South Amboy Mourns Longtime Barbers

If you happened to get your haircut in South Amboy over the last 60 years or so, you probably went to either Bob "The Barber" Stary owner of Bob's Barber Shop on Washington Ave., or Henry "The Barber" Rinkewich, proprietor of Henry's Raritan Barber Shop which was located on Bordentown Ave. Henry died at 95 years old on Dec. 11th, and Bob passed away on Dec. 26th at 91 years old.

Bob's original location was on the corner of Main and Potter Streets, and was a popular site for getting the latest style haircuts, especially the high school kids in the late 1960's, including myself. He later moved his business to Washington Ave., where he spent most of his illustrious career.

In a 2020 exclusive interview, Bob said, "I enjoy cutting hair. It's not a job. I'd like to thank all of my customers through the years. They're not just customers, they're my friends."

Henry's business motto was "Where the promise is still performed."

FROM THE DESK OF TOM REILLY

For many families in our community, the local food pantry is no longer a last resort -- it is a vital part of their weekly routine. Like millions of Americans in 2026, many of our residents face a perfect storm of economic pressures, including persistent food inflation (up 3.1% over the last year) and tightened eligibility for federal nutrition programs. Recent 2026 forecasts from the Feeding America Network suggest that 1 in 6 people now face persistent hunger, an increase from 1 in 7 just a year ago. This rising tide has forced food pantries to evolve from emergency stopgaps into sophisticated community markets that prioritize health and dignity. Winter often exacerbates these issues for many families. The cold weather brings higher heating bills, post-holiday expenses, seasonal slowdowns for many jobs, and disruptions to transportation brought about by winter weather. While many of us look forward to a cozy night at home and out of the cold, many of our neighbors are wondering how they might put food on the table now that their heating bill has doubled, or because they missed a day of work due to snow, or lost their job due to post-holiday staffing changes.

Our local food pantries provide a lifeline for these residents that allows them to stay healthy and hopeful through the coldest months of the year. The food pantries help ensure that no one has to face winter hunger alone, or make impossible choices about which necessities they can afford. To that end, our food pantries are both an indispensable public good, and a showing of solidarity with the most vulnerable members of our community.

Of course, the increase in residents in need also requires an increase in volunteers. We are fortunate that South Amboy has both the volunteers to allow our local food pantries to operate and many corporations that are kind enough to supply the food. In this past year our local food pantries distributed over 35,000 pounds of food with donations from Aldi, Shop Rite, Fed Ex, Target, and Amazon. Even so, our food pantries will require additional volunteers for 2026, and always are looking for help. If you would like to donate your time, or if you are in need or know someone in need, please contact the First Presbyterian Church of South Amboy Food Pantry or the St. Mary's Food Pantry. Contact information for both is provided below. For those of you who choose to volunteer, know that your neighbors and your community will be forever thankful. For those in need,



know that you do not have to face these difficult times alone and that your friends and neighbors are here for you.

A couple of other quick notes.



The Stories Windows Tell: The History Around Us



Almost every building has windows; they come in many sizes, ranging from large to small. Windows are such a common building feature that we often do not pay attention to them or realize that, perhaps, there is more to our windows. Wooden windows and visible chains can tell us the age of a structure. Older homes and buildings have larger windows as well. In South Amboy, the difference is evident. But what of our houses of worship that are adorned with stained glass? As new generations move in and older generations move out, history, as preserved by word of mouth, is lost. Even with such changes, history is around us and is told even by our stained glass.

Our area has many historic buildings, including houses of worship. In South Amboy, two of the oldest congregations are Christ Episcopal and St. Mary Church. As such, they are both adorned with beautiful and well-preserved stained-glass windows. In the glass in these two churches, biblical stories are told. The Christian Bible comes to life in pictures from a time before the internet and movies. Parishioners of these houses of worship fundraised and contributed to obtaining these works of art. On some of them, in some churches, we see the names of those who donated them or in whose memory they were purchased. These people are important figures in the history of these churches, but sometimes also in the history of South Amboy. The same applies to other churches in our area. Those who could afford to donate did so, and of course, stained glass was not (and is not) cheap! Not just anyone could have afforded to buy such a work of art!

Yet, something happened that devastated the City of South Amboy and shattered homes, lives, and some of the historic stained glass. On May 19, 1950, the city was rocked by a major explosion of munitions that were brought by railcar to be loaded onto barges for transport. The city was forced to repair

the damage and rebuild some of the lost infrastructure. As for the churches, they suffered structural damage and shattered windows. At Saint Mary Church, half of the church's windows had to be replaced. When walking into the church, one can note that the windows on the left are darker than the windows on the right. This is due to differences in the manufacture of the glass, although one must look hard to notice the difference. The church itself also has tension wires to keep the shaken walls in place. Christ Church's windows and edifice, due to its place on a hill, fared worse. All but one of its original Tiffany windows remains. On the new windows, one can note newer historical names and figures. Building repairs may not be so evident, but windows, our sources of light, are! History is etched in these windows, and each and every difference tells a story.

Councilman John's Monthly Minute

Happy New Year, Sayreville! As we begin 2026, I want to share some exciting progress happening along our historic downtown — progress shaped directly by residents who care deeply about preserving the character of Main Street while making it a more inviting destination for all of us. Over the past year, many of you reached out through conversations, community events, emails, or simple friendly chats to express your hopes for a downtown that offers more gathering spaces, more dining and shopping options, and a place people can comfortably stroll and enjoy. As a lifelong resident myself, I share that passion. I've always believed Main Street has the potential to be a vibrant centerpiece of our community without losing the history and charm that make it special.

Several months ago, Sayreville received county approval to reduce the speed limit on Main Street from 30 mph to 25 mph. Afterward, the Borough Council voted to adopt the change, and in November 2025, new signage was installed. While the adjustment may seem small, it carries meaningful benefits. Slower traffic makes Main Street safer, more walkable, and more comfortable for families, seniors, children, and anyone who wants to enjoy the area at a relaxed pace. The intention behind this step is simple: to encourage people to stop, browse, linger, and experience Main Street as a welcoming destination rather than just a pass-through.

Much of the direction for these improvements came from a community survey initiated several months ago, and it's important to highlight that the survey was not funded by taxpayer dollars. Through outside partnerships, high-quality feedback was collected with no cost to residents. To build on that effort, listening sessions were also held to encourage straightforward, open conversations and ensure every voice — whether from a resident, a shopkeeper, a property owner, or someone who simply enjoys our downtown — was heard.

The feedback gathered through the survey and listening sessions was thoughtful, sincere, and incredibly helpful. Many participants expressed concerns about cars traveling too fast through downtown, limited foot traffic, inconsistent storefront signage, lighting and safety issues, parking challenges, aging sidewalks and infrastructure, and the need for a more cohesive and welcoming identity along Main Street. These weren't complaints — they were caring observations from people who want to see Main Street thrive



and evolve.

Now that the speed limit change is officially in place, additional improvements are being reviewed to complement the change and enhance the pedestrian experience. These contemplated upgrades include enhanced crosswalks, pedestrian-activated flashing beacons, updated signage and roadway markings, improved sidewalks and lighting, and streetscape enhancements designed to maintain Main Street's historic character while improving its function and appearance. Every potential improvement is being evaluated carefully, with a focus on steady, meaningful progress rather than dramatic changes that could compromise the charm and identity of our downtown.

All of this is part of a larger effort to explore opportunities that enhance quality of life in Sayreville, support existing businesses, and attract new investment in thoughtful ways. As someone who grew up here and continues to call Sayreville home, I want Main Street to be a place where memories are made, where local businesses flourish, and where the spirit of our community shines — all while preserving the historic significance that defines this cherished part of town.

With the speed limit change implemented and new signage installed this past November, the groundwork is now in place for additional improvements throughout 2026. I look forward to sharing updates with you as plans develop, always guided by your ideas, concerns, and hopes for Main Street's future. Thank you to everyone who participated in the survey, joined the listening sessions, or shared your thoughts in passing. Your engagement made this progress possible, and your continued involvement will help shape what comes next. Here's to a safe, vibrant, and community-centered year ahead — and to seeing Main Street grow into an even better destination for all of us.


Why is one window different, or why was a window sealed?

Bill Expanding Access to State's Family Leave Act Heads to Governor's Desk

Legislation would lower employer threshold to ensure more workers can care for loved ones without risking their job

Legislation that would extend job-protected family leave to more workers passed the New Jersey General Assembly today. Sponsored by Assemblywomen Annette Quijano and Verlina Reynolds-Jackson and Assembly Speaker Craig J. Coughlin, Bill A3451 would expand access to the State's Family Leave Act, ensuring that additional workers would have the security of knowing their jobs are safe when they need to take time away from work to care for a family member. The bill now heads to the Governor's desk for consideration.

Currently, employers with 30 or more employees must offer employees the right to be reinstated after they take family leave to care for a loved one. Bill A3451 would gradually lower the threshold to employers with 15 or more employees and reduce the waiting period for worker benefits. Under the bill, workers would be eligible for job-protected leave after three months of employment and the required minimum base hours were reduced to 250 hours.

"The number of people helped by this bill reaches far beyond just the individual workers," said Assemblywoman Quijano (D-Union). "For every employee that benefits from A3451, even more New Jerseyans –

parents, children, siblings – would benefit as well."

"Study after study shows that expanding family leave is good for the workforce, good for babies and families, and good for our state as a whole," said Speaker Coughlin (D-Middlesex). "By reducing the amount of time someone has to be on the job before becoming eligible for family leave, this legislation recognizes the realities of today's workforce and makes sure more parents can care for and bond with their newborn without fearing they'll lose their job. No one should be penalized for needing time to care, and this bill helps make sure the vast majority of workers never will."

"Workers in multi-generational families face tough choices on a regular basis, but deciding to take time off to care for a sick relative or a newborn child should not come with the added pressure of worrying if they will have a job to return to," said Assemblywoman Reynolds-Jackson (D-Mercer, Hunterdon). "This meaningful piece of legislation is designed to remove that barrier for anyone who works somewhere that has five or more employees and wants to spend time focused on their families."

Did You Ever Visit Here?

The Smoke Column

(PART #1) At the beginning of each year newly elected fire officers assume duties to lead their fire departments and fire companies. With each one of these positions comes an immense amount of responsibility for the safety of the firefighters they lead and the property they protect. Some can handle it well while others may not. Remember as an officer you have people's lives in your hands when you make decisions at a fire scene. This article will give an overview of an incident that happened in a mid-west community a few years back and has finally been settled. This incident occurred where a fire officer became a Line-of-Duty-Death (LODD). I Never want to criticize a fire officer's decisions at a fire scene because that decision might have to be made in seconds and under duress. Some decisions are good while others may not be proper. If the officer makes good decisions at a fire scene, kudos to him. If decisions go bad, we take them as a learning experience for future incidents. In this incident a fire lieutenant was LODD at a one-story, ranch style, light-wood frame constructed home consisting of 3-bedrooms, 2-baths, family room, kitchen, and attached garage. The fire alarm was called in by the homeowner at 2304 hours reporting that there was fire in the attached garage of the home. At 2314, the fire chief arrived on scene and reported a size-up of what he has, "fully involved attached garage with extension to the house." The chief established an Incident Command (IC) system upon arrival. He attempted to make a 360-degree size-up of the entire structure, but it was incomplete as he never went to the rear (side C) of the structure. First due apparatus was arriving at the scene and were receiving their assignments such as accountability officer and operations officer. Firefighters began entering the structure to attack and suppress the fire. As the fire started in the attached garage, it intensified and entered the ceiling area of the one-floor structure.



Using tools, firefighters opened-up various sections of the ceiling and found that the fire had entered the entire ceiling space. In my opinion, it would be at this point that the fire should have been fought in a defensive attack mode and from the exterior. There was no benefit in sending anyone inside the structure to fight the fire as the house was lost. Remember Chief Alan Brunacini's statement, "risk a lot to save a life, risk nothing to save nothing." There was nothing to save but to put the fire out at this time. Unfortunately, this is not how the IC proceeded to fight this fire. At 2354 hours, forty-five minutes after the arrival of the IC, the fire was declared under control. Three firefighters were sent into the structure to open-up more ceiling areas on the north side of the structure for overhaul and suppression fire extension. All residents were out of the home safely, yet firefighters were sent back into the burning structure as roof trusses were collapsing, and holes were developing in the floor. While inside the structure, one of the firefighter's low-air alarms activated that he was running low on breathing air and he exited the building. At his exit he noticed a partial roof collapse and reported such to the IC. The second firefighter now had his low-air alarm activated and he proceeded to leave the structure. Firefighters are trained so that if one firefighter's low-air alarm activates, the entire crew exits the structure. (PART #2 will appear in the next Smoke Column. 



Most of the students did not know the meaning of where their street naming came from, but now are well aware that it is in honor of a heroic veteran.

Sayreville Veterans Visit Upper Elementary School for Community Education Program

Sayreville Veterans, U.S. Army Paratrooper Ed Strek, U.S. Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Rich Kosmoski, and U.S. Army Infantryman Frank Sullivan were invited to speak to students at Sayreville Upper Elementary School. We began by reciting the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag, with students—including boy scouts—standing alongside us during the pledge. We stated that we are military veterans and shared our service branches and roles. Most students found this experience eye-opening.

We spoke to students about our community, patriotism, and integrity. I emphasized respect and remembering Veterans. I did notice that every student had a yellow wristband with the word "RESPECT," what a coincidence. I served as co-chairman of the Sayreville Veterans Alliance for over 20 years, where I recommended, secured funding for, and oversaw dedications of parks, ball fields, memorials, and streets named after veterans.

During my interaction with the students, I asked them which local developments they lived in. I was seeking information on any students that lived on a street that was named and dedicated to a Wartime Hero Veteran or one of the families that had multiple family members that had served in the military. I was specifically looking for students that resided in the LaMer Complex, Towne Lake, or Patriots Hill. When some students responded with the street name they lived on, I went on to tell them that their street was named after a dedicated Veteran. They were quite surprised by this information. I went on to teach them the meaning of the "Patriot Hill" development and why it was named as such. Each street name represents a Veteran that was killed in France during World War 1. Though the names are long, some may be up to 15 letters long, they represent many of the Eastern European immigrants that came to

our country in the late 1800's and then went back to Europe to fight for our freedoms and the life safety of the Europeans. Complaints were made by new residents that the street names in Patriot Hill were TOO LONG, and their children would never learn how to spell them. Our answer to them was, "If the name could be fitted on a soldier's dog tag, then it certainly can be inscribed on a street sign." If these young men didn't go to war and win the war over the enemy, we may be speaking German today.

We proceeded to demonstrate the correct method for folding the American Flag, detailing the 13 steps required to ensure that, upon completion, neither the red nor white sections are visible. A few students were selected to fold the flag due to time limits, though many wanted to volunteer. After folding the flag, I demonstrated to the group how I present it to a fallen Veteran's family and express gratitude for their service. I presented the flag to the school principal.

I spoke to students about my 52 years with the Sayreville Fire Department and mentioned that if there's a fire alarm at UES, I may be driving the fire apparatus as it's in my main response area. This demonstrated our community involvement post-military service.

Although the session lasted only about half an hour, the children absorbed all the information given. I could have stayed in the program longer because it offers valuable information for students in the community. Speaking with these students was valuable; we benefited just as much as they did from the program.

Flashback To The Year 2000

12 Sports Legends Inducted Into St. Mary's Hall of Fame

St. Mary Diocesan High School held its inaugural Athletic Hall of Fame induction/dinner on Oct. 28th at the school gym, before a sellout crowd of 368.

Five major league baseball players/managers headed the field of 12 athletic greats. Allie Clark, who played on World Championship teams with the '47 Yankees and '48 Indians; the O'Brien twins, John and Ed, '48, who were bonus babies with the Pittsburgh Pirates; Jack McKeon, '48 who managed the Cincinnati Reds for the last few seasons, and was 1999 "Major League Manager of The Year" and 1999 "National League Manager of The Year," as well as "General Manager of the Year" in 1984 with the San Diego Padres; Tom Kelly manager of the Minnesota Twins since 1986, and winner of two World Series Championships in 1987 and 1991, was also selected "Manager of the Year" both years.

Other entrants included-Tom Scully '34, an All-State baseball and football star; Jack Kreiger '63, an All-State basketball player, and member of the '63 state baseball championship club; George Krzyzanowski '71, the school's all-time scoring leader in basketball, first player to crack 1,000 points, and holder of the single game scoring record of 50 points; Kathy Redling '78, the first female hoopster to score over 1,000 points, and owner of career softball records for highest average .599, home runs 35, and rbi-121; Eileen Fallon Seitz, '82, won the state tennis championship in 1980. Selected posthumously were Charley Eppinger, Coach and Athletic Director, whose teams won over 280 games; John Zdanewicz, '28, who starred in baseball and basketball, and later coached those teams to state crowns. Ellen Eppinger Eichele, daughter of Eppinger, and Jean Ryan Zdanewicz, wife of Zdanewicz attended, and gave acceptance speeches.

Cameras were flashing everywhere, and I was honored to take the first picture ever of the five major league ballplayers together. Then it was show time!

A current SM athlete, in uniform escorted each Hall of Famer to their tables, and then everyone enjoyed a delicious dinner.





Salt Water

Striped Bass fishing in Raritan Bay picked up but it's mostly from boats as shore fishing at our local beaches remains slow. I checked local beaches at Cliffwood and Keansburg and spoke to fishermen but not much was going on. I did see two nice Stripers plus some Blackfish on a private boat docked in Perth Amboy. I didn't see anything at local SA beach on the times I checked there. Surf fishing at Island Beach and LBI are still producing some nice Striped Bass at times. Party boat fishing for Stripers is on and off with some days better than others. Some of the boats will stop running at season's end and upcoming winter's bad weather. Those boats that fish for Blackfish are catching well. Some big ones are around with one fish over 13 pounds. Striped Bass regulations for 2026 will not change at this time.

Fresh Water

Winter Trout stocking in lakes and ponds statewide has been completed. My wife and I tried Spring Lake the day after stocking at the end of November and fished for a few hours but we didn't get any bites. I didn't see many other people there catch or have any fish at the time we were there. The boat launch ramp area at Round Valley Reservoir may be worth a try as Trout regularly cruise the shore in this area.



