Jack Is Back In The Major Leagues At 88



Jack McKeon

South Amboy native and favorite son, Jack McKeon, 88, is back in Major League Baseball with the Washington Nationals, who hired him as a senior adviser to general manager Mike Rizzo. Jack's son Kasey is the Nationals director of player procurement, and has been with the organization since 2009.

In 2003, as a 72-year old, he replaced Jeff Torborg as manager of the Florida Marlins who were mired in 4th place with a (16-22) record, and not even dreaming about the playoffs. A brilliant baseball icon and motivator, McKeon made some major moves and changed the attitude of the entire team to upbeat and positive, quickly turning the club around while taking them to a Wild Card berth, and eventually the World Series Championship over the heavily-favored New York Yankees.

Jack has managed 5 Major League teams including Kansas City, Oakland, San Diego, aware of this and his many other outstanding Cincinnati and Florida and compiled a lifetime mark of (1,051-990) over 16 seasons. McKeon was National League Manager of the Year in 1999 and 2003. He was general manager with the San Diego Padres from 1980-1990, and also was their field manager from 1988-1990, doing both important jobs. Through excellent trades and player moves, he built the Padres into the 1984 National League champions, and earned the nickname "Trader Jack."

In 2011, at 80 years old, Jack returned to the Marlins as an interim manager for the last 90 games of the season. He remained with the team as a senior adviser to owner Jeffrey Loria until 2017, when Derek Jeter became

CEO and relieved Jack, and Hall of Famers Tony Perez and Andre Dawson, as well as Jeff Conine. In 2013 after undergoing heart surgery, he was forced to give up smoking his trademark cigars.

You can call him a baseball icon, a genius or an ambassador, but he will always be the guy who has done it all in his outstanding career, and most notably in '03, when writers and baseball experts scoffed at him, because he was 72 years old, when he was hired to manage the Marlins. Millions of people will always remember his famous coined reply to those naysayers..."Age is just a number."

Did You Know? The Marlins had planned to bring Jack back to manage on the field for one game to surpass the legendary Connie Mack's record for being the oldest manager in history (87 years old). Don't give up hope on that idea, now that McKeon's with Washington. It would be a wonderful event if the Nationals did this, and they would surely pack the stadium for such an important occasion...Connie Mack is in the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame, but has a losing record...Jack McKeon has a winning percentage, and is the only manager in professional baseball history to have notched over 1,000 victories in the minor leagues and also in MLB. Let's hope the Veterans Committee at Cooperstown is achievements.

densely populated with residents of Irish and Polish descent since the beginning of the 20th century when immigrants came to work on the three railroads that crisscrossed the city. 

Sayreville NYC Bus Service Extended By Steve Schmid

some good news. Academy Bus Company will continue to run service to Wall Street and midtown Manhattan until Friday, March 29. Area State Senator Joe Vitale made the announcement at a recent Borough Council meeting. Sayreville bus commuters have an extra four weeks to find different ways to get to New York City. Academy Bus had announced it would eliminate the service on March 2 due to declining ridership. The service change would affect three daily runs inbound and outbound. Academy currently runs bus service to midtown Manhattan with stops at Winding Woods, Harbor Club, as well as Main Street and Washington Road.

Sayreville bus commuters have gotten The Wall Street service makes stops at Winding Woods, Harbor Club, Park Village, and the Sayreville Park and Ride. Vitale said at the meeting a variety of options are being considered. Mayor Kennedy O'Brien called for a committee of about six or seven commuters to look into ways of solving the issue. One option is that New Jersey Transit could take over the route. New Jersey Transit already operates a bus route from Sayreville to the Port Authority Bus Terminal in midtown Manhattan.





Yearbook-St. Mary's 1969

remembered by most people for three major events: The first man on the Moon; Woodstock; The Miracle Mets. Speaking of miracles, I was the recipient of one on June 8, 1969, when I received my diploma from St. Mary's High School! I was privileged to be a part of the great Class of '69, and my wonderful memories of my friends and those days are still remembered and cherished to this day. In September 1968, we returned for our last year, and "People Got To Be Free" by The Rascals ruled the pop charts. We were the first class to graduate from the "new" St. Mary's HS, after spending two years on split sessions at St. Mary's Grammar school, after the "old" high school burned down in a huge fire near the end of our freshman year on May 4, 1966. It was an interesting time for us to grow up, with flower power, free love, VW Bugs, peace signs, strobe lights, psychedelic signs and much more were a part of everyday life in America. Long hair was "in" for men, but not allowed at SM. Boys wore blue blazers with the school logo for 3 years, but were not required to do so as seniors. The "collegiate" look also featured brown penny loafers. Girls wore blue plaid uniforms, and always got in trouble Sister Madeline, our prinicipal and other nuns for "hiking" their skirts above the knees to keep new school was dedicated on Nov. 3, 1968, and also that month Richard M. Nixon was elected President, while innocent young Americans were fighting and dying in a land called Viet Nam. At SMHS, a new demerit system was introduced, and you could get a demerit for chewing gum! A specified number of demerits meant suspension. Some of our fine teachers were: Joseph Bulman, Sister Estelle, Sr. Dominic, Ronald Lucas, Richard Mager, Stephen Nestinger, Charles Nuziale, Gary Ternyila, Sr. M. Lillian, Sr. M. Corelita, Margaret Wist, Father Fulton. Betty Farrell was the wonderful School Nurse. Eugene Cross was Student Council President and Kathryn O'Connor the Secretary. Mark Bratus was Senior Class President. The social schedule was a busy one, with dances almost every week in the cafeteria, featuring talented, local rock 'n' roll bands. In addition there was the Christmas Choral Festival in December, and also the Christmas Ball, a night I will always treasure. Who could forget First Friday Masses, Vocation Day, and numerous assemblies (which got us out of class). How about the senior boys whistling and singing "When The Saints Go Marching In" of course with different lyrics as we entered and exited the assemblies. Remember the words? The '69 Spring Festival was a smashing success, as it replaced the annual school play. Maurice Nadeau was excellent in his role of Don Quixote. Popular hangouts were Frank's, The Jug, or The Rec. Where did you hang after school? Remember being bused to the Senior Prom at the Berkeley-Carteret Hotel in Asbury Park? I can still recall the first song, "You've Made Me So night it was! 



MCC Adopts New Discounted Tuition Rate for High School Students

The Board of Trustees of Middlesex online, will now be a flat \$125 for tuition County College has approved a new discounted tuition rate of \$125 for any 3-or 4-credit course (with no fees) for high school students attending MCC. This new discounted tuition rate, which will become effective in the fall of 2019, represents significant savings for high school students and their families. The current tuition at MCC is \$112 per credit so the ordinary cost of a 3-credit course, including standard fees, is \$439.50.

"The College has been charging high school students different tuition rates depending on whether courses are taken at the MCC Edison campus, at one of the College's centers (in New Brunswick or Perth Amboy), online, or at the student's high school as part of Dual Enrollment, in which collegelevel courses are taught at the high school," said Mark McCormick, interim president. "Charging high school students different rates for the same course was creating confusion. This new flat discount tuition rate for high school students should simplify things and hopefully provide greater access to college credit courses for high school students. Any edu/k-12-partnerships. 3- or 4-credit course, at any location or

with no fees."

Approximately 3,000 high school students participate in the College's Dual Enrollment program (called High School Scholars) each year. Many of those students use those credits when they enroll at MCC or transfer to another college or university. In addition, many students in high school take courses on their own at the College.

"The High School Scholars Program allows high school students to get a tremendous jumpstart on their college careers," said Kimberlee Hooper, director of MCC's K-12 Partnerships Office. "In some instances, students may be able to earn an associate degree at the same time as they graduate from high school. Dual Enrollment also affords high school students an opportunity to explore different academic areas, potentially helping them consider what they might like to major in at college. And, of course, students and their families save thousands of dollars in tuition and fees."

USS Constitution Fleet On Display(Article submitted)

This handcrafted model of the USS amazing project John McGill would view it Constitution is an intricate and accurate representation of the most legendary vessel ever to serve the US Navy. "Old Ironsides" has a colorful history of honor and service and is a story worth retelling. Another story worth retelling is the story of the man who constructed this replica and how it came to be in the possession of the City of South Amboy. Sayreville Councilman Dave McGill is the proud son of John James McGill, a WWII veteran who was a navigator on a P24 aircraft. By day a New York City Sanitation worker but in his spare time a master model maker, craftsman, and by Dave's description "the smartest garbage man to ever work for New York City". Dave related that sometime in 1968 his mother, in an attempt to channel some of his excessive energy, gave him the model in a box that contained "9000 pieces". Not possessing his Father's talent for this type of challenge the gift ultimately made its way to his John's workspace where for the next three years he painstakingly crafted the ship down to the every detail. One might think that at the successful conclusion of such an

as a capstone to his modelling career. But In the ensuing years he crafted many other more complex ship models including an exact replica of a WWII Liberty ship which he carved from a single block of wood. Dave and his family wanted to find a way to share this amazing artifact so people with a love of history and craftsmanship could enjoy the fruits of his Father's labors. In view of the fact that Commodore Thomas Anderson Conover, who once commanded the USS Constitution, is buried in the crypt beneath Christ Episcopal Church in the City and with a nod to our rich maritime and transportation history the McGill family felt the artifact would be most at home here. The Sadie Pope Dowdell Library is safeguarding this treasure within its archives. 

Clarence Reed hit 11.2 in 4 games, and Bob Martin 10.1 in 4 games. Bay City Liquors-Dennis Bratus 10.5 Chet Meinzer 10.0. In one game each, McQuade scored 16, and Tom Kelly 13. South Amboy A.A.-Ed Paczkowski 11.2 Jim Higgins 10.9. In 4 games Curt Wood averaged 13.2, and George Ogborne 11.3. Greg Havlusch pumped in 25 points in a 1-game appearance. J & B Trucking-Jim Lyons 15.7 Jerry Disbrow 14.6. Colonel's Garter-Steve Shawnhouse 18.3 Ray Selover 12.4. In 2 games Joe Smith averaged 14.1. and playing in only 1 game, Bob Kukulski scored 13 points. Army Vets-Tom Holovacko 21.0 Bob Jones 16.5 Joe Gatyas 10.4.



Catching Up With Jack McKeon By Tom Burkard



Supermarkets, Oh, How They've Changed By Elaine Holton Scott

weren't so "super" years ago. Through the years, they became "more super" due to their ever-expanding inventories. After buying a house in Parlin in 1972, I began shopping for groceries at the Acme supermarket in the Sayre Woods Shopping Center, until moving to another part of Sayreville in 1978. I'm not sure but I think Grand Union had originally occupied Acme's location. Maybe I'm wrong but I remember Acme having no more than 8 aisles...maybe even only six, and those aisles were very wide, far wider than the narrow aisles in supermarkets today. Since everything is relative, though, compared to the much smaller grocery stores in town prior to any supermarkets being built in the early '60s, supermarkets the size of Acme had seemed absolutely enormous. Each week I'd go to Acme for a large order, zipping around the store with youthful energy and

ease. Somehow, it doesn't seem fair that

become gargantuan in comparison. So, why are supermarkets growing in size by leaps and bounds anyway? The obvious answer is that companies, both nationally and globally, are competing for our almighty dollar. There's a saying, "variety is the spice of life," but there's also another saying that too much of anything is not a good thing.

There was a much smaller variety of food on the stores' shelves years ago compared to the massive, overwhelming variety offered now. For instance, let's take a look back at the bread section. Once upon a time, supermarkets had sold mainly squooshy white bread like Tip-Top and Wonder Bread. There were no "artisanal" breads being sold, no fancy schmanzy multi-grain breads with a high price tag...and no bakery sections to sell them. So, bread along with hamburger and hot dog buns, had taken up a very small area. It was the same with desserts. At that

Compared to now, supermarkets just since I'm now "elderly," supermarkets have time if you had wanted cakes, pies, doughnuts areas...while the prices stamped with ink and loaves of "classier" breads a real bakery was where you'd find them...not in a grocery store. Packaged Tasty Cakes, Hostess snack cakes and lunch pies were the exception, in that time when brown bagging lunches had meant a sandwich (usually baloney) and a can't remember any. packaged dessert.





Valentine's Day is for **Chocolate Lovers**

Dark chocolate seems to lower blood pressure, but it requires an amount less than 2 Hershey Kisses to do it. A small study from Germany adds to mounting evidence linking dark chocolate with certain health benefits such as lowering blood pressure and having an anti inflammatory effect.

A study appeared in the Journal of the American Medical Association by Dr. Dick Taubert of the University of Cologne. It demonstrated that blood pressure reductions with dark chocolate were small but still substantial enough to potentially reduce cardiovascular disease risks.

Volunteers for the study ate just over 6 grams of dark chocolate daily for almost 5 months. It equaled about 1 & ½ Hershey Kisses. People who ate that amount ended up with lower blood pressure reading that those who ate a similar amount of white chocolate. Tests suggested that a steady exposure to dark chocolate prompted a chemical change that helped dilate blood vessels and regulate blood pressure. Cocoa contains flavanols, plant based compounds that are also credited with giving red wine its heart healthy benefits.

Dr. Laura Sevetkey director of Duke University Hypertension center stresses that the study results should not be viewed as a license to gorge on chocolate. The weight gain from eating large amounts of dark chocolate would counteract any benefits.

As always an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. The combination of losing weight, eating less salt, exercising, and eating dark chocolate provides strategies to lower your blood pressure.

My cousin Jack Gleason (Son Of Chief Gleason) was the first South Amboyan to go to West Point and on to the USAF to fly. I wanted to be the second. We grew up in the days of John Glenn and the early space programs. I was going to fly and be part of the space program, but life takes many turns. I consider myself to be very lucky that God let me fly for the USAF, and to eventually become a chief engineer on USAF Small Sat's projects.

My flying career was very exciting! Due to a shoulder injury, I became a NAV/ WSO – I was a B-52 Radar Nav during the cold war and these were exciting times. The Soviets were very aggressive moving subs into threat areas. Alerts were common place at Strategic Air Command - some exercises, some for real. I had a talent for problem solving and the Wing Commander started to have me execute special projects to solve problems. I wanted to fly the SR-71 and on to the shuttle, but life takes many twists. Honeywell contacted me about being one of the first systems engineers in a new company discipline. I left active duty went to Honeywell Minneapolis and into the greatest ANG Unit in the country, the 133rd AW- the ANG was the right place for me – service to the community was in my South Amboy DNA. I spent 21 years in the ANG. It was time for change the ANG was moving to be part of the Total Force Concept. The 133 AW became a key player in the conflict in Central America and Panama. 



The Smoke Column

know that I am constantly stressing the need for smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors to be installed in the home. Most of the times when we hear about a fatal fire in the area, it is due to the fact there were NO working smoke or carbon monoxide

Unfortunately, this past January there were two major house fires, one in Wall Township the other in Lakewood. The good news to this story is that 12 people are alive today because they had working smoke detectors and were able to escape the fire and smoke before it overcame them.

Five kids, two adults and a dog were all inside a home in Wall Township when a fire erupted at 2:00am while they were all sleeping. A family member credited the piercing alarm sound of the smoke detectors and the barking of the family dog that awoke them and together, allowed enough time for the family to evacuate the house safely. During the course of the fire, a propane tank on the back porch exploded causing a massive fireball and fire extension to the home. Luckily by this time all family members were safely out of the home

As coincidence would have it, on the next night in Lakewood, a similar situation occurred. In this case, five more people are alive. They were able to escape from their burning home as working smoke detectors alerted them to the danger.

As a strong proponent of working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in your home, I can't stress enough the fact that they do save lives.

was discovered that there were NO smoke you and your family are protected.

Those of you that follow my column detectors installed in the home. You ask yourself "how is this possible in 2019"? It was a heavy smoke condition from a fireplace rather then a working structure fire. The residents were safe but what would have been the outcome if the circumstances were different and the residents were asleep?

Recently a law was passed in New Jersey requiring businesses to install working carbon monoxide detectors. The jury is still out on whether this is necessary and what the benefits will be. One thing that this requirement will do is place another burden on the first responders. A large percentage of alarms that we respond to are for malfunctioning residential carbon monoxide alarms. Test your alarm monthly and know the difference in the various sounds of your specific detector. There is a difference between the sound of an actual carbon monoxide alarm and when batteries need to be changed. If your carbon monoxide alarm activates, and you can't distinguish the difference between and actual alarm or battery problem, call 911 and have the fire department determine the cause. It is better to be safe than sorry. Fortunately, the newer type of carbon monoxide detectors come with a 10-year non-replaceable battery. Unless you have a continuous carbon monoxide problem in your home and the devices frequently activate, these devices should function properly for many years without the need to change batteries, which you cannot do anyway. In addition to the batteries being good for only 10-years, the device that senses for carbon monoxide also has a 10-year rated lifetime. 
