

South Amboy Mayor: Changes Bring Progress By Steve Schmid

Mayor Fred Henry began his 2024 State of the City speech by utilizing the words of George Bernard Shaw, "Progress is impossible without change." He was referring to the new police chief, three new patrolmen, a new fire chief, a new business administrator, and a new confidential secretary. He said these changes have resulted in one of the "strongest teams working for South Amboy citizens." Joseph Matarangolo was sworn in on March 20 replacing Darren LaVigne who served the city for 36 years, the last 14 as police chief. Other promotions were Brian McCabe to Captain, Michael Kelly to Lieutenant, and Christopher Norek to Sergeant.

Henry said Robert (Max) Garcia, Kyle Gasiewski, and Marcus Nunez, have been added as patrolmen. He said the city has added more than 30 surveillance cameras around town plus better police scheduling which has made South Amboy "an extremely safe community in which to live" He thanked outgoing Fire Chief John Dragotta for an incredible year and congratulated new Fire Chief Timothy Gay. He announced that Protection Fire Company will be receiving a new \$1 million fire truck and will get \$75,000 for fire fighting equipment from a grant from the state Department of Community Affairs. He said they got \$52,000 for equipment last year. The First Aid Squad will receive a new ambulance later this year. "We also purchased 2 automatic stretchers, which will allow our volunteers to mechanically lift patients into the ambulance. I witnessed a demonstration and was so impressed with how much easier and quicker it was to move patients. This equipment will also save the backs of our volunteers!", the mayor said. Two new garbage trucks and a new dumpster have been ordered to help the Public Works department serve the community, he said.

The mayor said other infrastructure improvements are proceeding which include replacing the Raritan Street pumping station, and repaving North Broadway from Main to Augusta Streets. He said the city is awaiting approval for Phase 2, the repaying of South Broadway from Augusta Street to Bordentown Avenue. He said work has begun on two warehouse projects on lower Main Street. "These businesses will add revenue to the city with very little impact on city services and no impact on city streets," he said. The mayor said good planning allows the city to pay for projects along with salaries and obligations with a proposed property tax increase of \$68.70 a year or \$5.73 a month in the municipal portion of the tax bill for a home assessed at the city average of \$274,000. "This is lower than the inflation rate. With the cost of just about everything rising, this is an accomplishment of which I am very proud," the mayor said. He said the city has bought property at the corner of John and Broadway so they can create 80 parking places by tearing down the building. He is pleased with the resumption of ferry service to lower

Manhattan and said work on construction of the permanent ferry terminal is ahead of schedule. Henry said Veterans Memorial Plaza will be improved with the addition of plaques for South Amboy veterans who died in military service. The mayor concluded by quoting President John F. Kennedy who said, "Change is the way of life. And those who look only to the past or present are certain to miss the future." He added

"Change is inevitable and under my administration, we have created a future for South Amboy which is incredibly bright!"

FROM THE DESK OF TOM REILLY

There are many things we take for granted in these modern times. The internet, modern medicine, and many other innovations have (for the most part) greatly improved our lives. I suspect not too many of us wonder about how and why these things work. We send an email, it gets there; we take medicine, we feel better.

Something similar occurs in our community. We need an ambulance, it arrives; there's an emergency, someone is there to help; our children play sports, someone is there to coach them. We don't often think enough about the glue that holds our community together, and the people who tirelessly and, unfortunately, often thanklessly donate their time to improve our community and to provide needed services to our people.

Our volunteers deserve our recognition and gratitude. At a recent city council meeting I had the pleasure of recognizing four outstanding citizens who have donated countless hours to make our city a better place to live. Allow me to tell you a little bit about them.

Tim Walczak is a member of both our first aid and fire department. In addition to serving as Fire Chief in 2005, Tim was the first aid squad's highest call responder in both 2020 (the height of the pandemic, remember) and 2023, responding to 235 of the squad's 518 total calls.

Amy Dundee currently serves as treasurer and social media manager for the Friends of South Amboy, a local charitable organization helping disadvantaged residents in our community. Amy currently is working through the FEMA course list with the goal of joining the South Amboy Office of Emergency Management.

Phil English served as Fire chief in 1997, and currently is a member of the Office of Emergency Management, Hazmat Division. He also is a former member of Middlesex County Hazmat, where he worked as a hazardous materials



responder and was part of the response team on September 11th, 2001. On that fateful day, he was dispatched to Jersey City to complete decontamination operations for evacuees. Nowadays, he also assists our local food pantry.

Tony Gonsalves taught at South Amboy Middle High School for decades. During his time there, he coached everything from baseball, softball, basketball, tennis, and soccer. He also was instrumental in bringing a number of sports to our high school, including our tennis team. Through his years of service, he coached and mentored hundreds of our local students.

Volunteers like Tim, Amy, Phil, and Tony are representative of a wider group of people in our community who offer their time, service, and expertise to us and ask for little, if anything, in return. We don't think about our volunteers enough, but I assure you that – just like the internet or our cell phones – we would notice if they no longer were there.

So let's take some time in the coming months to recognize and thank our local volunteers. Better yet, I hope some of you will think about volunteering your time to a noble cause. You will be helping our community, and I promise you will help yourself along the way.



Damage was not too severe with normally train on the most common type incidents that may occur in our response area. Each area of the country is vulnerable to specific incidents and as such, responders train more heavily on those scenarios. On the West Coast, first responders' primary response may be to earthquakes, wildfires, and severe rain/flooding events so this is where they concentrate their training. North Central is more susceptible to severe cold temperatures and winter blizzards. The South and Central areas prepare for tornadoes which occur often and could cause massive wide area destruction. In the Northeast, there are many high-rise structures, extreme heat/ cold temperatures, and hurricanes. First responders train and perfect their response to the incidents that can be expected to occur in their community. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has online courses available for emergency personnel as well as civilians on different disasters. Each community has an Office of Emergency Management which helps to prepare a community in the event of a disaster, resources required in the response, and steps needed during the recovery phase. Social media is useful in providing information to the community quickly in an emergency situation. There are general non-specific preparedness plans for every community in the event of a disaster which can be quickly modified to suit any situation. Can anyone predict when and where the next earthquake will strike New Jersey? In the earth there are tectonic plates that are constantly shifting as one plate slides under another. This is a worldwide occurrence and damage becomes more severe the closer you are to the epicenter when the big shift occurs. Soil type and compactness also play a part in the severity and travel time of the quake. The earthquake that occurred on April

EARTHQUAKE! Really, not in New 5, 2024, was reported at 4.9 on the Richter most people reporting pictures falling off walls, knickknacks falling off shelves, houses shaking, and minor foundation cracks. But do we really know how much hidden damage is yet to be found? Could bridge footings and supports be damaged? Could high-rise structures have structural damage? How about the underground water distribution piping or the natural gas network? When the tectonic plates shift and the earth moves, these underground pipes have little to no give and could develop cracks. On the West Coast, there are standards for buildings when being constructed to withstand an earthquake. On the East Coast there are building standards for the high winds caused by a hurricane. Hurricane straps are installed in a structure that secures it to the foundation/footing. You can see that both these particular standards are for specific areas of the country and for the type of incident likely to occur. What should you do if you are experiencing an earthquake? Most earthquakes are of a short duration, lasting a few seconds, and are over before you may have a chance to react. But if you can, get outside and away from any structures that may collapse. Stay away from the collapse zone which is an area around the building that is at least one-half the building's height. Wooden structures may withstand earthquake forces better than a masonry constructed structure because of the flexibility in the wood. 

Pallone Leads Request to Federal Agencies to Protect North Atlantic Right Whale After **Baltimore Bridge Collapse**

Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ- the speed restriction rule pose a great risk not 06) sent a letter to the Departments of Commerce, Transportation, and Homeland Security urging them to enforce vessel speed restrictions following the collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge in Baltimore. In the letter, Pallone and 13 other Members of Congress expressed concern that higher volumes of vessel traffic in the Port of New York and New Jersey and the Port of Virginia could pose a grave threat to the North Atlantic right whale (NARW) if vessel speeds are not enforced.

According to a report from Oceana, most boats are traveling at high speeds in slow zones designated to protect the critically endangered North Atlantic right whale. Since a tragedy for the community and economy, 2017, more than 77 percent of deaths and injuries of the endangered North Atlantic right whale have been caused by vessel strikes and right whale is already in extinction's entanglements. "In your management of the Baltimore Key Bridge collapse emergency and efforts to re-route shipping to other East Coast ports, we write to request that your departments ensure increased maritime traffic is compliant with vessel speed rules during whale migration season. Strict compliance with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA)NorthAtlantic right whale (NARW) vessel speed restriction rule for vessels 65 feet and over will support the Administration's commitment to the Endangered Species Act and Marine Mammal Protection Act as well as mariner safety," the lawmakers wrote. "Ports that neighbor Baltimore, including the Port of New York and New Jersey and the Port of Virginia, already rank as some of the busiest in the country and other hightraffic East Coast ports, such as Savannah and Charleston, where breeding occurs, are also likely to experience a rise in traffic due to Baltimore's closure. Vessel operators that have been re-routed and do not comply with

only to vulnerable sea animals, but also to mariner safety," the lawmakers continued. "While we are focused on the NARW's long-term survival as a species, an additional disaster or environmental spill due to a lapse in compliance with existing safeguards would be devastating."

"Protecting North Atlantic right whales from boat strikes, and allowing their population to rebuild and even thrive, can be a historical success story — one that can lay a blueprint for protecting and restoring all of our ocean wildlife and ecosystems," said Sam Waterston, actor and Oceana board chair.

"The collapse of the Baltimore Bridge is and we need to ensure it doesn't end in a wildlife catastrophe. The North Atlantic crosshairs and increased vessel traffic only further jeopardizes their survival. Enhanced enforcement of vessel speed is essential to prevent more deaths of this critically endangered species," said Kathleen Collins, Senior Marine Campaign Manager, International Fund for Animal Welfare. In January, Pallone sent a letter to NOAA and the U.S. Coast Guard demanding the agencies enforce the law to protect marine mammals. Last year, NOAA allocated \$82 million from the Inflation Reduction Act and Fiscal Year 2023 appropriations to support the conservation of the critically endangered North Atlantic right whale. The funding announcement came after Pallone sent a letter with the Democratic Members of New Jersey's Congressional Delegation to the Biden Administration requesting more action to protect marine mammals and their habitats.






