

South Amboy To Celebrate its 47th St. Patrick's Day Parade

(Article submitted) The South Amboy Parade Committee, in conjunction with the City of South Amboy are hard at work completing the final preparations for the Sunday, March 17, 2024, St. Patrick's Day Parade which will begin at 2pm. Mr. Mickey Gross will serve as Grand Marshal and Ms. Yolanda Flores will serve as Deputy

Grand Marshal. In 1976, South Amboy resident Frank Conley coordinated the first South Amboy St. Patrick's Day Parade. The parade consisted of one bagpiper, the South Amboy Police, Fire and First Aid Squads and a small group of marchers representing the Frank Conley Association.

Today, a group of volunteers from South Amboy and neighboring towns work diligently to continue this long-standing tradition. The South Amboy St. Patrick's Day Parade Committee (a non-profit 501c3) consists of over 20 volunteers who work tirelessly throughout the year to coordinate this annual event. As a result of their hard work and dedication, The South Amboy St. Patrick's Day Parade is now one of the biggest family friendly, multicultural events in South Amboy and has become one of the largest parades in the State of NJ featuring more than 20 bands and over 2,000 marchers.

Coordinating an event of this magnitude requires the parade committee to work closely with city administrators, police, fire and EMS personnel to ensure that the residents and visitors are safe before, during and after the parade and that traffic and emergency situations are handled swiftly and securely.

Members of the committee executive board oversee specific tasks related to events held throughout the year. Spearheading efforts are committee co-chairs Mickey Gross and Jay Elliot. Mr. Gross facilitates monthly meetings, works closely with city administrators and heads major fundraising

The days of both fast and abstinence are Ash Wednesday (February 14) and Good



The other Fridays of Lent (Feb. 16 of Lent, the following obligations are to be and 23, Mar. 1, 8, 15, and 22) are days of abstinence.

·Fasting in the Roman Catholic tradition Checchio has approved this year's Lenten means to limit oneself to one full meal with two smaller meals which together do not equal the size of your full meal. The obligation of fasting applies only to Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59.

·Abstinence in the Roman Catholic tradition means to abstain from eating meat (beef, chicken, pork, turkey, etc.). The obligation of abstinence applies to all Catholics who have reached the age of 14.

Note: This year, be aware that Ash Wednesday falls on February 14 (also Valentine's Day). The obligation to fast does remain in effect, so it is suggested that those who are planning a special dinner make that their one main meal of the day.







recruits have been taught to fight structural fires by using a "transitional" attack. Though this technique of attacking the fire may seem new to the recruits, it was a successful technique used years ago when fire hoses were smaller, fires grew slower, and the Heat Release Rate (HRR) from the burning material was much lower. The type of building material used in the construction of homes during the early and mid-nineteenth century came from dimensional lumber which we know as the 2X4's, 2X6's or larger and thicker pieces of lumber. This was known as "legacy" construction. Today, most newer homes, condominiums, and townhomes, are constructed using lightweight trusses and pre-engineered wood materials. This allows for the buildings to have larger open living areas but creates hidden voids throughout. Unfortunately, this type of building construction leads to a faster and hotter burning fire. What this means is that when firefighters arrive at the scene of a house fire, the structure may be well on its way to being fully involved. Using the transitional attack method, where water is applied into a window of a burning room from the outside of the building, may be enough to save the building. In this type of fire attack, water is applied in a straight-stream pattern, through the open window and directed at the ceiling or window lintel. That water is then deflected off the ceiling or backwall, out and down in many directions. This pattern will be twofold as it will direct water throughout the room's contents to suppress the fire and cool the heated gases that accumulate across the ceiling. The bigger and hotter the fire, the more heat and pressurized gases given off. The gases will tend to rise to ceiling height throughout the structure. When firefighters arrive at the front door to gain entry, they remain low, as the hot gases at the ceiling level struggle to exit the open doorway and get to a cooler atmosphere. Heat and pressurized fire gases will always travel toward a cooler

Within the last ten years, firefighter area. As these firefighters enter through the doorway, they will be greeted by the heat from the fire. If the fire has been attacked from the outside before entry is made, it will make the inside temperatures more tenable for the firefighters to enter. When the firefighters open the front entry door, they not only allow the heat and gases to escape but allows for a supply of cool fresh oxygen in through the bottom portion of the doorway. This area where the hot gases escape from the top and the cool air enters the bottom is called the "neutral plane." In coordination with this type of attack may be venting the roof, where a hole is cut in the roof allowing for the escape of the heat and gases. This will have a cooling effect on the interior for the attacking firefighters as the heat escapes through the vent hole. Older buildings with legacy construction may take up to thirty minutes for the fire room to flashover, where everything in the room is so hot that it all ignites. Laboratory tests involving today's modern lightweight construction with plastic-based furnishings will flashover in about five minutes. This is just about the time when firefighters arrive on the scene. If the proper techniques are conducted in a systematic fashion, flashover may be prevented. Firefighters NEVER want to be caught in a flashover room because the results can be disastrous. Survivability time is about ten seconds. To have a successful outcome at these types of fires, or any fire, there must be a knowledgeable Incident Commander (IC), the person in charge. Timely decisions and coordination of equipment and personnel is utmost in these situations. Remember that everyone goes home after every incident.




Where Have You Gone, Tony Gonsalves? By Tom Burkard

Tony Gonsalves moved to South Amboy with his family in 1965, and the young teenager played one year of soccer, and helped to start the tennis team at Hoffman HS. No one ever realized at that time what a positive influence he would have on the "Pleasant Little City" community. A 1970 graduate of Hoffman HS, he went on to college at Newark State, which changed its name to Kean College, and is currently Kean University. Tony played varsity tennis at the school for 4 years and was team captain as a junior and senior.

Tony, who taught for 39 years, has been retired for 11 years now, and "Enjoying retirement, even though there's not a lot to do. I have become an avid reader, and I miss the class of students who were interested in studying what the history topic was." "Mr. G" as he is affectionately known by his players and former students still keeps very active as Head Coach of the boys soccer team, and is now in his 48th season at the helm. He has to be the longest running boys soccer coach in the state of New Jersey, and he said that his career record is approximately (658-677). Wow, that's a lot of games, and also plenty of victories, probably the most for any soccer coach in our state. In addition, Gonsalves coached boys tennis for 25 years, and also boys and girls bowling for 12 years. When asked who his greatest soccer players were, he said he didn't want to offend anyone, because he had so many outstanding players and didn't want to leave anyone out. He did however mention that the school's record for goals in one season was held by Pablo Penagos, who scored 38. Tony also said that the 1979 and 1985 teams were two of the best that he has ever coached in 48 years. His Hoffman Governors soccer teams captured the Gold Division championship "3 or 4 times."

Coach Gonsalves has been a huge soccer fan his entire life, and even got to meet, and personally know his all-time favorite,

first time in '76, and also three or four times at Pele's Soccer Camp, when I took our '79 Hoffman HS team down to Trenton College where the camp was held. I also had the opportunity to work for Pele's Soccer Camp around 1980, and took kids down there. Pele was very friendly, warm, and made you feel like you knew him for years." Gonsalves personally chauffeured Pele to Newark Airport from Pele's Soccer Camp, which 20 of Mr. G's players attended. Besides Pele, he said his all-time favorite



Tony said, "Bourbeau was a great player and the most fun." Gonsalves did very well, winning \$800 in cash, 2 trips to Europe, and \$2,000 in prizes.

He has always loved music, and when asked if he still was a Frank Sinatra fan he quickly responded "Big Time!" He also told us that he is a big fan of the band Chicago, and also enjoys James Taylor music.

Outside of sports and a little taste of politics, Tony G. was always active in many different things. He had a Dee Jay business called the DJG's, and was one of the area's top DJ's for 28 years, playing at all kinds of events and parties. His fondest memory of this venture was "Being at a party that was rockin', and everybody around you was dancing."

In 1989, along with Reggie Carney, invented The Game of South Amboy, New Jersey as a fundraiser for the athletic teams at Hoffman High School. Mr. G. said, "The game was terrific! It highlighted not only the businesses in town, but everybody who bought it had their name on the game board, and it showed a business and personal aspect."

Tony was awarded the Flanzbaum Scholarship from Brookdale in 1994, which allowed him to go to Yad Vashem (the world's preeminent university for Holocaust studies) in Israel for 3 1/2 weeks for an intense study. It was one of the most rewarding experiences in his career. He immensely enjoyed his time in Israel, and said, "I was baptized in the Jordan River, and was also on a boat on the Sea of Galilee." He has been a lecturer at St. Mary Church for 25 years.

He is also known for running many trips to different countries all over the world. "I've made 25 trips to Europe, and been to every country in Western Europe, with hundreds of students and adults through the years. My favorite cities are Florence, Italy, and Paris, France. He was intrigued with Florence because "Michaelangelo and DaVinci had Pele. "Tony recalled, "I met Pele for the a contest there." Tony also said that he had



the opportunity to take his daughter to Paris with him.

He is an active member of the American Outlaws National Supporters Club of U.S. Men and Women National teams. "The Club's home is at Hailey's in Metuchen, and the place is decorated with World Cup memorabilia. We have 90 members and are growing."

What are your plans for the future, Tony? "My immediate plan is to have thousands of dollars to spend on World Cup tickets for games

Amboy Rotary Club applied to Rotary International for a Charter on February 14, 1924. There were twenty-two Charter and numerous financial crises including the Members each representing a different Great Depression, political ups and downs, occupation (classification). The application and the many changes that occur in everylisted President Elmer H. Eulner, V.P. George R. Delaney, Secretary Harold G. Hoffman and Treasurer Charles Safran. The Club was in the late 1990's. Mrs. Lois Morriss, Bank to meet every Tuesday at 12:15 PM at the "Bide A Wee Inn".

The application also named as Directors: John A. Coan, John A. Johnson, Rev. Ed Griffin, Michael F. Nagel, James L. Housel, Robert P. Mason, Elmer H. Eulner, and George R. Delaney. The general membership was listed as: Dr. Fountain Burlew, George Gundrum Sr., George Gundrum Jr., James A. Newmeyer, Walter Peterson, Donald W. Reed, Robert A. Straub, Philip J. Sullivan, Ferdinand C. Shussler, Oliver W. Welsh, Wm. Ernest Zinkham and George W. Crane.

While such lists may seem boring, there may be many citizens of South Amboy and its neighboring municipalities who are directly related to these businessmen. For example: Harold G. Hoffman became a governor of the State of New Jersey; Walter Peterson was the owner of Peterson's Pharmacy. Robert Straub was owner of Straub Motors and the Gundrums were owners of the funeral home on Bordentown Avenue. Are you a descendant of any of the founders? Each of these men was a community-builder. Would you also be interested in being a community builder? The application was made in the middle of the decade, eventually described as the "Roaring Twenties." However, these men had more than just roaring on their minds. The good and benefit of the local, national and international communities were the goals of the Club from the beginning. It has been ten decades since the South Amboy Rotary Club was chartered and hundreds of local citizens have benefited from the activities of the Club over the years. There have been thousands of dollars in scholarship money given to graduates of the high schools in the two municipalities.

Gonsalves began his teaching career in 1975, as a substitute History teacher, ironically for his own high school History teacher Mr. John Moran. "I taught two 8th grade classes and three 9th. It was always a challenge, but it was good." He began full-time teaching duties in September 1976.

Also, in 1980, the late Charlie Walters asked Gonsalves to run with him on the Republican ticket for Councilman-At-Large, along with Stanley Jankowski who ran for Mayor. Tony said that "I enjoyed going door to door and introducing myself to people, and encouraging them to vote. All three Republicans lost to the Dems, but Gonsalves and Walters made strong showings, falling short by approximately 30 and 60 votes respectively.

1980 was a busy year for Tony, and he was a contestant on the TV show 50,000 Pyramid, on two occasions in late 1980 and early '81. He shared the television screen with celebrities Lavar Burton, Fred Gandy, Joanne Worley and Adrienne Bourbeau.

Tony Gonsalves is the proud father of three adult children who live locally, and six grandchildren.

How should Tony Gonsalves be remembered? "I loved my job football, and I tried to share my love of history and of the beautiful game. (Pele)







Fishing is all coastal. Rivers and Bays are closed until March 1st for Striped Bass and Winter Flounder. I wouldn't look for any good bites for either species until later on at the end of March. Some Striped Bass were caught in the ocean at Island Beach and LBI before the January storms. There are some Blackfish off Barnegat Inlet jetties. A few big Blackfish plus Ling and a few Cod are what the party boats are catching at this time. White Perch can be caught from the docks that are accessible in Toms River and parts of Barnegat Bay. The new slot law for Striped Bass that was made law this past year is one fish at 28 to 31 inches will stay in effect as the Feds feel too many were caught the last few years. In addition, you must hold onto the racks for any fish that have to be measured so law officials can determine compliance if vou filet them. Recent winter storms seem to be making fishing very slow.

There has been no ice fishing at all at this time. Warm Temperatures are to blame. There is the possibility of catching Walleyes in the Delaware River from Lambertville to the state line up north. There are some trout that have been caught from the shore near the boat ramp at Round Valley Reservoir. When rivers and streams are not too high, holdover trout can be found. I know, because my wife and I tried one of our favorite spots at the lower Pequest. She pulled in a nice 12 inch Rainbow in mid-February but I had no luck.





are you saying??? Tlusty Czwartek??? Here's the story Robin. I'll say it another way, Fat Thursday. That's what it means. It's pronounced Twu-sty Tchvar-tekh. That's how it's known in Poland.

countries, the Thursday before Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday, is associated with the celebration of Carnival. Because Lent is the beginning of fasting, it is the last opportunity you can feast and eat some of those forbidden sweets that you may have enjoyed before. Fat Thursday is the day they celebrate it in Poland, the Thursday before Ash Wednesday.

In the United States we celebrate Fat Tuesday which is the day before Ash Wednesday. Polish people could call it Tlusty Wtorek, pronounced Twus-ty Vto-rekh.

In the Polish tradition, both in the United States and in Poland, Fat Thursday/Tuesday is celebrated by making, baking and consuming our favorite donut called Paczki, pronounced Punch-ki.

The letter a in Paczki has a little hook on the bottom of it which changes the sound. This is one of a number of letters with markings that change the sound of a Polish letter. The letter l in Tlusty Czwartek has a line through the middle of it which also changes the sound.

Paczkis are filled with a variety of things. My memory is of prune filling which was have been at the Polish American Club of called lakvar. But some are filled with other things like fruit jams or cream and topped and bake 500 paczki which we will sell to with powdered sugar or even icing or glaze. members and the public. You forget about your diet on this day. Tuesday because New Orleans comes into to have more at the end of Lent.

Holy Cow Batman!!! What the heck mind. The Mardi Gras Is held on Fat Tuesday.

But other countries like Germany, Greece, Italy and Spain celebrate Fat Thursday. Some celebrate with food, some with parades and some with both.

My recollection of Fat Thursday/ In the Christian tradition, in some Tuesday was Sacred Heart Church's celebration by having a Paczkovy Bal, pronounced Punch-covy Bal. They had a lot of polka music, and loads and loads of Paczki to consume and take home. In addition my memory recalls pitchers of coffee. They probably had other drinks but what kind I don't remember.

Again, Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent. Traditionally Lent lasts for 40 days and in the past you were only to have one meal a day. Rich foods, like Paczki, were not allowed.

In Poland, so as not to waste any food by spoiling, Fat Thursday was time to clean up all the food you could not eat during lent. Of course you had to consume the rich tasting Paczki one more time before Lent. This tradition was started in medieval times during the reign of Poland's King August III. He was King from 1733 to 1763 and was also the Grand Duke of Lithuania.

Today in Poland every Pole eats two and a half doughnuts, Packzki, on that day and the country consumes 100 million.

Billy (Monk) Wozniak




