Sayreville's Bielak Makes The Big Show By Tom Burkard

Brandon Bielak has arrived! He was recently called up to the Major Leagues by the Houston Astros, and has been outstanding in his first 4 games with a (2-0) record on the pitcher's mound, for the team who currently stands at (6-9). Bielak has pitched in 15.1 innings, allowing 3 earned runs, for an outstanding 1.76 ERA, with 11 strikeouts and 7 walks. (As of Aug. 10th)

Following two excellent relief appearances, he got his first MLB starting assignment against the Arizona Diamondbacks, and pitched brilliantly for 5 innings, allowing only 2 hits, and shutting the D'Backs out. He struck out 1 and issued 3 walks before giving way to the bullpen. Bielak left with the Astros ahead, but the relief pitching corps blew the game, costing him another victory.

Brandon, who starred in high school for St. Joseph's, Metuchen, and went on to a stellar career at Notre Dame University, was drafted in the 11th round, overall pick #331, by the Houston franchise in the 2017 MLB First-Year Player Draft. For the past three seasons, he has worked his way up through the Astros minor league organization, and last year at AAA Round Rock, he was (8-4), 4.41 ERA, and 86 strikeouts in 85.2 innings pitched. His overall minor league totals were pretty impressive since 2017, as he compiled a (20-13) won-lost record, and a 2.94 ERA, while striking out 292 batters in 272.1 innings. The hard-throwing right-hander has a fastball in the mid-90's and a variety of pitches including a curveball, slider, and a super change up that he uses to fool hitters. We wish Brandon Bielak the very best of luck, and continued success in his Major League Baseball career!

Gusty Isaias Blacks Out Area

Tropical Storm Isaias August 4 left the area reeling from downed trees and widespread blackouts. Some neighborhoods in Sayreville and South Amboy lost power for several days due to damage caused by the worst storm since Superstorm Sandy in 2012. Strong winds and rain left 1.4 million people statewide without power at one point. Wind gusts partially uprooted a large yellow poplar tree in South Amboy near the Rollermagic Skating Rink and forced evacuation of several homes on North Stevens Ave. Authorities feared the tree would fall on live power lines and create a

Dangerous gusty winds from fast moving dangerous situation. The street was closed to traffic and residents went to the South Amboy Senior Center until winds died down. Many homes and businesses along Washington Road in Sayreville from Raritan St. to Ernston Rd remained without power the day after the storm. Police placed traffic cones at the corners of Raritan St. and Washington Rd and Washington and Ernston Rd. because traffic lights weren't working. Rail service on the North Jersey Coast Line and the entire NJ Transit system was suspended due to downed overhead wires causing South Amboy station commuters to look for alternatives.

Sayreville Major Leaguers By Tom Burkard

When the Houston Astros recently called-up Sayreville's Brandon Bielak to the Major Leagues, he became the fourth player from the Borough of Sayreville to reach the elusive dream of being on a big-league team. Prior to Bielak's arrival at the big-time, Kevin Mulvey, who was a 2nd round pick by the New York Mets in 2006, got to see some action in the majors with the Minnesota Twins and Arizona Diamondbacks from 2009-2010. Prior to his Major League experience, he starred in high school at Bishop Ahr, and then in college at Villanova University, where he is currently the head baseball coach. Tom Kelly, who was born in Minnesota, grew up in Sayreville, attended St. Mary's HS, where he was an All-State outfielder, and played most of his youth league sports in South Amboy. He was selected in the 8th round of the 1968 Major League Baseball Draft by the Seattle Pilots. He got the big call to the show, and saw some action with the Minnesota Twins in 1975, playing 49 games and hitting a homer, and later went on to become their manager from 1986-2001, guiding them to the World

Series Championship in '87 and '91. Tom finished his MLB managing career with a record of (1,140-1,244, .478). In 1967, Eddie "Buddy" Popowski was the third base coach for the American League champion Boston Red Sox. He spent over 60 years in the Red Sox organization as a player, coach, manager, minor league instructor, and had a field named in his honor at the Sox' Spring Training home in Fort Myers, Florida. "Pop" as he was affectionately called by many, also served briefly as interim manager of the MLB Red Sox in 1969, guiding them to a (6-4) record. Pitcher Bob Dustal was born in Sayreville, and starred at South River HS. He made it to the big leagues in '63 with the Detroit Tigers, and pitched 7 games in relief.

As time passes, many events in the history of our country seem to get forgotten or placed way back in our memory banks. There are even those who have attempted to manipulate or change the facts of this and other events in our country's history.

Many of you reading this article personally witnessed the enormous tragedy of the evens that folded on the morning of September 11, 2001. You watched it in disbelief and awe as those planes struck the Twin Towers. For many, it took time to fully understand the gravity of what was happening in New York City let alone in the countryside of Pennsylvania and at the Pentagon. Many historians have written that the 911 event surpasses the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7th, 1941. Only those who have lived through both disasters and witnessed the tragedies that followed can make that determination. They are the ones that suffered the emotional stress of attacks by enemies/terrorists on our home front. These people make up a small percentage of the American population today that can say they are survivors of two horrific events to destroy our country. The rest of us can only imagine the sentiment of our country on the morning of December 8th, 1941 as news of the attack reached our shores.

The attacks of September 11, 2001, a more recent tragic event, may still be fresh in our minds. Almost everyone alive on that day can recall what they were doing when they first heard the news. As the anniversary of 911 approaches I emergencies while the FDNY responded in New York City, they were dispatched throughout all five Boroughs of the City, wherever they were needed they went. As dedicated individuals, they answered the call to duty when needed!

> It was also a very chaotic day in our local communities as we were glued to our televisions. Many feared the unknown and what possibly may happen next. Were more attacks coming, what would be attacked next, were the terrorists coming from within our local communities, were we the next target being so close to New York City? That day we had everything to fear, especially fear of the unknown. Were our local communities prepared? We hope to think we were ready and prepared for what was to come next. All the firehouses had stand-by crews ready to respond to any emergencies if they happened. Of course, mostly all the firefighters wanted to respond to New York City and the scene of the action, but we also had a responsibility and commitment to the residents of our local communities. Many firefighters were needed to stay local in the event of future attacks. All firefighters have in their blood the urge to help those in need. When those firefighters in FDNY needed help, we all wanted to help and support them. When the Twin Towers fell and killed 343 of our brothers it was as if members of our family were killed. As firefighters, we are all brothers related to duty.

> So as the anniversary quickly approaches, please reflect on that tragic day, and remember what happened to our brother firefighters and our country and let us never forget! Rest in Peace, We Will Finish the Fight!

Salt Water

Fluke fishing in Raritan Bay is still mostly shorts, but some bigger fish have been caught. One was caught from a party boat that went over 11 pounds. Party boats fishing out in the ocean have caught some bigger Fluke up to 12 pounds. The keeper ratio is still better in back areas behind Barnegat Bay. Other party boats are catching quite a few Chub Mackerel along with Bonito, Spanish Mackerel and Sea Bass. Beach fishing in the bay remains slow. At Island Beach, small Bluefish are being caught in the surf in good numbers. It is the same at LBI beaches along with Kingfish. Cow Nose Rays are all over so inattentiveness may result in some poles being pulled into the water. Kingfish are also being caught off Jetties and beaches further north. Party boats that fish the Mud Hole wrecks are bringing in, Ling, Sea Bass and some Porgies. Thirty miles offshore both Yellowfin and Bluefin Tuna are biting well.

Fresh Water

Best fishing bet now is Carp and Catfish due to the hot weather changing the water temperature in all the streams and lakes statewide. Largemouth Bass can be caught in early morning and evening hours. Pike continues to be caught in the Passaic River especially in the area around Fairfield. Trout are being caught in Round Valley Reservoir on live baits fished deep.
