1989 Champions Honored

On June 6 at their annual sports awards night the South Amboy Board of Education honored the H.G. Hoffman High School girls' basketball team on the 30th anniversary of their incredible overtime victory in the NJSIAA Tournament of Champions. For the first time each of the four public school group champions and the two parochial group champions would meet to decide an overall girls basketball champion. Reggie Carney's Lady Guvs were seeded 6th in the 6 team tournament and would meet #3 seed and Parochial B champion Bishop Eustace. On March 14th Hoffman High would prevail in the opening game with a well played 74 to 61 victory.

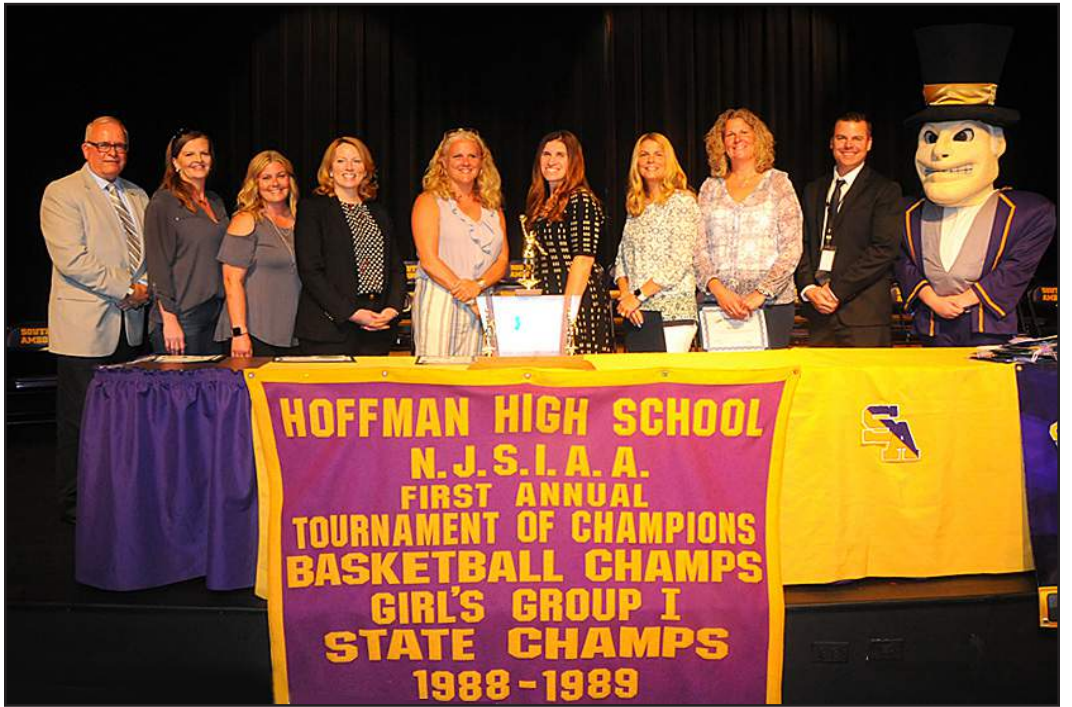
Two days later at Monmouth College the Lady Guvs would meet undefeated (31-0) and #2 seed Pascack Valley. In a hard fought and exciting game Jenny Kuziemski stole the ball with 20 seconds left in a tie game. After a time out the ball was again in Jenny's hands and she sent the gym into pandemonium when she sank a jump shot at the buzzer to give the girls a 45 to 43 win.

On March 19th the team traveled to the Meadowlands to face #4 seed and Parochial A champion Union Catholic for the championship. In another close game where neither team led by more than 5 points,

Hoffman found itself down by 3 points with 44 seconds left to play. Kris Kuziemski then made a basket, was fouled, and made the foul shot to complete the 3-point play and tie the game. She then blocked a shot on the Union Catholic star with 3 seconds left and sent the game into overtime.

As the overtime period ticked away and the teams tied at 43 Kris Kuziemski was fouled with just 4 seconds left. After a timeout she coolly went to the free throw line and sank both shots to give the Lady Guvs a 45 to 43 victory and the First Tournament of Champions Championship. Kris Kuziemski finished with 19 points and was named the tournament MVP.

This was truly a magical time in Hoffman/South Amboy High School sports history. It was the last of 5 straight Group I state championships, a Number 1 ranking nationally by USA Today, and a national Coach of the Year Award for Reggie Carney. The 1989 Hoffman High School Girls basketball team was the first team inducted into the NJSIAA Hall of Fame.

Education recognize the 30th anniversary of this timeless victory and present each team member with a DVD of the game. Watching the overtime period at the awards presentation reminded us of the excitement and talent this team generated. I would like to thank the Superintendent, the Board of Education, the Administration, the coaches, and especially the athletes for allowing us to be a part of your night and remembering an incredible and historic athletic accomplishment.

Travisano: An Amazing Life

Former Sayreville Councilman, Middlesex County Clerk, volunteer firefighter, and much more, Raniero "Renny" Travisano 82, of the Morgan section of Sayreville died on June 8. The local South Amboy/Sayreville communities have been in mourning for the man who has done so much for locals, through his public service, volunteering, and complete involvement and dedication to helping people in any way he could to make their lives a little bit better.

In addition to the political side of Renny, his job as county clerk, and firefighter, there is so much more to his magnificent life than could ever be printed in this paper, and would probably make a best-selling book. He was active in many, many organizations, and held

offices in lots of them.

Renny received his undergraduate from Monmouth University and his Master's degree from Kean University. He served in the U.S. Army in Korea, was previously employed by E.I. DuPont, then Sayreville Board of Education as a science teacher and guidance counselor at Sayreville Junior HS. Travisano was elected to the Borough of Sayreville Council, and served on it for 12 years. He then won the election for Middlesex County Clerk, and following his tenure there, worked as Purchasing Agent for the New Jersey Turnpike Authority from where he retired. He was an usher/ member of St. Mary's Church for over 60 years, and a

Our speaker this month was Christian Conrad. Christian is a Junior majoring in computer engineering at Hofstra University on Long Island. He is the son of Anthony Conrad, an officer of Christ Church and an active member of the South Amboy/Sayreville Rotary Club.

Christian made the argument that, as stated by Benjamin Franklin, common sense is a very uncommon commodity. Logic is the ability to apply the rules of mathematics to everyday situations. If this is done, much of the confusion we experience from things

like "fake news" and emotionally-based arguments will be eliminated. Media uses stories to play on people's emotions. Logic can separate us from these emotions and lead us to reasonable results.

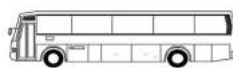

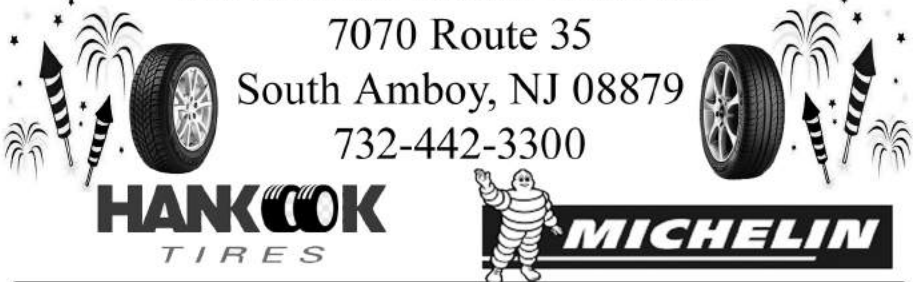

The Smoke Column

With summer upon us, our thoughts turn to many outside activities. As I have done in the past, I want to remind you about the importance of safety when using outside propane grills and charcoal grills. Before you turn on the propane grill for the first time this season, check the hoses that connect the tank to the burner valves. Look for any signs of cracking in the hoses, especially where it bends. Look also for signs of dry-rot throughout the entire length of the hose. Take the grate off the grill and clean out the bottom of the unit where all the dirt and debris of last year's cooking has accumulated. If you don't have the electric spark ignitor or the one you have is broken, purchase a long handle butane lighter to ignite the burners. DON'T throw a match inside the grill to light the burners. If the propane accumulates inside the enclosed grill and the match ignites this gas, you are in for a big surprise. There will be a rapid ignition of those gasses and the lid will blow off. Visually inspect the burners themselves for signs of soot buildup. Also look at the flame, it must be burning with a nice even blue flame completely across the entire burner. If not, the burner may be deteriorated and split at the seams. If the burners are not burning evenly or not heating up, check the valves and burners themselves for insects that might have found a home over the winter and are now clogging the burners and valves.

If you are using a charcoal grill and have a difficult time igniting the charcoal, use a recommended charcoal lighter fluid. DON'T under any circumstances attempt to ignite the charcoal with gasoline! You will be in for a very rude awakening and possibly serious burns. When you are done cooking on your charcoal grill, don't dispose of the charcoals in a plastic garbage container, it will melt and burn. When using either of these cooking devices, keep a safe distance away from any structures and overhangs.

With the Fourth of July just around the corner you will see various vendors selling "legal" fireworks for the holiday. These fireworks, in the hands of incompetent people, can cause serious injury and even death not only to themselves but to anyone in the vicinity. Many times, an errant firework goes astray and causes someone's home to catch fire. When fireworks go up in the air, they must come down somewhere and that somewhere may be the rooftop of a house. Since legal fireworks are new to New Jersey, we must continue to practice safety when using them. The majority of deaths and injuries from fireworks are to individuals between the ages of 5 years and 24 years of age. YES, I said 5 years old! They will mimic how their older siblings use fireworks but are unable to react as quickly. Just because fireworks may be labeled as safe, you can still get seriously hurt. Be very careful and supervise your children when you give them "Sparklers". Most of us remember as children playing with these sparklers and how hot the wire was when the sparkler burnt itself out. That burnt end of a sparkler can reach a temperature of over 1600 degrees. At that temperature, the hot wire will burn a hole through a little five year's old hand IMMEDIATELY! Be careful and provide constant supervision when using any kind of so-called legal fireworks. Have a bucket of water standing by so when that sparkler is finished it can be dropped in that bucket.

Illegal fireworks are another story and there is good reason why they are illegal. They are extremely dangerous and the use of them should be left to the professionals.

As this article goes to print, there is an investigation underway in Newark of a man being killed while igniting illegal fireworks. Allegedly, the M-80 blew-up in his hand causing massive internal injuries.

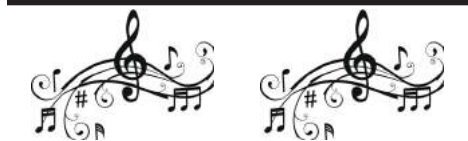

Where Have You Gone, Joe Gabel?

Joe Gabel had an outstanding athletic career at Sayreville War Memorial HS from 1966-1970, and did extremely well throughout his most interesting life.

In an exclusive interview, we touched many bases from sports to his career field and much more.

Joe told me that, "My dad thought I was gifted, and threw overhand to me at 5 years old." His baseball coaches through the years were his dad, Jack Trenta, Bill Switzer, Bob Keister, and Ernie Casazza. In high school, he lettered in 4 sports; baseball, basketball, football, and soccer. Gabel had high praise for Bombers baseball coach John Wortley, saying "Outside of my dad, I never met a better coach than John Wortley."

He credits Wortley with getting him a baseball scholarship to Northern Arizona University, where he was reunited with former Sayreville teammates Reggie Carney and Fred Poli, who were already playing for the varsity at the school. "I had developed power, and when I arrived at Arizona, the Sayreville guys were astonished. I played center field there, and it was ironic, because I had played third base the year before at Sayreville. I tried to get into Arizona State, but their coach, Bobby Winkles, a former big-leaguer wouldn't let me."

Gabel stayed for one semester at Northern Arizona U., and transferred to Salisbury State, where he played varsity baseball. He was very talented, and had 2 big league tryouts with the Dodgers, and one each with the Pirates and Braves. Joe felt his best performance came with the Pirates where he blasted a homer, and triple, and stole a base, and threw a runner out at home. To this day, he can't understand why he never was signed by a MLB team. After one tryout, Dutch Deutsch, a scout told Joe's dad, that "He can't hit the curve."

In 1975, he graduated with a BS in Business from Towson State and was hired by Amerada-Hess, where he worked as an Internal Auditor for 5 years. His next job was

at SCA Chemical Services in Newark, and he was transferred to Chicago. As a controller, he built the world's largest chemical waste incinerator.

His career path then took him to AT&T, where he designed a billing system, but unfortunately he was caught in the company's downsizing. So, it was on to Interbay Mortgage Co. as a sales rep, and he was doing very well selling reverse mortgages to senior citizens...but the market crashed, and he retired.

In retrospect, Joe said that "My mom and dad were my biggest influences in life. Dad taught me everything about baseball. He played baseball in high school. My parents went to all of my high school games."

Gabel said that his greatest baseball thrill was "In the '69 state tourney against Union, and I hit a home run to win the game in extra innings, 1-0." His next greatest memory was "In the '70 state title game against Union, and their ace pitcher Neil Gold. I hit a 2-run triple and stole home, and we won the championship, 4-0. Our '69 Sayreville team was the best I ever played on, and the '70 team was the most fun."

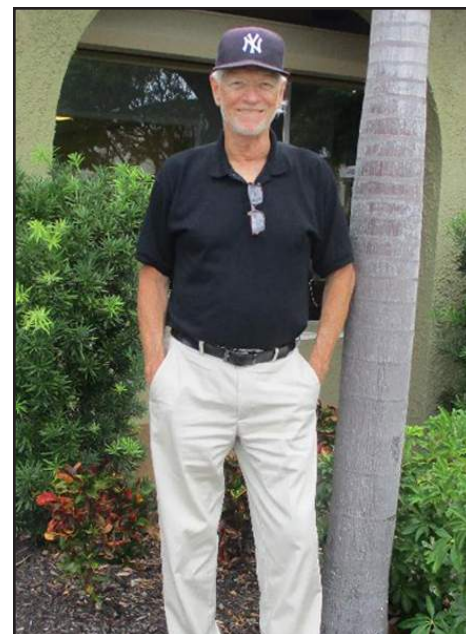
Fast forward to around 2008...Joe who has been playing adult amateur baseball from age 32-66 (present), saw an ad in the Star Ledger for open tryouts with the Newark Bears professional baseball club. The team was owned by former New York Yankee catcher Rick Cerone at the time. "I was 55 years old at the time, and I tried out for first base along with Ozzie Canseco, Jose's brother. I did pretty well, but he got the job. He had the big name and was younger."

Joe Gabel said, "I have no regrets in life, but I just wonder why I was never drafted by a pro team. Kevin Lynch and Gary Unkel asked the same question."

great Joe Theisman's roommate when they played baseball in the AAABA Tournament at Johnstown, PA...In high school, he guarded Perth Amboy basketball superstar/future NBA standout Brian Taylor, and held him to 18 points, much lower than his average... The Y Keeps Kids Safe Around Water

The world is 71% water-children are 100% curious! The South Amboy YMCA's Safety Around Water Program, designed to engage children and educate parents about the importance of water safety skills, is being offered to all second grade students in partnership with the City of South Amboy School District.

Due in part to the YMCA of the USA's Strategic Initiatives Fund, this initiative is being offered at no cost to over 70 children. Additional program costs, including transportation expenses, will be funded through donations received from the YMCA of Metuchen, Edison, Woodbridge & South Amboy's Annual Support Campaign. Children will learn two basic skills that will reduce the risk of drowning and give participants' confidence around water: how to get to safety if they fall into a pool, and how to safely swim to safety without tiring.

"The Y believes teaching children how to be safe around water is not a luxury, it is a necessity", said Rose Cushing, President & CEO of the YMCA of Metuchen, Edison, Woodbridge & South Amboy. "The Safety Around Water program can help children, families and adults make sure they learn essential water safety skills, which can open up a world of possibilities for them to satisfy their curiosity safely."

Know the facts! Two children die every

day from drowning. Statistics show that drowning remains the second leading cause of accidental death for children under the age of 14, yet many kids do not receive formal swimming or water safety training. Eighty eight percent of kids who drown are under adult supervision and 60 percent are within 10 feet of safety.

Through Safety Around Water, children will learn how to respond if they find themselves in unexpected water situations, from learning how to reach the water's surface if they submerge, to safely reaching a pool's edge or exiting any body of water.

Superintendent Jorge E. Diaz met with Karen Robson, newly appointed South Amboy YMCA Director of Operations, earlier this year to brainstorm ideas for programming between the two entities. "The YMCA continues to serve as a vital partner that dedicates itself to community outreach and support", said Mr. Diaz. "We welcome any opportunity to offer a program that enriches the lives of our students. Water safety is a life skill, and it is especially important for our students who live near the Raritan Bay."

Council President and YMCA member Mickey Gross stated, "As a waterfront developing community, we have a social responsibility to equip children with the tools they need to be confident in and around water. Every child in our community deserves



access to water safety." To help support this initiative and other scholarship needs, the Y will be selling 50/50 tickets at the South Amboy YMCA located at 200 John T. O'Leary Boulevard. Tickets will be sold until the start of the fireworks show at the Independence Day Celebration which begins at 4pm at the Raritan Bay Waterfront Park on July 3rd. The South Amboy YMCA offers swim lessons and free community swim

times, welcoming all, due to the efforts of the Y's Annual Support Campaign. All guests are swim-tested by a YMCA-trained lifeguard. A YMCA membership is not required; however, a guest application is required. YMCA scholarships, funded by the Y's Annual Support Campaign, are available for membership or programs. 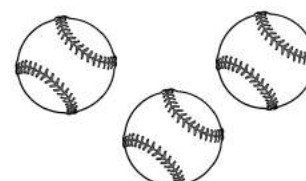

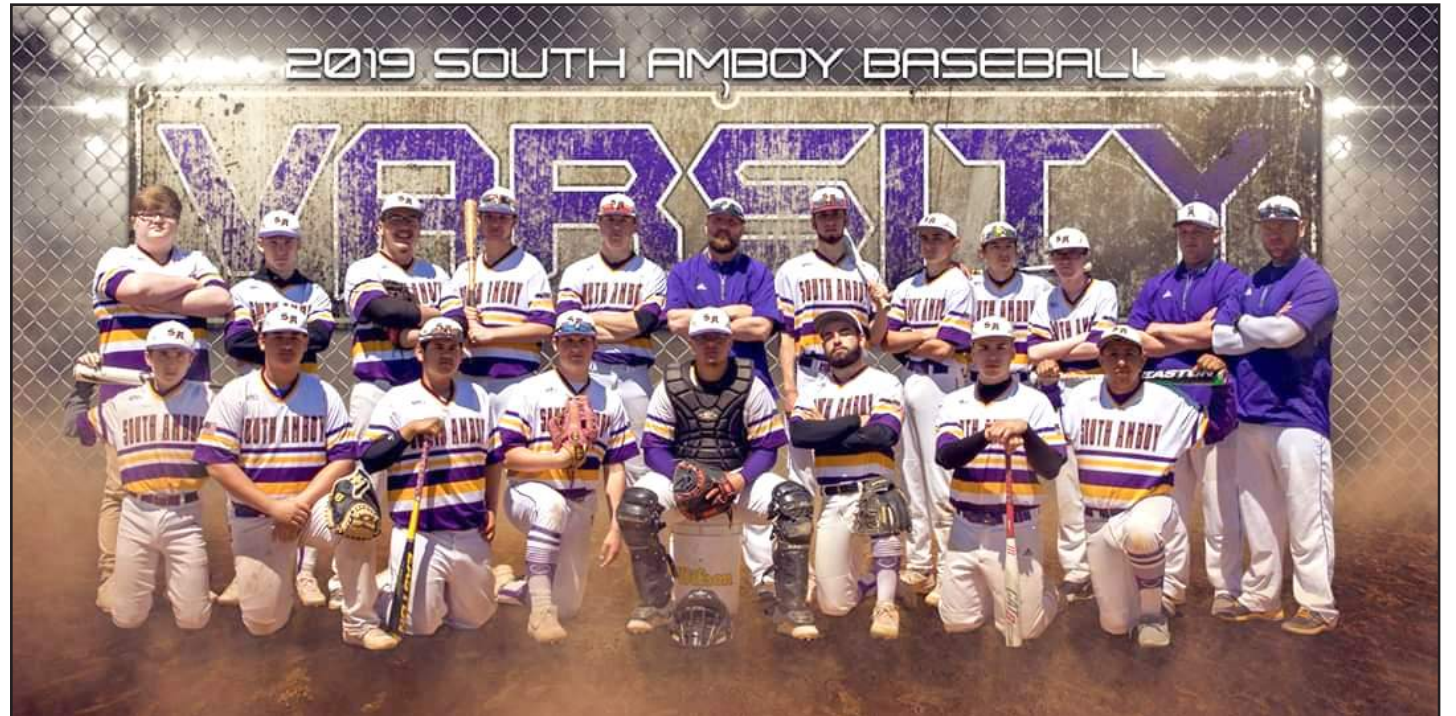

80 Years Ago

1939-St. Mary's Baseball Team Won 3 Titles

John Zdanewicz guided the 1938 St. Mary's baseball team to their first ever Group II Prep School championship, which was chosen by the N.J.S.I.A.A. His '39 Eagles edition appeared to have a tough act to follow, but the Blue & Gold rose to the occasion and brought home the city series championship over Hoffman, the county parochial title, and the Group II Prep School crown by racking up an impressive (13-5) mark. Allie Clark turned in the top offensive numbers in route to becoming an All-State shortstop selection. He paced the club with a .449 batting average, 35 hits, and tied for the home run lead with 3. Clark also stroked 4 doubles and 2 triples, and showed tremendous potential that would eventually lead to a major league baseball career with the Yankees, Indians, and Athletics. Catcher Bill "Smokey" Ryan finished 2nd in avg. with a superb .375, was 2nd in hits with 30, topped the team with 3 triples, 23 runs, and tied Clark for the HR crown with 3. Fine first sacker, Walt "Kelly"

Grembowicz stung the ball for a .373 avg., and was #1 in two-baggers with 6. Outfielder John "Mikey" Carroll blasted the ball for a .368 avg., was 2nd in runs scored with 22 and 2nd in doubles with 5. He also drilled 25 hits. Sophomore ace hurler, Joe Conroy was (7-1), and batted a lofty .348. Star infielder. Jack McNamara batted a lofty .348, outfielder Joe Rush, who went on to become Mayor of South Amboy hit .266, and was closely followed by Bernie Mackiel Sr., who batted .265. Other members of this classic team included; Joe "Scoop" McCarthy, Tom Zebro, S.Schultz. F. Donnola, Frank "Trip" Cheeseman who was the #2 hurler and finished with a fine (3-1) mark on the mound.

Seeing limited action in 3 games or less were; John Zebro, John "Bing" Miller, J. Stolte, F. Shafnacker, E. Zamorski, E. Nycz, Creed, Szaroleta. Other pitching records were; Shafnacker 1-0, Grembowicz 1-0, McCarthy 1-3.

Remembering Leo Kedzierski

Leo Kedzierski 89, formerly of South Amboy/Sayreville died on June 10. He was a star baseball and basketball player at St. Mary's HS in the late 1940's, and went on to play professional baseball in the minor leagues from 1949-1952. He was in the New York Giants organization in 1949 & 1950, and in '49, he played at Lawton, OK in the Sooner State League, and also Rehoboth, DE in the Eastern Shore League...He began the '50 season with Topeka, Kansas, Class C and after a slow start was sent to lola, an independent team in the Class D, K-O-M League, where he turned in a career-year, by finishing 4th in the league in batting average with a standout .313 clip, only 6 points behind the batting champ who hit .319. Leo outhit future big leaguers, Jim Pisoni .299, and Bill Virdon (former Yankee manager, .267. His other totals for 1950 were; runs-50, hits-97, doubles-24, triples-2, RBI-47, home runs-3, stolen bases-2...In an interview with me many years ago, Kedzierski recalled a '50 game he played against the great Mickey Mantle. "He was on Joplin, and in his first at bat came up batting lefty against our righty pitcher, and hit one off the right field fence for a double. We changed to a lefty pitcher, and in his next at bat (righty), he hit the ball to

the same exact spot." In '51, Leo played for 3 Pittsburgh Pirates farm clubs, Hutchinson. KS, Bartlesville, OK. (K-OM), and Enid, Ok. His final season in '52 was spent with an independent Upstate New York-Canadian League team, Plattsburg, N.Y. His pro career ended after the '52 season, as he went on to pursue his studies at college.

On a personal note, Leo was a great guy who was a big success in life, as a marketing specialist with Ace Wire and Cable Marketing in Rahway, and was a proud veteran who served in the U.S. Army. When healthy, he was always working out in the gym, and could also be seen on Sundays attending Mass at St. Mary's Church. He was a fine tennis player who was crowned Men's Singles Champion in 1966, and had a few other championships at Frog Hollow Swim & Tennis Club, when they had their annual tennis tournament. He also loved going to Florida during Spring Training, and visiting his old friend and teammate Jack McKeon, when Jack managed the Florida Marlins.

Leo Kedzierski was a terrific person, and I'm glad I had the opportunity to interview him, and get to know him over the years. He certainly will be missed, God Bless Leo.

After a (5-9) regular season record, RRR turned it on and won 4 of 5 throughout the playoffs to cop the crown in a best-of-3 series over Independence Fire Co. Bruce Ramer was assistant manager, and George Hubbs, coach. RRR was led by ace pitcher/leading hitter John Inman, Tom O'Connor, Tim Kelly, Brian Grover, co-captains Dave Brady and Bill Brown, Bob Egan, Shawn Leonard, Bob Aucone, Darren Gorczyca, Mike Savin. The fine rookie crop included Andy Pipala, John Mulligan, Daryl Ball, Bill Wagner, Chris Mierzwiak, Jim Leach.

Raritan River Railroad switched sponsors in 1978 to Mario's Sub Shop thanks to late owner Mario Birardi Jr. Most of the outstanding lineup from '77 returned

including Inman, Kelly, Grover, Aucone, Gorczyca, Savin, Pipala, Mulligan, Wagner, Ball, Mierzwiak, Leach. Promising rookies were Jim Campbell, Tim Bloodgood, Ray Kelly, Brian Dudley, Joe Charmello, Bob Nebus, Tony Camporeale. Mario's cruised to the league pennant with a (12-3) record and swept through the playoffs winning 3 games including a 2-game sweep over South Amboy Trust Co. to capture its 2nd straight title, under manager Burkard and assistant manager George Cattano Jr.

In 1979, Mario's Sub Shop under new manager George Cattano Jr. marched to their 3rd straight league championship. Members from the '78 champs who returned were Pipala, Mulligan, Wagner, Ball, Mierzwiak, Leach, Bloodgood, Camporeale, Ray Kelly, Nebus, Charmello. The rookies were Brian McCabe, Jay Kennedy, Ken Huryk, Steve Martin, Tom Krygier.

Mechanicsville Fire Co. 1970-71 South Amboy Babe Ruth League Champs

Manager Russ Stillwagon and coach Pete Huryk put together a talented squad that marched to the championship by beating Raritan River Railroad. The roster included Kevin Homan, Glen Gerding, Bob Stillwagon, Leroy Kurtz, Henry Wortley, Mark Abbatiello, Larry Parsons, Gary Linderoth, Ray Linderoth, Mike Switzer, Ron Zimmerman, James Caracappa, Steve Gray.

The '71 team racked up an amazing 16 victories, and once again topping

Raritan River for the title. Under manager Russ Stillwagon and coach Pete Huryk, the Mechanicsville Fire Co. team was comprised of returning players Wortley, Gerding, Homan, Bob Stillwagon, Switzer, Gary Linderoth, Caracappa, Gray. The many talented rookies who helped win the championship were: Bob Besner, Ron Stillwagon, Ralph Dante, John Minnick, Bob Ruiz, Jerry McAndrew, Bob Morgan.

Gomolka's Auto Body 1969-70 Morgan AA Midget League Champs

This group of talented youngsters was managed by Al Gomolka Jr., with assistant manager Rich Gray. Team sponsor Al Gomolka Sr. donated game schedules to the entire league. Most of the players mentioned played for both years and included Ed

Gorzynski, Neil Hourahan, Dave Gomolka, Jeff Kabat, Jim Phillips, Dan Michoch, John DeFillips, George Nycz, Fred Singer, Mark Togli, Lee Wilson, Richie Peters, and several others. Kevin Hourahan was the always energetic batboy.

Mechanicsville Fire Co. 1964-65-66 South Amboy Babe Ruth League Champs

In 1964, manager Joe McCarthy and his assistant managers, Frank Jankowski and Joe Kelly (a former minor league pitcher), had a pretty good nucleus of returning players from the '63 team, plus an influx of rookies drafted from the South Amboy Little Fellas League.

The seasoned players included Curt Wood, Billy Clayton, Dan Hansell, Leo Dohan, Tony Pelican, Dan Cheeseman, Mark Ellvinger, Tom "Tee" O'Connell, Paul Jankowski, John Ewtuschek, John Coan. The crop of first-year youngsters with potential were Tom Kelly, Mark Bratus, Joe Jaskowiak, Ray Leonard, Tom Burkard, Mike Powers, Fran "Cigus" Vanni, Joe DeLucia. Dan Cheeseman recalled his final season, "It was a magical time for those lucky to be part of Mr. Joe McCarthy's baseball program. His assistant manager Mr. Joe Kelly was a former pro and played minor league ball. He really knew the game, and created an atmosphere of excellence. When we took the field as players, we knew we could win. We expected to win! Everybody came to play. All the kids on the roster could play and carry their weight. We learned how to act like major leaguers. We talked, chatted, set defense, and we hit cutoffs, and everybody contributed. That summer I also learned how to be a coach from Joe McCarthy and Joe Kelly, life lessons that never left me."

Thanks to outstanding managing, coaching, and fine play throughout the season, Mechanicsville Fire Co. breezed to the league regular season pennant (1st place), and the playoff championship, sweeping Oak View Nursing Home in the title series. In the final game, Curt Wood was the winning pitcher and struck out 11, as Mechanicsville won 9-6. Tony Pelican pounded 4 hits and Tom Kelly 3 for the winners.

The '65 edition lost 8 players, and it looked like it would be a rebuilding year ahead. The defending champions roster was now comprised of Wood, Dohan, Kelly, Bratus, Jaskowiak, Leonard, Burkard, Powers, Vanni, DeLucia, and newcomers 14-year old lefty pitcher/outfielder Jim Tingle, and talented rookie outfielder Tom Ruzala. Once again McCarthy's boys defied the odds and marched to the pennant/ league playoff

title, this time taking 3 games to top Oak View. The Firemen won game #1, 3-0, lost game #2, 12-4, but copped the crown, 1-0 in a thrilling finale, behind a 3-hit, 11 strikeout performance by Wood. In the last inning, Wood broke up an Ed Jenkins no-hitter with a double, and Fran "Cigus" Vanni singled him in with the big game-winner.

In '66 with the loss of franchise-pitcher Curt Wood, and ace first baseman, Leo Dohan, Mechanicsville faced a stiff challenge to become the first team to capture 3 consecutive South Amboy Babe Ruth League championships. Returning for their final year was Kelly, Bratus, Jaskowiak, Leonard, Burkard, Powers, Vanni, Tingle and DeLucia. Many talented rookies were drafted by Manager McCarthy, including Joe Wallis, Joe Vigilante, Ray Downs, Bill Cheeseman, Ken Kokoszka, Bill Parsons, Ron Sturgis, Jim Pavlonnis, Rich Muchanic. Young Joe McCarthy was once again the team's energetic batboy.

Ray Downs a rookie that season recalled, "Mr. McCarthy was a teacher of the game, and did an outstanding job teaching all of us rookies how to play the game at this level. His assistant Frank Jankowski never missed a practice and their dedication was outstanding. That year, we had a powerhouse and won the South Amboy Babe Ruth League championship. Holy cow, winners as rookies, not too bad! The 1966 experience stayed with me all my life, and I have on my office wall, the photograph of that team hanging prominently along with my South Amboy Sabres photo with most of the same guys in that photo too."

The season turned out to be really tough, but Mechanicsville prevailed, winning the regular season crown with an (11-2) record, and sweeping the playoff championship over Independence Fire Co., winning the finale, 5-2, as Jim Tingle picked up the victory. Mechanicsville Fire Co. became the first and only team in league history to rack up 3 successive pennants and 3 playoff championships in a row in the league's 40+ year history, while compiling an incredible overall record of 50 wins and 5 losses.

Zagata's Welding 1963-64 Sayreville Little League Champs

Zagata's Welding captured the Sayreville Little League championship in 1963 and 1964. In the '64 finals, Zagata's Welding swept the Riverside team, 5-4, and 4-2 to win the Sayreville Little League playoff championship. Joe Gabel was the winning pitcher in both contests, and in Game #2, he fired a 4-hitter, struck out 11, and belted a single and double.

The 1963 squad under manager Bill Switzer and coach Mr. DeLuca consisted of Frank Sadowski, Bob Rodziewicz, Gary George, Jack Trenta, Billy Switzer, Joey DeLuca, Stan Strazynski, Paul Kutne, Eddie Thompson, Bob McFadden, Clint Farfel, Joe Gabel. Despite losing 4 impact players, the '64 team pictured here made it 2 straight championships in a row.

David McGill

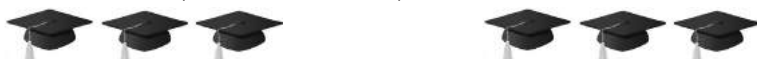

Area Priests Celebrate Milestones

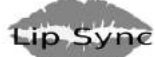



Traveling With Back Pain

Whether for business or pleasure, traveling is hard on your back. You spend time in uncomfortable seats and unfamiliar beds and carry heavy suitcases through airports and hotel lobbies. It's time to give your back a vacation by learning how to travel with back pain.

1. Lighten your luggage load. Resist the temptation to pack everything in one carry-on suitcase or garment bag. If you want to avoid checking luggage, pack only what you can carry comfortably. If you carry a garment bag or suitcase with straps, remember to balance the load by alternating shoulders. Carrying two suitcases of approximately equal weight is an even better solution.

Be aware of proper body mechanics while carrying your luggage. Imagine an invisible line that starts at your ear and continues past your shoulder to your hip. When the line is straight, you back is in proper balance

Use luggage carts. Push the cart with both arms and keep your elbows tucked in close to your body to avoid over-reaching.

The next time you buy luggage, look for lightweight suitcases with built-in rollers. Make sure the handle allows you to stand up straight while pulling or pushing the suitcases. Rubber wheels are recommended for protection against slips and skids.

2. Beat back pain. Airline seats are not designed for comfort. From first class to economy, all passengers have the same complaints. Fortunately, you can make a few simple adjustments to protect your back. For lumbar support, place an airline pillow or a folded blanket in the small of your back. Be conscious of your posture, especially if you want to nap. Use a pillow or folded blanket to support your neck.

Gentle stretching exercises can help relieve the stress of a long trip. Try to stand in the aisle and walk a little at least once every hour.

3. Making your back count. Learn to make choices that will protect your back from stress and strain. Leave a little extra time to get to the airport. Let the redcap handle your luggage.

By including these choices in your travel plans, you'll have a more relaxing and pain free trip!

Fishing Flashes

Salt Water

Bluefish are being caught from Party Boats along with a few Striped Bass. Even though fishing isn't good all the time, it's still worth the trip. Surf fishing is particularly good at Island Beach and LBI. Some are big fish up to 16 pounds. Some big Striped Bass are mixed in. One person even caught a Cobia in the LBI surf. In Raritan Bay Bluefish are showing up on and off. I saw some Bluefish caught on the pier at High St in Perth Amboy. Barnegat Bay also has big Bluefish off some of the public docks, also Blowfish have arrived there. Fluke fishing coast-wise is good. You still have to work at it to find a keeper due to the 18 inch size limit. Sea Bass fishing off of Party Boats is very good along with Ling. Many people are getting their limits with this fishing. A few Weakfish and Sheepshead have been caught around LBI and Barnegat Inlet rocks.

Fresh Water

There are still a good number of Trout in rivers statewide. Stocking is over for the spring, but the rain keeps the waters high making it hard to catch fish. My wife and I tried the Pequest one afternoon during the Memorial Day Weekend. Despite the high and off color of the water we still caught 8 Rainbows in a few hours. Fishing in lakes statewide for Bass, Pickerel and assorted Pan Fish should be good. The Delaware River Shad run is over. I tried my luck in Peapack & Far Hills in mid June but only got a little throwback Smallmouth Bass, a few bites and nothing else!

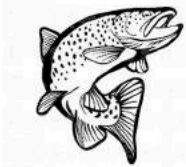
