Channel 2: South Amboy A New Hot Spot

The city of South Amboy is becoming well-known in the New York City metropolitan area as a place to be. WCBS TV Channel 2 aired a report January 16 during the five o'clock news hour. Channel 2 correspondent Meg Baker reported that local officials want to turn South Amboy into a "hot spot." The report said the city has the advantage of undeveloped land along a waterfront such as Raritan Bay. South Amboy Mayor Fred Henry is pleased the New York TV station featured the municipality. "The ferry will get you to lower Manhattan within 41 minutes, so we're hoping that's going to bring in more commuters to South Amboy and also help with our redevelopment," he told Channel 2 news. The city expects to become the first state designated transit village with rail, bus, and ferry service. The project will be paid by federal funds, and the hope is that it will be completed in two years. The new train station already exists and is part of the transit village plan. Mayor Henry said the city has to deal with the state Department of Transportation, the Environmental Protection Agency, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and state historians. The ferry terminal will be constructed on land that was used for the coal business. The coal was shipped by train across Pennsylvania and loaded onto barges. Business Administrator Glenn Skarzynski is looking forward to the project completion and told Meg Baker, "There's not a better place in New Jersey, to be next to everything that New York City has, and to come here and enjoy our nice little suburban enclave on the bay."

Yearbook-Hoffman 1970

Hoffman High School seniors probably blasted their car radios to The Rolling Stones' "Honky Tonk Women" or "Crystal Blue Persuasion" by Tommy James & The Shondells, as they cruised the "Pleasant Little City" on that early Sept. '69 day to start their final year. Eugene Dobrzynski was Superintendent of Schools, and Adam Martin principal. A few top-notch teachers were: Donald Parker, John Oleyar, Michael Poll Jr., and George Virgilio. The yearbook was dedicated to Michael Olszak. Senior Class President was Micheline Havlusch; VP-Anne Wahler; Sec.-Geraldine Papp. Christine Zavodsky was Student Council President, and also Editor-In-Chief of the school newspaper. Kathleen Kubinak was president of the Honor Society, and also Future Teachers of America Club. Vivian Bolen was the Library Council President. The energetic seniors, all 68 of them, sold candy, cushions, cake, and also took a trip to New York. The South Amboy kids also got a chance to tour Washington, D.C. on their class trip.

Alumna Takes Center-Stage In Blogging/ Theater Industry

After years of auditions, rehearsals and show-stopping performances, alumna Maggie Bera is taking her experiences and sharing them with the theater industry.

Bera graduated from Texas State with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in musical theater May 2017. At the start of her final semester, Bera created her blog, "Actor Aesthetic," which focuses on musical theater and her experiences. Bera said she wanted to use her industry knowledge in hopes of becoming a resource for those pursuing musical theater professionally.

"By sharing information that I learned along the way through personal experience and chats with colleagues, I have always hoped to bridge that gap for young artists," Bera said.

Bera said the lack of information online for actors in the industry was a motivator in the development of her blog. On "Actor Aesthetic," readers can find information on the logistics of auditions, where to find job listings, how to submit resumes and more.

Bera's love for performing bloomed at a young age. During the ages 9-11, Bera said she performed the National Anthem at minor league baseball games throughout the tri-state area. Bera said she also had the opportunity to sing the National Anthem for the New York Mets and Philadelphia 76ers.

"I really caught the theater and performing bug early on," Bera said. "I've always wanted to be a performer—it's always been my love."

Bera is currently based in New York City and has performed regionally for several productions including "The Little Mermaid" in Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin, "The World According to Snoopy" in Houston and "Peter Pan" in Mansfield, Connecticut.

Bera said her favorite part of performing is the ability to tell stories. She said she finds enjoyment in being able to dress up as a completely different person for each show as well as fueling a connection with her audience.

"I love telling stories and I feel as actors, it is our job to tell a story as truthfully as possible with as much integrity to the author as possible," Bera said.

From ages 11-18, Bera said she trained with Papermill Playhouse, a regional theater in New Jersey. For eight years, Bera said she participated in the theater's Musical Theatre Summer Conservatory, a program that trains students on all aspects of musical theater.

Bera said her involvement in Papermill Playhouse ignited her passion for musical theater.

"Every single year I got more interested in pursuing this as a career, so by the time I was (a) senior I knew I had to go to school for this and pursue this professionally," Bera said.

In 2013, Bera auditioned for Texas State's musical theater program and other universities in Chicago at the Unified Auditions, a form of musical theater auditions where multiple programs hold auditions for incoming classes.

Although Bera is from New Jersey, she said she was drawn to Texas State's program due to award-winning actress, director and educator, Kaitlin Hopkins, who created the program in 2009.

After performing for Texas State's program, Bera said she was accepted into

the program on the spot, an experience that rarely happens during the audition process.

"It was unlike anything I had ever experienced," Bera said. "It was an absolute dream."

Hopkins said she went into the audition process knowing what kind of class she wanted to build for her program. After seeing Bera and two other students perform, Hopkins said she knew she had to offer each of them a spot.

"I jumped on that opportunity and made offers on the spot hoping that they would say yes and all three of them did," Hopkins said.

When creating Texas State's program Hopkins said she developed it in a holistic approach, meaning the program focuses on training students in mental wellness, vocal health, physical health and nutrition. She said the program also focuses on business aspects of the industry, such as how students should read contracts, information on national tours and how students can build their social media presence.

"Our curriculum is what performing artists need to enter the market," Hopkins said.

Hopkins said the musical theater program not only focuses on raising good artists but also good people. Hopkins said she is proud Bera is giving back to other artists.

"Maggie took all of her innate gifts, as a person and as a performer, and everything that she's learned here and she's giving back to her community," Hopkins said. "I think that speaks a great deal to her character and the person and professional that she is."

Cassie Abate has been the head of the dance area for Texas State's musical theater program for eight years. Abate said Bera was one of the hardest working students in the program and is an energetic yet nuanced performer with incredible skills in all areas.

"She's very good at interpreting the story, conveying character and expressing character through whatever medium she's utilizing," Abate said.

Abate said Bera's blog is a great resource for aspiring performers because Bera features content that cannot be taught in a university setting, such as discussing her personal experiences in the industry.

"She always comes up with really amazing, not only insightful but creative solutions to common problems actors face today," Abate said. "She's able to take things that may seem daunting or unknown to performers and really makes it accessible and relatable."

To further her outreach in the theater industry, Bera launched her podcast in November 2018 as an extension of her blog under the same name. On the podcast, Bera interviews special guests, such as individuals working on Broadway to individuals performing on national tours.

Bera said her podcast is also a platform where she provides tips on how actors can submit to casting directors, how they can get an agent and even tips on how to audition for college programs.



The Smoke Column

In a previous article I reported on the "Traffic Incident Management System" (TIMS) and the importance of it being implemented at all roadway incidents. This program and all its components cannot be reinforced enough.

WHY? During the first fourteen days of this new year, seven first responders were killed while working roadway incidents. This figure is unacceptable.

What can we do to prevent these tragedies? When a Line of Duty Death (LODD) occurs, it affects so many people including the first responder's family, the organization, and the entire community. More first responders are now being killed or injured at roadway incidents than in fighting fires. This is a trend that has been increasing over the past few years and must be reversed. What do we relate it to? Speed of the passing motorist plays a factor in some cases, lack of attention in others, and of course we must include usage of the cell phone. Taking your eyes off the road to text just a word or two on your phone or attempting to take a picture of the accident as you pass by can divert your vehicle into the first responders or into the accident itself in fraction of a second.

Firefighters attend training in the tactics and strategies in fighting structure fires. An experienced fire officer can usually predict how a house fire will burn given the weather conditions, location of the structure, estimated time if ignition, and the resources available. These indicators will assist the fire officer in the decisions that have to be made in suppressing the fire.

This same thinking applies when responding to a roadway incident involving a fire or motor vehicle accident. In most cases these are easily handled with minimum effort and resources. But on a roadway incident other

factors also must be considered. Arriving on the scene and making the incident a safe area in which to work becomes a top priority for all involved. We must protect those first responders while they are concentrating on performing their duties to rescue any victims and secure the incident. We must do everything we can to "protect the scene" using all available resources. This includes using our law enforcement personnel and their vehicles as early warning indicators and placing them well in advance of the incident. The earlier we can warn someone who is approaching an incident scene, the quicker they can take evasive measures. It's almost impossible to determine the mental condition of a passing motorist as to whether they are under the influence, being distracted by other factors in their vehicle, or just having a bad day. But we can place early warning indicators ahead of the incident to warn them as they approach the scene. Or there may be times when the person-in-charge must decide to completely shut down the roadway in order to make it safe. Unfortunately, this may make for some irate motorists but in the long run it would provide a much safer scene for our first responders to work.

If some of this article seems redundant, it is meant to be so. There is no reason why any first responder should be injured by a passing vehicle while working a highway incident. Our response area covers major roadways, Routes 9, 35 and the Garden State Parkway. If you think that those motorists are slowing down and paying attention to the roadway as they are passing the scene, think again. Their thoughts are getting to their destination as quickly as possible and YOU, working that scene, are only obstructing their route and delaying their arrival.

100-Year Old Sayreville Man: Hard-Worker, Big Success

John E. Andrejewski of the Melrose section of Sayreville, will turn 100 years old on March 10th, and has had a most interesting and illustrious life. He attended Sacred Heart Grammar School, and Hoffman H.S., went on to construction work on the highway, worked for John Cross Welding until he was 21, and then went on to work at National Lead for 41 years. He served 3 1/2 years in the Air Force in Texas, and said he was "very lucky."

He married Lillian Juhrdan whom he met at Morgan Creek.

During the Great Depression, his father John had a roadside stand, where he sold hot dogs, sandwiches and drinks. John E. recalled that as a youngster, "The original Hole-in-the-Wall had one entrance. Also, everyone walked to school, no matter where you lived." He remembered meeting Gov. Harold G. Hoffman, and told him a joke, which he really enjoyed. "Hoffman was always friendly and easygoing." John said that in the late 1920's, "There were not enough roads for cars. My dad's first new car was a 1928, 2-door Ford Sedan that cost \$400.

He remembered "FDR brought our country out of a deep Depression, plus he started Social Security, Unemployment, and Pensions."

In 1955, he began building a house for his family which consisted of his wife Lillian and two children Diana and Donald J. The job was not easy, as he worked full-time for National Lead, and would come home after a tough day, and go right back to the task of working on the new home until late at night, every night. The beautiful home was completed in May 1956 after only 10 months of hard work. Andrejewski said that, "Building the home was a family-operation, and done all by hand."

John was always hustling and finding creative ways to make extra income for his family. In addition, Lillian opened Lillian's Gift & Jewelry Shoppe on Scott Ave. in Melrose, which she ran from 1956-2012. The couple and their children would drive to Canal St. in New York to purchase costume, solid gold, and diamonds at very low prices, and bring them back to the Shoppe, where

they would sell them at reasonable prices and still turn a profit. Lillian's Gift & Jewelry Shoppe was revolutionary for that time by extending credit to customers, a business practice that was in its infancy. In addition, they sold watches, and repaired jewelry and watches. John also had another side business where he bought and sold used cars. Though their lives were very busy, they managed to enjoy themselves on trips to Hawaii, Atlantic City, and the Monmouth Racetrack.

Somewhere along the way, John took a businessman's advice and entered the stock market as a hobby, investing in Public Service stock, and did quite well. He went on to serve as a member of the Raritan Bay Federal Credit Union Board of Directors for 41 years, and received an award for his service in 2016.

John achieved his goal of sending his children to college, Diana went to Douglass College, and Donald J. graduated from the University of Dayton. Andrejewski also has 4 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

When asked what his secret was for a long and successful life, he responded, "Not worry about anything. I never took anything too seriously. Life is too short. I've had a full life and I'm satisfied."



In all the many years I had lived in the South, I never drove up to a gas station to buy and pump any gasoline into my car. It hadn't mattered if the needle was showing next to empty, I just wouldn't do it. A few times when I was desperate, I drove near the pumps and asked men if they would pump the gas for me. None ever refused, acting as though I were doing them a favor asking for their help. Men are like that. Have a flat tire, and, voila, a man will usually appear to change it with the only requirement being it was for a female. If it were another man, their cars wouldn't even slow down. I remained a Jersey girl, expecting gas to be pumped FOR me and not BY me...and it always was, just not by a gas station employee. In the much slower environment of the South...a place which still embodies the ideals of feminine charms thanks to Scarlett O'Hara in Gone with the Wind, it just seems kind of "going against the grain" seeing females pumping their own gas. It was also scary at times, sitting in the car as gasoline was being pumped and seeing men filling their vehicles with lit cigarettes dangling from their lips, or flicking open a lighter to light one up...just as it was seeing women do the same. In Arkansas where I had lived for 10 years, at least half the vehicles

on the road were pickup trucks which usually had shotguns, probably loaded, and hunting dogs in the back. In Georgia where I had lived for 18 1/2 years, it was more "cited" but still a place where women can own guns, drive pickups, and pump their own gas as well as any man. I may never have pumped gas or driven a pickup but I have to confess I had owned a .32 in Arkansas and a .357 Magnum in Georgia.

New Jersey seems like a different world unto itself. Toughened by life, taxes, crowded cities, and by the New Yorkers who moved and mingled here, this state isn't for the weak of heart. Unfortunately for me, I seem to have become "weakened" in many ways by having lived in the South a total of 28 1/2 years. In other words, I now feel like a half breed, a Yankee with a lot of Southern attitude, but one who feels almost gloriously happy to be home in the state where I belong.

I definitely will never be able to drive on the Turnpike or Parkway...heck, I'm beginning to doubt if I'll ever find my way out of this development with its maze of streets and turns. Since I have no sense of direction, I may become like the man in an old song who had never returned. I'm now living here in Whiting, a place surrounded

by woods, wildlife, foot doctors, pharmacies, and banks which cater to all of us seniors who have made "down in the boondocks" their home. Actually, I love it here. I am home in Jersey for good. End of story.

Did you know that our wonderful State of New Jersey is the ONLY state which does not allow customers to pump their own gasoline? In 1949, Congress passed a statute called the Retail Gasoline Dispensing Safety Act, prohibiting customers from pumping their own gas. Only New Jersey still adheres to the old law...one state vs. the other 49. That's the Jersey attitude at its best. Yes, it's wonderful to be home in New Jersey again!!

Bill "Biff" McKeon - Major League Baseball Scout

Well, it's time to bring Bill's long scouting journey that began way back in 1960 with the Philadelphia Phillies, and ended in 1990 with the San Diego Padres to an end. Along the way, Bill had more than a few accomplishments and highlights, and met and became friends with many of the game's greats. From Mr. Dodger Tommy LaSorda, Mr. Padre Tony Gwinn, Mr. October Reggie Jackson, Mr. Cowboy Gene Autry owner of the Los Angeles Angels.. and a lot more baseball notables, including players, managers and owners. And, of course the MLB scouts who shared his game days and evenings analyzing players, having a few laughs and "draughts". Bill especially remembers the scouts who welcomed him to the Scouting Fraternity in 1960 and showed him the "tricks of the Trade": Frank O'Rourke Yankees, Frank Burke Giants and Bill McCarren Red Sox. Then along came a guy who took Bill under his wing and would be his best friend and partner in scouting for many years: Buddy Kerr, The old New York Giant shortstop.... Buddy and Bill would share many "adventures" together. When Bill speaks of Buddy you can tell they had a special friendship.

Significant Baseball Accomplishments and Highlights

If you followed Bill's scouting stories in the South Amboy/Sayreville Times, you will have read that there were many. Here are some that Bill feels are special:

1. Being in the San Diego Padres locker room when they celebrated winning the National League Championship in 1984. "I liked being soaked with Champagne."
2. Being a San Diego Padre catching instructor during the team's 1984 Spring Training. "Imagine, I instructed Benito Santiago and Sandy Alomar Jr. on "the fine art of catching." Both Benito and Sandy went on to have outstanding, long baseball careers.
3. Drafting an Ole University of Mississippi quarterback named Archie Manning for the Kansas City Royals. He was a pretty good baseball player and could have (?) made the majors. But he picked the NFL. Yes, he is the father of two NFL Super Bowl MVP winners: Peyton (1) and Elie (2).
4. In 1968 I recommended that the Kansas City Royals organization establish a Baseball School and College for players they thought had the potential to combine major league baseball potential with

education. The organization liked the idea and I helped set it up. "Unfortunately, I had to turn down the offer to be director. Why? I liked scouting!" Frank White a graduate from the school, went on to play 18 years with the KC Royals and was an All Star 5 times.

5. In 2003 I began my nonplaying affiliation with the Evansville Otters, an independent minor league organization. Over the years I acted as a player evaluator, bench coach, and even managed 2 games, 1W 1L.

6. In 2010 I began my tenure as the radio analyst for the Otters, still going strong and love it! My classmate (SMH 1950) and good friend Sister of Mercy Louise Gorka once said I belonged on the radio. She was right! And here I am getting ready and looking forward to the 2020 season.

7. In 2011, Bill was selected to the AAABA (American Amateur Baseball Association) Hall of Fame for his play in the 1951 National Tournament with the South Amboy All Stars. Bill was also inducted into the St. Mary's Hall of Fame.

* An interesting fact: Both McKeon brothers (Jack and Bill) and the O'Brien twins (Johnny and Eddie) are the only brothers in both Hall of Fames.

Personal and Family Highlights

Bill met, dated, proposed and married his Lady Elizabeth (L/E) in 1957 while playing for the Evansville Indiana Braves. 1957 also saw the end of Bill's playing career due to a serious arm injury. Bill and his new bride relocated to South Amboy/Sayreville where they raised a family of 7. They now have 12 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren. In 1988 they moved back to Evansville Indiana to take care of Elizabeth's elderly father.

Bill graduated from Seton Hall University with a BS and MA in Physical Education, and an MA in School Administration. Before Bill became affiliated with the Evansville Otters, he spent many years (New Jersey and Indiana) as a teacher, high school principal, high school administrator and college baseball coach.

Bill coached the Ashford University baseball team in Clinton Iowa, "I enjoyed coaching my son Jeffery who went on to be inducted into the Ashford Athletic Hall of Fame". While at the college Bill also designed a College Coaching Course that was approved by the college and the Iowa Department of Education. Bill and Jeffery would later team up as father/son coaches for the Evansville Otters. A time that Bill says he really enjoyed.

Summary

Bill worked his way up from a part time scout with the Phillies to full time responsible positions with the Los Angeles Dodgers, Los Angeles Angels, Kansas City A's and KC Royals. (when the KC A's franchise moved to Oakland CA, Bill continued scouting for the Royals the new Kansas City franchise), and finally with the San Diego Padres. A long scouting career that spanned 30 years!

Remembering Vince Abbatiello (Abbott)

Vince Abbatiello, 88, formerly of South Amboy died on Dec. 4. He was a very reserved player/student /good hustler/good teammate, but not the rah-rah type just a player who played hard.

Vince Abbatiello was a St. Mary's HS "Eagle Baseball Player" for 4 years from 1948-51. In Vince's junior year he played 3rd base and got 1 for 2 against city rival Hoffman HS. Jack O'Brien was the Eagles 2nd baseman. In Vince's senior year he played 2nd base and was considered a good defensive player with some power. Bob "Ace" Hennessey was the Eagle Shortstop and Archangelo "Arky" DiMattia was the hot corner player on the Eagle 1949 baseball team. It was noted in the Eagle newspaper "The Crown" that "whomever replaces Vince

Abbatiello at 2nd base, they better have a good glove."

Vince was a talented baseball player, and got his genes from his father Vince Abbatiello Sr., who was the baseball coach at Sayreville High School. Vince was also a talented singer, getting this from his mother, who taught music in St. Mary's Grammar School. I remember Vince's mother teaching the song "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" when I was in the 3rd grade.

After graduating from St. Mary's HS, Vince attended Rutgers University and played 4 years of varsity baseball for former Major Leaguer George Case, a former second baseman who had played for the Washington Senators. Vince said he was one of the finest coaches in his baseball career.

Sara's Law Expansion

Sara Dubinin tragically passed away on Sept. 25, 2007 as a result of a car accident the previous day. The circumstances surrounding the accident and her subsequent death motivated Betty Dubinin to advocate for families throughout New Jersey with Sara's Law and now the expansion of that law.

Sara's Law allows those 14 years and older to register on the Next of Kin registry where they can provide emergency contact information allowing Law Enforcement to reach families/loved ones if a person in a motor vehicle accident is unable to communicate. Sara's law has now been expanded to allow individuals to add their VIN # (Vehicle Identification Number) to the registry.

Betty was completely unaware that her daughter had even been involved in a car accident until a friend of one of Sara's friends contacted her. By the time she got to the hospital, Sara had slipped into a coma. She died the next day robbing Betty of any opportunity to let her daughter know she was there before she passed away. "I always think...if I was holding her hand, would she fight harder to live?" asks Betty.

The anguish surrounding the circumstances of Sara's death led to endless hours of advocating and multiple visits to Capitol Hill before the Senate eventually resulting in Sara's Law and a Next of Kin Registry. In 2018, an expansion of the law allowed people to add their VIN to the registry. Finally, as a result of Betty's efforts, last month State Sen. Joseph Vitale's office notified Betty that the online registry, www.state.nj.us/mvc/drivertopics/nextofkin.htm has been officially updated to allow those in New Jersey to add the VIN. Senator Vitale stated this is "another important tool that

will allow first responders to contact a family member if another member is injured in a motor vehicle accident and no other contact information is present." Betty views this as a major victory as she has known "people who have been in crashes and the only thing left on the car is the VIN number and so they've tried to track family" with that information.

The New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission states via a spokesperson that the information gathered under Sara's Law is not public and only used by Law Enforcement officers to reach emergency contacts. It is Betty's hope that all residents of New Jersey utilize this important tool and add their information to the registry. Please direct any questions to Betty on Facebook @saraslawnj






Author Mary Casey-Griffin Book Signing March 21





In an exclusive interview, he said, "The time has come. I handed in my union card and thanked everyone."

He has performed with some of the biggest names in the swing music genre throughout his incredible career, including the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra, Warren Covington, Larry Elgart, Sammy Kaye, The Guy Lombardo Orchestra, Helen O'Connell, Bob Eberly, Gordon McCrae. Teresa Brewer, who had many Top 40 hits, toured Europe, and Dennis was her drummer. He said, "She was the best! We played in Romania, backing her."

Nardone graduated from St. Mary's HS in '69, where he was co-captain of the baseball team, and an All-State Parochial Group 1st team third baseman, and also 1st team All-County baseball player. He once had a tryout with the Montreal Expos Major League Baseball team, but his true calling was always in the music field, and he certainly did succeed! His first music teacher was Jack Spencer at Sayrewoods Music Center, and others through the years were Joe Morello, Charles Tappan, Tony Di Nicola at the College of New Jersey, and "Condit Atkinson, who was my music teacher and mentor at Middlesex County College. Through him, my music career began." Dennis also played with local renowned musicians Brian O'Connor and Roger Johnson, and was a member of Musicians Union 802, New York.

How many people can say that they played at a birthday party for the legendary Elton John? Well, Dennis did, for John's 40th birthday party at the Hotel Pierre in New York City. Nardone was playing with Larry


Elgart, and they secured the prestigious gig with the famous singer. "Elton John was a nice guy," according to Dennis.

The drummer extraordinaire really enjoyed playing shows at "Plays In The Park." "It was a big moment for me. I could finally read charts. Playing the score of "West Side Story" with the orchestra was probably my most uplifting moment as a player."

Dennis' final live performance was with Sandy Sasso's Swingin' Band at Spring Lake Park in Piscataway. He reflected on his amazing career saying, "I'll miss the moments when everything comes together, and when the band is really swinging. It does happen occasionally. You're searching for the moment. I'll also miss the camaraderie and jokes on our breaks."





Valentine's Day is for Chocolate Lovers

Dark chocolate seems to lower blood pressure, but it requires an amount less than 2 Hershey Kisses to do it. A small study from Germany adds to mounting evidence linking dark chocolate with certain health benefits such as lowering blood pressure and having an anti-inflammatory effect.

A study appeared in the Journal of the American Medical Association by Dr. Dick Taubert of the University of Cologne. It demonstrated that blood pressure reductions with dark chocolate were small but still substantial enough to potentially reduce cardiovascular disease risks.

Volunteers for the study ate just over 6 grams of dark chocolate daily for almost 5 months. It equaled about 1 & 1/2 Hershey Kisses. People who ate that amount ended up with lower blood pressure reading than those who ate a similar amount of white chocolate. Tests suggested that a steady exposure to dark chocolate prompted a chemical change that helped dilate blood vessels and regulate blood pressure. Cocoa contains flavanols, plant based compounds that are also credited with giving red wine its heart healthy benefits.

Dr. Laura Sevetkey director of Duke University Hypertension center stresses that the study results should not be viewed as a license to gorge on chocolate. The weight gain from eating large amounts of dark chocolate would counteract any benefits.

As always an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. The combination of losing weight, eating less salt, exercising, and eating dark chocolate provides strategies to lower your blood pressure.



Fishing Flashes

Salt Water

The Bay at this time is closed to Striped Bass fishing. I did see some people one night in Keansburg trying their luck anyway. They didn't catch anything but the warm weather spell in January brought some people out. When Striped Bass season opens on March 1st, I don't expect any kind of Bonanza. The new regulation is one fish from 28 inches to 38 inches. This Striped Bass Regulation is now the law as is the new Bluefish law, 3 fish from shore and 5 fish on a party boat. No season opening date yet for Stripers, but it may be in the works. Regulation arguments that affect keeping big fish over 38 inches are that they are the spawners and the stock is presently overfished. The State does have some leeway to set their own regulations with the 3 options allowed. I haven't heard any more about the ocean fishing for Stripers at Island Beach or LBI. The party boats that do currently sail are catching, Blackfish, Ling and a few Cod on offshore wrecks. Some of the Cod are big. This fishing, overall, is turning out to be a good pick. Take your chance and "go fishing" if you want to get out of the house.

Fresh Water

Ice fishing is nonexistent due to the unusual warm winter weather. My wife and I tried the lower Pequest during the warm spell in mid January for a few hours. We didn't even get a bite let alone catch anything. Holdover Trout are still available-you just have to find them. Landlocked Salmon are still out there in the bodies of water that have them.

Methodology, criteria and weightings were developed with input from the Military Friendly Advisory Council of independent leaders in the higher education and military recruitment community.
