



Are You Too Young Or Too Old To Remember?? By Elaine Holton Scott

In a blink, things come and go. What we had thought would last forever, upped and disappeared without warning instead. People pass away; new buildings replace old ones; children grow up and get old...like the rest of us who had thought we'd always stay young. 



MEMORIAL DAY 2018

Each year on Memorial Day, we pay a the battlefields in ambulances. special tribute to those men and women who had fought and died in America's wars so that we may enjoy the freedoms that we have been accustomed to as Americans.

But this year, 2018, is a special year as it marks the 100th Anniversary, the Centennial of the "GREAT WAR" or as some refer to it as "THE WAR TO END ALL WARS" and we know it more commonly as World War I.

As a peace loving country, the United States of America attempted to remain neutral and not get involved in a war so far away on a distant continent. America was willing to send supplies and material to the battlefront, but was not ready to send our young men.

As the war progressed in Europe and the enemy was gaining victory after victory and gaining a foothold throughout Europe, it was inevitable that sooner or later, America had to be involved. So many of us had fathers, grandfathers, great grandfathers, or other relatives who left their homes to fight against the German Army in Europe.

World War I provided us with historic names and locations of battles such as: the Argonne Forest, Chateau Thierry, Battle of the Somme, Battle of Verdun, and the First & Second Battles of the Marne, plus many others. Our soldiers, "Dough Boys" as they were called had to carry and use gas masks as part of their protection because the enemy was using chemical weapons in their attacks.

For the first time, airplanes were used on the battlefields to monitor movements of the enemy and drop bombs on them or to bring in supplies, and paratroopers to bolster our your Buddy Poppy proudly and take a moment troops. One of our most famous aviators of World War I, Captain Eddie Rickenbacker was the "ACE of ACES" as a pilot. By war's end he had shot down 26 enemy planes, more than any other pilot and received the Medal of Honor.

In this war, for the first time the Army became mechanized using tanks as weapons and trucks for transportation of supplies, equipment, and to remove the wounded from

As we look back over the last 100 years to the "War to End All Wars", let me ask you, has it really been the "War to End All Wars"? In the upcoming days, ceremonies will be conducted at these battlefield cemeteries in Europe and cemeteries all across our nation in recognition of the World War I Centennial. Sayreville had sent over 300 young patriots to the battlefields in France during World War I and not all of them returned.

The following is a list of Sayreville's young men, who gave the ultimate sacrifice for they will always be remembered and never forgotten: HARRY L. BRANKEN, JOHN GOROKI, GEORGE JENSEN, FRANK KARWATT, JOSEPH KRZYNOWEK, OTTO KUSHNETKI, FRANK J. LEWANDOSKI, PETER PERO, DANIEL SMULLEM, FRANK TOCZAK, FRANK WIECZORKOWSKI.

Please ponder this question, "Will There ever be a War to End All Wars"? And, if so, who will be the victors, how will it be accomplished and how will the survivors survive?

The Veteran's Buddy Poppy was a result of World War I. These poppies grew in Flanders Field in Belgium where many of our American soldiers were killed and buried. We now use this poppy as a symbol and tribute to all Veterans who served our country and all proceeds from the donations received for these poppies go to the rehabilitation of our wounded Veterans.

As you celebrate Memorial Day, wear to reflect back 100 years, to those brave young men who dedicated their lives for us, for our freedoms, our liberty, and for everything you enjoy in your daily lives.













Whether for business or pleasure, traveling is hard on your back. You spend time in uncomfortable seats and unfamiliar beds and carry heavy suitcases through airports and hotel lobbies. It's time to give your back a vacation by learning how to

1. Lighten your luggage load. Resist the temptation to pack everything in one carry-on suitcase or garment bag. If you want to avoid checking luggage, pack only what you can carry comfortably. If you carry a garment bag or suitcase with straps, remember to balance the load by alternating shoulders. Carrying two suitcases of approximately equal weight

Be aware of proper body mechanics while carrying your luggage. Imagine an invisible line that starts at your ear and continues past your shoulder to your hip. When the line is straight, you back is in

Use luggage carts. Push the cart with both arms and keep your elbows tucked in close to your body to avoid over-reaching.

The next time you buy luggage, look for lightweight suitcases with built-in rollers. Make sure the handle allows you to stand up straight while pulling or pushing the suitcases. Rubber wheels are recommended fro protection against slips and skids.

2. Beat back pain. Airline seats are not designed for comfort. From first class to economy, all passengers have the same complaints. Fortunately, you can make a few simple adjustments to protect your back. For lumbar support, place an airline pillow or a folded blanket in the small of your back. 
