bed later, so when first
period starts too early it puts more pressure
on the sleep process and can worsen sleep
quality. Deepening the link between sleep
and mental health, a recent study found that
teens starting school before 8:30 a.m. can be
at particular risk of experiencing depression
and anxiety.

"Sleep is fundamental to students' mental
and physical well-being," said Senator Vin
Gopal (D-Monmouth). "Ensuring students
are getting enough rest is an important first
step toward addressing the alarming rise in
student mental health issues we're seeing in
New Jersey."

"The New Jersey Chapter of the
American Academy of Pediatrics (NJAAP)
enthusiastically supports this bill sponsored
by Speaker Coughlin and Senator Gopal,
which encourages later school start times

for high schools in New Jersey," said Jeanne
Craft, MD, FAAP, President of the New
Jersey Chapter of American Academy of
Pediatrics. "Research demonstrates that later
school start times for adolescents contribute
to better academic performance, quality of
life, mental health and school attendance."

NJAAP's Task Force on Adolescent
Sleep & School Start Times, led by Dr. Bert
Mandelbaum, has long advocated for later
start times and has been working to educate
about the importance of improved adolescent
sleep and mental health.

"Nothing has proven school districts are
capable of making rapid changes to adapt
and optimize student learning more than
the pandemic," said Coughlin. "With clear
evidence that a later start helps students, the
opportunity to take action has arrived."

This legislation ties into the broader
push by the Assembly Speaker to transform
how child mental health policy is understood
and perceived in New Jersey, and to improve
access, treatment, and integration of care
across settings.

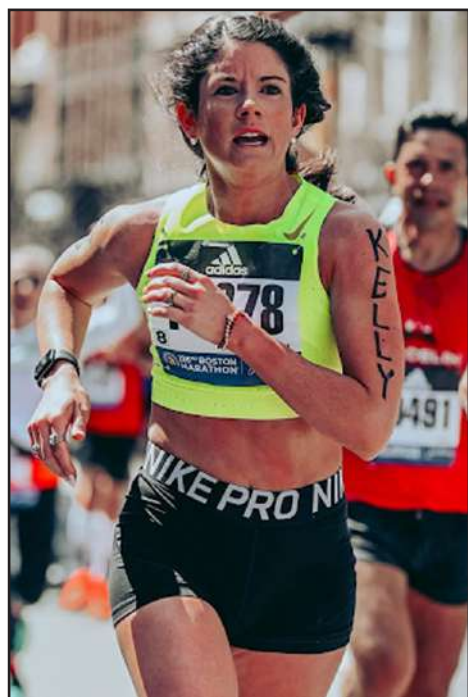

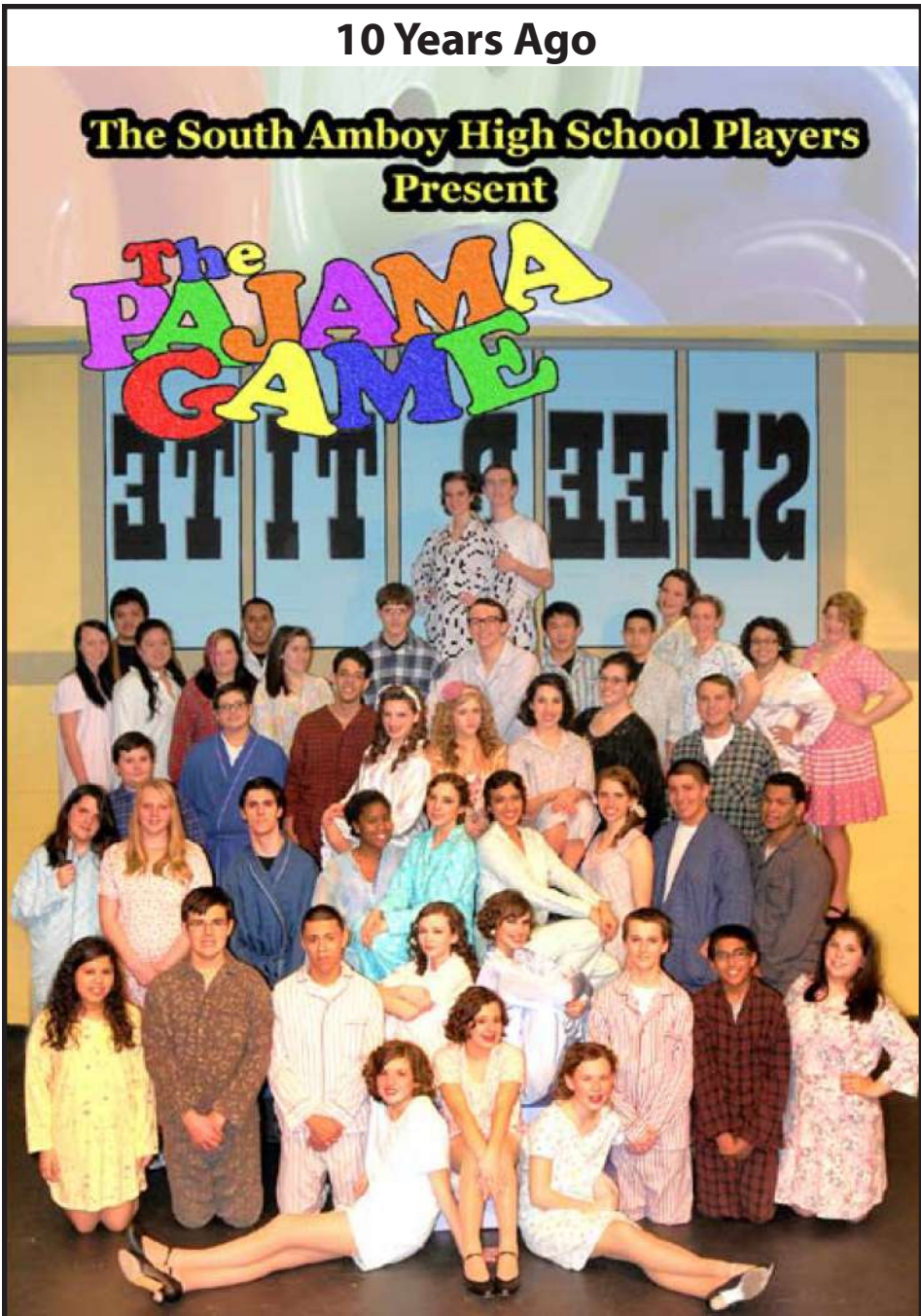

Pallone: New Jersey Will Receive an Additional \$12.7 Million To Help Families Lower Energy Bills

New Jersey has Received Over \$302 Million from Assistance Pallone Included in Major Funding Bills

Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) today applauded the additional \$12.7 million New Jersey will receive for home energy assistance. The state has received a total of \$302,351,448 for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) that helps families struggling with the costs of home energy bills.

"This funding will help families across New Jersey keep up with their energy bills. This comes as much-needed relief for the millions of families struggling to make ends meet," Pallone said. "I'm glad to see that we're still delivering federal dollars to New Jersey as we continue to confront the challenges that so many people are facing right now."

In January, Pallone announced that New Jersey received \$285 million from the American Rescue Plan - the highest amount for the program the state has ever received. Since then, New Jersey has received additional funding for the program from the government spending bill and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.

The American Rescue Plan more than doubled LIHEAP funding nationally. In 2021, the Biden Administration and Congressional Democrats delivered a total of \$8 billion in LIHEAP funding, including the \$4.5 billion Pallone championed in the American Rescue Plan - more than doubling the typical annual appropriations. These resources are already allowing states across the country to provide more home energy relief than ever before.

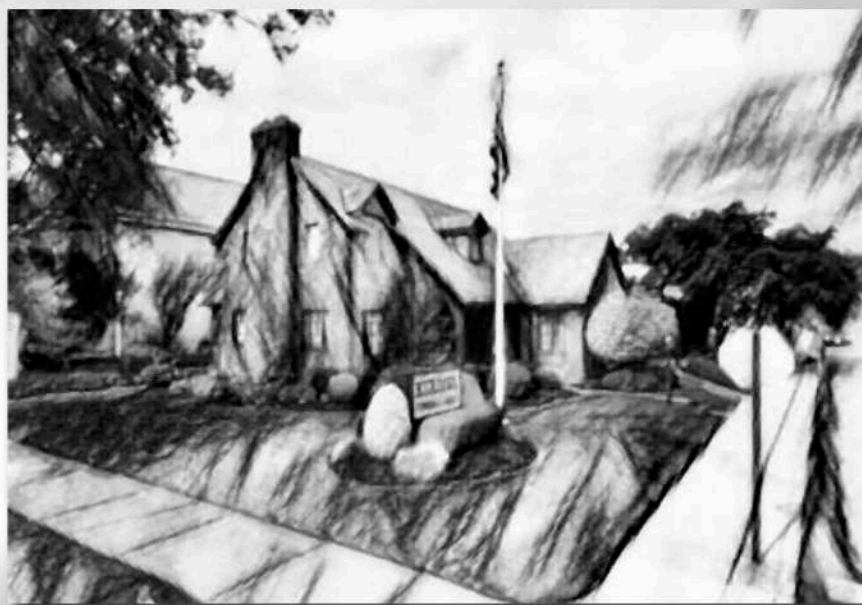
